David Aiken Crawford, 63, died suddenly Monday about 6 p.m., while returning from his produce garden on the Durham place, nine miles north-east of Winnsboro. He had just driven his pickup truck onto Highway No. 21, north of Shaw's Esso Station, when he suffered a heart attack. He had not been in his usual robust health during the past week but the end was unexpected. 1962

Born in Winnsboro Jan. 21, 1899, he was the son of the late David Aiken Crawford and Susie Mobley Crawford. He had lived here his entire life, where he was an extensive planter, cattle-raiser and truck farmer.

He attended Mount Zion Institute and Clemson College and was an outstanding football player on both the high school and college levels and throughout his entire life he was an ardent sports enthusiasts. On a number of occasions, he assisted with the coaching duties at the high school and he was always keenly interested in the accomplishments of the local athletic teams.

Mr. Crawford was a deacon and former board chairman of the Bethel Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church; chairman of the local Selective Service Board; member and one-time commander of the Fairfield County American Legion; a director of the Wateree Watershed Association, a flood control conservation project now underway. He served as Fairfield County Game Warden for a number of years and proved himself an efficient officer who impartially enforced the regulations to help preserve the wildlife of this area.

On Dec. 28, 1922, he was married to Miss Emelyn Macfie of Winnsboro and they had one son, David A. Crawford, Jr., who was killed in action on Omaha Beach in the invasion of Normandy, France, on June 7, 1944.

Besides his widow, he is survived by one brother, Ernest M. Crawford of Winnsboro and a number of nieces and nephews.
