

## Final Rites for Miss Harris, 93, Held on Saturday

Miss Mary Isabel (Belle) Harris died at the home on Zion Street, Winnsboro, Friday afternoon. Remarkably active and alert during her long life, she had been in declining health for a number of months and had only recently returned to her home after undergoing treatment at the Fairfield Memorial Hospital. 8/1962

Born in York County in 1869, daughter of the late Robert Hemphill Harris and the late Mary Query Harris, she would have been 94 years old on January 26. "Miss Belle" had made her home with her sister, Mrs. John H. Cathcart, off and on for the past 30 years and she continued to live there after Mrs. Cathcart's death on Sept. 15, 1961, at the age of 91. She was a faithful member of the Bethel Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church and of the church societies. A sister, Mrs. Margaret Harris McDonald, who died in 1903, was the wife of the late Rev. Charles E. McDonald, pastor of this church for 15 years.

Survivors include one sister, Mrs. Lois H. Ardrey of the home; a niece, Dr. Lois McDonald of New York City; three nephews, Dr. John H. Cathcart of Gaffney and R. H. and C. E. McDonald of Winnsboro. Another niece is Mrs. Robert Gray of Clinton, N. C., and other nieces and nephews of two deceased brothers also survive.

Donald Wesley Greer, 51, died Saturday afternoon about 2:15 o'clock at the Fairfield County Memorial Hospital. He had become suddenly ill early Friday morning at his home, while preparing to go to work and was rushed to the hospital. Death was the result of a heart attack. 11/1962

He was born in Perris, Calif., Oct. 5, 1911, son of the late Hugh and Martha Griggs Greer, and was educated in the schools of Los Angeles. He played professional baseball with the Oakland and Seattle, Wash., clubs and came to Winnsboro from Barnwell, S. C., in 1934. Since that date, Mr. Greer held a position with the United States Rubber Company in the Standards Department. In the mid-1930s, he was a star catcher for the outstanding Royal Cord baseball team of that era.

He was very active in the civic, social and religious life of the community, playing his full part quietly and effectively. He was prominent in the local Boy Scout movement, served for several years as a troop leader. He was a member of the Winnsboro Cottillion Club and of the Southern Industrial Engineering Association.

Mr. Greer was a member of the Bethel Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, served faithfully as a deacon for many years and was made a member of the Session some time ago to become one of the church's youngest elders. On Oct. 30, 1936, he was married to the former Miss Ethel Meng of Winnsboro.
