Jeremiah Glenn McMeekin, 46, farmer of Jenkinsville, died last Friday night at the Columbia Hospital. 11/958

Mr. McMeekin was the son of the late Bessie Glenn and John Calhoun McMeekin.

During World War II, he served as a lieutenant colonel in the Army in the European theater of operations.

Mr. McMeekin formerly had worked with the Soil Conservation Service, and had been engaged in farming for the past two years.

He was a member of Little River Baptist Church at Jenkinsville.

D. S. Murph, 78, Dies Suddenly on Saturday Morning

Rites Held Sunday for Retired Lawyer and Educator.



Daniel Shuford Murph, 78 retired lawyer, educator, federal government official and financier, died unexpectedly early Saturday morning at the Fairfield County Memorial Hospital. He had suffered a heart attack at his home on Newberry Road, Winnsboro, and was taken to the hospital but treatment was unavailing. 7/1958

The son of the late Daniel J. W. Murph and Euphrasia Wolfe Murph, he was born near St. Matthews in 1880. He received an A.B. degree from Wofford College in 1902 and took his Master's degree from Trinity College (now Duke University) in Durham in 1903. His LL.B. degree was from Georgetown University in Washington, D. C., in 1916.

Mr. Murph was an instructor in Trinity Park School from 1903 to 1907 and served as superintendent of education of Calhoun County from 1908 to 1913. He was secretary of the U. S. House of Representatives committee on agriculture from 1913 to 1916.

Mr. Murph was the organizer of the Farmers' Bank and Trust Company of St. Matthews and served as its first president. He was associated with the Bureau of Markets, U. S. Department of Agriculture from 1917 to 1920 and after practicing law in his home town of St. Matthews for 13 years, he was appointed chief of cotton processing and marketing for the AAA in Washington. He was a member of the staff of the National Fertilizer Association from 1934 to 1950, serving as the association's secretary and treasurer for five years.

He served under appointment as special judge of circuit courts of South Carolina. He was a member of Kappa Sigma fraternity, a Mason and a member of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church. He was listed in "Who's Who in America".

Mr. Murph was married to Miss Annie Elder Ketchin of Winnsboro on August 20, 1927, who survives him. Also surviving is one son, Daniel Shuford Murph, Jr., who holds a position with Douglas Aircraft Co., Cape Canaveral, Fla. Following Mr. Murph's retirement, the family moved into their new home in Winnsboro in 1952.

Funeral services were held from the Bethel Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church in Winnsboro and interment was in the A.R.P. cemetery.

Dr. L. H. Mayes Dies in Columbia

Winnsboro. — Dr. Leonard Harold Mayes, 61, died at the Veterans Hospital in Columbia at 11 o'clock Friday night. 11/13/1958

He and Mrs. Mayes made their home with her sister, Mrs. Grace Beam Howard, at Blair. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Edith Beam Mayes.

Dr. Mayes was born in Lincoln, Neb. His parents were the late Franklin Pierce Mayes and Katherine Yeager Mayes. He has two younger brothers and five nieces, all of California. Leslie Mayes, his younger brother, is an engineer, and his older brother, John, is now retired.

He attended Denison University, Denison, Ohio, where he was graduated with honors. He received his Ph.B. while at Denison. He was president of the student body a member of the debating team and was national president of his fraternity, the Denison Commons Club. While at Denison, he was chosen to travel throughout Europe for European student relief, was entertained in many American embassies abroad, and when he returned he lectured at many leading universities in the country on European student relief.

After Dr. Mayes left Denison he went to the University of Chicago where he received his Masters degree in political science. While there he had charge of the Florida campaign for the raising of \$20,000,000 for the University of Chicago. He lectured at Mandl Hall at the University and traveled abroad during summer vacations. At Chicago he was chosen among four who received the "Alligator." In addition to getting his Masters degree at Chicago University he spent two years there studying the humanities and at the Divinity School of Chicago.

Dr. Mayes received his Doctor of Jurisprudence degree at New York University, New York, and of Rio Grande College, Rio Grande, Ohio. While there he raised money for the endowment—and to build a new student dormitory and new administration building. In 1930 he went to New York and became a practicing attorney. In 1934 he became dean of law at Rider College, Trenton, N. J.

In 1940 he went to Washington and worked directly under Donald Nelson of the War Production Board. He was chief of the Controls Materials Plan and also worked directly with Bill Donovan of O. S. S. In 1945 he went to the State Department in foreign service where he was head of the school for the training of ambassadors in all parts of the globe.

Dr. Mayes was a member of the New York Bar Association, the Chamber of Commerce of Lincoln, Neb., and of the Kiwanis Club and American Legion Post No. 16 of Winnsboro.

Funeral services were held in Crouse, N. C., Sunday, at 3:30 p.m., from St. Mark's Lutheran Church by Dr. Miller, pastor, and the Rev. Robert Wallace of Salem Presbyterian Church. Interment was in the church cemetery.
