

R. L. Patrick, 83, Dies in Florida

Robert Lowry Patrick, 83, died Friday at the Lake Shore Hospital in Lake City, Fla., after a five day critical illness and a long period of declining health. A former Fairfield County native, he was the son of the late R. A. and Mary Agnes Blair Patrick and was born at White Oak on January 9, 1877.

Mr. Patrick left Fairfield in 1902 for Wrens, Ga., where he was an employee, first with the W. J. Wrens Company and later with the Bank of Wrens. He later moved to Augusta, Ga., and was connected with the Augusta Furniture Mart until his retirement in 1952. His wife, the former Miss Elizabeth Hall of Blakeley, Ga., died in 1951. After his retirement, Mr. Patrick spent winters in Lake City, Fla., with a sister, Mrs. Katherine Patrick Siquefield, and his summers in Augusta and at White Oak with relatives.

Funeral services were conducted on Sunday afternoon at two o'clock from the Lyndon Grove Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, of Augusta, of which he was a member, by his pastor, the Reverend Wilmer Hay. Interment was in the family plot in Wrens, Ga.
