## A. M. Faucette, Fairfield Native, Dies in Columbia

Andrew McConnell Faucette, 65 of 210 Ravenel St., Columbia, died unexpectedly Thursday morning in Providence Hospital. 1961

He was born in Feasterville, Fairfield County, a son of the late Mary Feaster Coleman, and Charles Washington Faucette.

Mr. Faucette graduated from the University of South Carolina Law School in the class of 1924. He then practiced law with Senator Olin D. Johnston in Spartanburg until 1928 when he became associated with the Veterans' Administration in Columbia as assistant chief attorney, then chief attorney and loan guarantee attorney.

In 1948, Mr. Faucette left the Veterans' Administration to become associated with Senator Johnston as Home Secretary. In 1955 he became general counsel of the Senate Post Office and Civil Service Committee.

He retired in January 1960 from federal service at which time he became associated in law practice with his son under the firm name of Faucette and Faucette, Attorneys.

Mr. Faucette served as a member of the House of Representatives from Fairfield County in 1923-24.

He was a veteran of World War I. He enlisted in the S. C. National Guard and served in the Coast Artillery at Fort Moultrie, 1917-1919.

Mr. Faucette was a member of the First Presbyterian Church, of the Coleman Masonic Lodge of Feasterville, and of the Woodmen of the World. He was one of the organizers, a charter member and the first president of the Coleman-Feaster-Moberley Family association.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Gertrude Smarr Faucette; a son, Andrew McConnell Faucette Jr.; two sisters, Miss Julia Faucette and Miss Mary Faucette, both of Feasterville; a niece, Mrs. Frank Cunningham, Columbia; two nephews, Marion Ogburn Jr., Charlotte, and Charles W. Faucette, Orangeburg.
