**Miss DuBose, 92,
Daughter of Noted
Theologian, Dies**

Sewanee, Tenn. — Miss May Peronneau DuBose, age 92 years, died at a nursing home at Monteagle, Tennessee, October 28. Funeral services were held Monday, October 31, from St. Luke's Chapel, of the Theological School of the University of the South, with burial in the University cemetery at Sewanee. Services were conducted by the Very Rev. George M. Alexander, dean of the school of theology, and the Rev. David W. Yates, rector of Otey Parish, Sewanee.

Miss DuBose was the last surviving daughter of the Sewanee theologian, philosopher and author, the Rev. William Porcher DuBose, D.D., S. T. D., D. C. L. She was born in Charleston on January 1, 1868, while her mother was visiting her sister, Mrs. Henry DeSaussure, the day that her father moved from the rectorship of St. John's Church, Winnsboro, and St. Stephen's, Ridgeway, to become rector of Trinity Church, Abbeville. From there he went to the University of the South at Sewanee in 1871, where he served as chaplain of the university, later as dean of the theological school, and where he became an international scholar and theologian.

Miss DuBose attended Fairmont College at Monteagle, founded by her step-mother, Mrs. Maria Louise Yerger DuBose. Later, she and her sister, Miss Susan Peronneau DuBose, were in charge at Fairmont, where two of their pupils were the Soong sisters, Madame Sun Yat Sen, wife of the founder of the Kuemintang party of China, and Madame Chiang Kai-shek, wife of the generalissimo of Nationalist China. Fairmont closed during World War I.

Miss DuBose was a life-long member of the Episcopal Church, making her home at Sewanee and Monteagle since 1871. Miss May and her late sister, Miss Sue, were frequent visitors to Winnsboro and Ridgeway in former days.

Mrs. Annie Belle Quattlebaum Fellers, 75, widow of Edgar Matthews Fellers, 1313 Elmwood Ave., Columbia, died at the Providence Hospital Saturday morning after an illness of several months. 1960

**Rites Held for
David Ellison, 1960
Fairfield Native**

David G. Ellison, Sr., organizer of one of Columbia's oldest and largest insurance agencies, and a longtime leader in civic affairs, died at 10 o'clock Sunday morning at an Asheville, N. C., hospital, after a long illness. A native of Fairfield county, he had a number of relatives here.

He organized the David G. Ellison Insurance Agency on January 12, 1912, and continued in that business until his death. Associated with him were his three sons, David G. Ellison, Jr., James H. Ellison and Robert E. Ellison.

He served as president of the Columbia Rotary Club and in 1950 he received the Rotary award for distinguished service.

Mr. Ellison was the first chairman of the City of Columbia's Charities and Solicitation Committee. He was a member of the board of directors of the Standard Building and Loan Association.

As a long-time member of the South Carolina State Fair Association he took an important part in making many improvements in the statewide exposition.

He was a vestryman of Trinity Episcopal Church, a member of the South Carolina State Penitentiary Board, a director of the Columbia Chamber of Commerce, a member of the Cotillion Club and held many posts of honor and responsibility in various organizations.

A native of Fairfield county, he came to Columbia in 1895 and was employed by the W. J. McCrary Company, a dry goods firm located on the present site of the James L. Tapp department store.

He later worked for the Virginia-Carolina Chemical Company for seven years and was employed by an insurance firm before he opened his own agency in the Sylvan Building on Hampton Street. Four years later he moved the agency to its present location at 1221 Washington Street.

Mr. Ellison married the former Sophie Aldrich, who died in 1957.

He is survived by three sons, David G. Ellison, Jr., James H. Ellison and Robert E. Ellison; one daughter, Mrs. Jack W. Martin, all of Columbia; four sisters, Misses Louise Ellison and Ellen Ellison and Mrs. Pressley Burckmeyer of Winnsboro, and Mrs. George Mend, Atlanta; two brothers, A. G. Ellison of Lancaster and DuBose Ellison of Winnsboro; eight grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock in Trinity Episcopal Church, conducted by the Rev. Gray Temple. Interment was in Elmwood Cemetery.
