

Brother of G. F. Patton, Retired Minister, Dies

MANNING — John Paul Patton, 79, retired Methodist minister, died at 8 a. m. Sunday at Clarendon Memorial Hospital where he had been a patient the past week.

He was the son of the late M. T. and Sara Frances Gore Patton. He was born at Cross Anchor and received his early education at Cross Anchor schools, graduating in 1901. He entered the University of South Carolina, where he graduated with the A. B. degree in 1906.

Mr. Patton later continued his study at USC and received a Masters degree in education in 1916. He also studied in Pastors and Training Schools and he was licensed to preach by the Spartanburg District Conference at Blacksburg in 1907.

He was admitted on trial in the South Carolina Conference of Methodists in Charleston on Dec. 8, 1910 and was received into full connection by the conference at Rock Hill, Nov. 28, 1913.

Mr. Patton was ordained a deacon in 1913 by Bishop A. W. Wilson and ordained an elder by Bishop Collins Denny in 1918. He served appointments at Blacksburg, 1911-14; Hendersonville, 1915; College Place and professor in Columbia College, 1916-18; president of S. C. Conference Epworth League and young peoples work, 1919; Easley 1920-23; Honea Path, 1924-25; Waverly, Columbia, 1926; York, 1927; professor at Lander College, 1929-32; Ware Shoals, 1944-47, and Jonesville, 1948-52.

In 1910, he married Miss Dora Jane Epps of Kingstree.

Before entering the ministry, he was for five years in school work, and in addition to his college teaching, he has taught in training schools for leadership education sponsored by the board of education of the church.

Upon his retirement in 1952, Mr. Patton and his family came to Manning to make their home. He was devoted continually to his church and preached at churches in the community whenever called upon.

At the time of his death, he had served over four years as teacher of the Ladies Bible Class at Manning Methodist Church.

Funeral services were conducted at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday from Manning Methodist Church by the Rev. George Taylor, assisted by the Rev. S. M. Atkinson of Lake City, presiding elder of this district. Burial was in Williamsburg Cemetery in Kingstree.

Survivors in addition to his widow, include one daughter, Mrs. F. H. Holbrook of Whittier, Calif.; two sons, J. P. Patton, Jr., of Bamburg and H. Graham Patton of Columbia; five grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. D. N. Harris of Clemson and Mrs. Hiram Yarborough of Big Point, N. C.
