He had been in declining health for some time but bore his suffering with fortitude, kept up his activities and preserved his equanimity to the end. 1961

Mr. Henderson had contributed to the Philadelphia Enquirer, to Judge Magazine, to The Saturday Evening Post (cartoons). More recently, he had articles and drawings in "Ford Times" and in newspapers of the two Carolinas. A writer with a keen sense of humor and dry wit, he depicted the lives of mountain people, low country Negroes and farmers. Exhibitions of his serious art work have been held throughout the South and recent showings were in Charlotte and in Winnsboro. Henderson illustrations are on the walls of a number of local homes.

Born on his grandfather's plantation in Clarendon County, Mr. Henderson had made his home in Winnsboro since 1956. He is a cousin of Mrs. T. K. McDonald and Mrs. Foster Blackwell.

He is survived by four sons, Russell Spain Henderson, Jr., William Henderson, Douglas Henderson and Stuart Henderson, all of Charlotte; two sisters, Mrs. Robert Ingram of Atlanta and Mrs. Margaret Henderson Ross of Charlotte; and one brother, Thomas Henderson of Charlotte.
