Mrs. Margaret Ashford Lewis, 56, wife of Luncford B. Lewis, died at 10:10 o'clock Wednesday night, September 20, in the Fairfield County Memorial Hospital where she was taken two hours earlier from her home in the Greenbrier community after suffering a coronary thrombosis. 1961

Mrs. Lewis was born in the Bethel section of Fairfield County, the daughter of the late William Ralph and Ada Clark Ashford. Since her marriage she had made her home in the Greenbrier community, and was a devoted member of the Greenbrier Methodist Church. She was an active worker in all phases of church affairs, was a past president and a life member of the Women's Society of Christian Service.
