

## W. W. Ketchin, 66, Winnsboro Native, Dies in Columbia

William W. Ketchin, 66, of 2731 Wheat St., Columbia, business manager of the State Penitentiary, died of a heart attack while at work Monday morning.

He was walking from the sign shop to the prison business office when he was stricken. He was taken to the prison hospital, but was dead on arrival.

Supt. W. M. Manning of the institution described Ketchin as "an extremely valuable employee." Manning said Ketchin built up business for the prison sign shop from less than \$50,000 annually, to a half-million-dollar volume.

Mr. Ketchin was the son of the late Hattie McMaster Ketchin and William W. Ketchin, of Winnsboro. He had made his home in Columbia for a number of years and was a member of Shandon Presbyterian Church.

He attended Clemson College and was very active in the Alumni Association and the Iptay Club. He was a veteran of World War I, a member of the American Legion, and a member of Shandon Lodge No. 370, AFM.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Sallie Beard Ketchin; one daughter, Mrs. Sid Gardner of Camden; one son, William W. Ketchin, Jr., Columbia; one sister, Miss Harriet R. Ketchin, Columbia; and seven grandchildren.

Funeral services were held from the Dunbar Funeral Home at 3:30 Tuesday afternoon conducted by the Rev. Lynn Temple Jones, pastor of Eastminster Presbyterian Church. Interment was in Greenlawn Memorial Park.

Edgar Devineau Joyner, 65, died at the Fairfield Memorial Hospital at 2:15 Thursday afternoon after suffering a heart attack earlier at his home.

He was born in Orangeburg County and was the son of the late Gabriella Neal Joyner and Jacob Peter Joyner. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Winnsboro, where he was prominent in church work having served in many offices. Among the last positions he filled was that of treasurer of the Men's Bible Class.

As a veteran of World War I, Mr. Joyner was a commander of the American Legion, Post No. 16, and at the time of his passing was serving on the National Commander's Subversive Committee. A lover of the outdoors, he was an outstanding sportsman and took an active part in the organization of, and programs of the Fairfield Wild Life Association of which he was president for two years. Formerly he belonged to the Order of Railroad Telegraphers.

He is survived by his widow, Vara Lewis Joyner of the home; two sons, James Joyner and Robert Lewis Joyner of Winnsboro; two grandchildren, Sue Ann Joyner and Ruth Devineau Joyner of Winnsboro, and one brother, Taber Neal Joyner of Holly Hill. A man with a keen sense of justice and a deep devotion to his family, Mr. Joyner possessed a natural gift for filling the hearts of those with whom he associated with faith and courage. He had many friends and admirers and a large number of people paid their tokens of respect and affection to his family and to his memory.
