

J. Shaw Ketchin Dies Tuesday at Local Hospital

Final Rites for Winnsboro Man Held Wednesday.

James Shaw Ketchin, 70, Winnsboro business man, died Tuesday morning at 4:45 o'clock in the Fairfield County Memorial Hospital, where he had been undergoing treatment for the past 13 weeks. He had been in declining health for a number of years.

The son of the late Thomas H. and Mary Elizabeth Shaw Ketchin, he was born in Winnsboro on March 2, 1888, and had lived here virtually his entire life except for a tour of duty with the armed forces and a brief sojourn in Auburndale, Fla. He was graduated from Mount Zion Institute and from Erskine College, in 1910. He was the owner of Ketchin Mercantile Company, an old firm which has been in business in Winnsboro for many years and for a period he was a contractor, building a number of houses here. During World War I, he was a second lieutenant with the American Expeditionary Forces. He was an instructor in a field artillery school in France, later went into Germany with the army of occupation.

Mr. Ketchin was an elder in the Bethel Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church. Before his health failed, he was an active Rotarian, a Legionnaire and a member of the Mt. Zion Society and he was interested in the civic and religious life of the community.

He was married to Miss Statia Phillips, daughter of an A. R. P. minister, then of Chester, in 1922. In addition to his wife, he is survived by two daughters, Miss Ansley Ketchin of Winnsboro and Charlotte, and Mrs. Harry M. McDonald (Mary Jane) of Orangeburg; a sister, Mrs. George S. Tracy, and a brother G. M. Ketchin, both of Winnsboro; and his stepmother, Mrs. T. H. Ketchin, of Winnsboro.

Graveside services, conducted by the Rev. Frank L. Shannon, pastor, assisted by the Rev. Russell Kerr, a former pastor, were held at the A. R. P. cemetery Wednesday afternoon at four o'clock.

David Wylie Johnson, 39, former Fairfield county treasurer, died Tuesday morning at 2 o'clock at the Veterans' Hospital in Columbia, where he had been undergoing treatment for the past four weeks. He had been in declining health for some months.

The son of Mrs. Christine Elliott Johnson of Winnsboro, and the late Dr. Oliver Johnson, longtime pastor of Bethel Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, he was born in Winnsboro September 7, 1919. He was graduated from Mount Zion Institute in the Class of 1936, attended Erskine College and the University of South Carolina, where he was a member of the Kappa Alpha fraternity, and served five years in the United States Navy.

News was received at Batesburg Friday of the death of Joseph Edward Hinnant, 90, at the home of his son, Dr. John F. Hinnant, at Chincoteague, Va., where he made his home since the death of his wife, Mr. Mary Cornelia Hite Hinnant.

Mr. Hinnant had been in failing health for several years. He was born in Winnsboro, son of Capt. John Alexander Hinnant and Margaret Elizabeth Willingham Hinnant. He moved to Batesburg soon after he was married in 1897. He was an employee of the Batesburg Post Office and was the first city mail carrier out of that office. Mr. Hinnant was a member of the Batesburg Baptist Church and a former deacon.

In addition to his son, survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Hinnant Wooten of Hamlet, N. C., and Mrs. Marian Hinnant Petree of Carthage, N. C.; nine grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren; and two brothers, Fletcher E. Hinnant of Columbia and John H. Hinnant of Eutawville. Another brother, A. J. ("Mike") Hinnant, died at the Fairfield Memorial Hospital last summer.

After a brief funeral service in Chincoteague, the body was brought
