Mrs. Jennie Smith Cooper, 73, died Tuesday night at 8:20 o'clock at the Fairfield Memorial Hospital. She had been in declining health for sometime, but her sudden death was attributed to a heart attack.

Sgt. Dunlap, 54, Winnsboro Native, Dies in Georgia

Sgt. Thomas Brice Dunlap, 54 U.S. Army (retired), died Wednesday, Sept. 16, in the Martin Army Hospital at Fort Benning, Columbus, Ga. His death was attributed to a heart attack.

Funeral services were held in the Britton and Dobbs Funeral Home, Columbus, Ga., at 3:00 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 18. Burial was in the Army Memorial Cemetery at Fort Benning. A chaplain from the 29th Infantry, Fort Benning, conducted the service, and military honors were rendered.

Sgt. Dunlap was born in Winnsboro on April 26, 1904. He is the son of Mrs. Carrie Brice Richardson Dunlap and the late Thomas Richardson Dunlap. He was married in 1929 to the former Miss Elizabeth Harkenberg of Macon, Ga.

Sgt. Dunlap entered the Army in 1926, and was stationed with the Service Company, 29th Infantry, Fort Benning, until the outbreak of World War II. After a tour of duty with the Medical Detachment in Japan, he was assigned to Fort Gordon, Augusta, Ga.

In 1956, Sgt. Dunlap received a citation from Major General P. E. Gallagher, commanding general of Fort Gordon, for "long and faithful service in the Armed Forces of the United States for the performance of outstanding service as a cook in the U. S. Army Hospital while assigned to the Medical Detachment during the period from October 15, 1952, to March 6, 1956."

Sgt. Dunlap held the following decorations: Korean Service Medal, National Defense Service Medal, United Nations Service Medal, and Bronze Clasp GCM with three loops.
