Dr. Bloodworth began his secondary education at Mount Zion Institute, continuing it at John W. Burke Grammar School, Macon, Ga. He was graduated from Mercer Boys' High in 1944. His education was interrupted in 1945 when he served with the U.S. Navy for two years. He received his degree from The Citadel in 1950 and entered S. C. Medical College in Charleston. After serving his internship at the Macon Hospital, he entered Surgery at Henry Grady Hospital in Atlanta, where he also taught a class in surgical nursing. He set up his practice in Atlanta in July, 1959 where he served until his illness.

### Dr. Bryson, 71, Health Officer, Dies at His Home



Dr. James Lauderdale Bryson, 71, died at his home on Liberty Street in Winnsboro on Thursday morning at five o'clock, after an illness of several months. 1961

The son of the late James LaFayette Bryson and Emma Lauderdale Bryson, he was born in Winnsboro on April 19, 1889, and had lived here virtually all of his life. He received his early education at Mount Zion Institute, attended Erskine College and then took up the study of medicine at the College of Physicians and Surgeons in Atlanta, Georgia, from which he was graduated with an M. D. degree in 1915. He pursued post-graduate work with the City Health Department of New York and at the Lying-In Hospital in Philadelphia.

Dr. Bryson was an early volunteer in World War I. He trained at Camp Sevier in Greenville and served overseas for three years, attaining the rank of captain in the United States Army Medical Corps. After the war, he worked with the U. S. Health Department, prior to returning to Winnsboro upon the death of his father. He became director of the Fairfield County Health Department in 1928, a post he held for 28 consecutive years until his voluntary retirement in October of 1956. At that time, in a letter to the newspapers, he said in part:

"It has been a great pleasure and privilege to serve the grand people of Fairfield county and I have tried to be conscientious and make my work worthwhile. It has been a pleasure to serve with the county physicians who have assisted me, both the doctors now practicing and the ones who have passed on. Their kindness and cooperation will always be remembered by me."

Dr. Bryson was a director of the Merchants and Planters Bank and the Community Federal Savings and Loan Association of Winnsboro; a member of the American Medical Association, the South Carolina State Medical Society, the Fairfield County Medical Society, Phi Chi Fraternity, the Winnsboro Rotary Club, the American Legion, the Moose Club and the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church.
