Death Claims J. F. McMaster, 69

James Fleming McMaster, 69, lifelong resident of the Winnsboro area, died at 6 o'clock Tuesday morning at the Fairfield County Memorial Hospital. He had been ill for many months, had undergone surgery here and at the Lahey Clinic in Boston, from whence he had recently returned.

The son of the late James Fleming McMaster and Mary Carlisle Rice McMaster, he was born in Winnsboro on Feb. 6, 1892. He received his early education at Mount Zion Institute, later attended Wofford Fitting School and Davidson College.

Mr. McMaster was engaged in farming and allied agricultural pursuits in Fairfield county virtually all of his life and was active until his last illness. He was a county committeeman with the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office and was a member of the Agricultural Planning Committee of the County Farm Extension office. During World War II, he served ably as the chairman and office manager of the local War Price and Rationing Board.

From the time of his youth, he was a faithful member of the First Methodist Church of Winnsboro, where he served as an officer and taught the Men's Bible Class in the Sunday School for 25 years. An avid reader, particularly of profane history and Holy Writ, it is said he had perused the Bible completely a number of times and was far more familiar with its contents than most people of his or any other generation. He was keenly concerned with educational matters and the schools of town, county and state, commanded his interest and support.
