Mrs. Jennings, 58, Dies in Accident; Rites on Saturday

Mrs. Merrill Turner Jennings, 58, died Thursday afternoon about 5:30 o'clock from injuries sustained in a two-car automobile collision a short time earlier, at the intersection of Washington and Vanderhorst Streets. She was rushed to the Fairfield County Memorial Hospital but the multiple injuries had proved fatal.

A native of the Lebanon section of Fairfield county, she was the daughter of the late John Y. Turner, Sr., and Essie Zealy Turner. She was graduated from Mount Zion Institute in Winnsboro, attended Winthrop College and taught in the public schools of Santuc, Great Falls and Johnston. On July 23, 1933, she was married to Robert H. Jennings of Winnsboro and the closely-knit family has lived here ever since. Their home is on the Great Falls road.

Survivors include her husband, who was injured in the accident; three daughters, Mrs. L. T. Wood (Merrill), of Rutherfordton, N. C., Miss Barbara Jennings, member of the faculty of Joseph Keels Elementary School in Columbia, and Miss Esther Jennings, a senior at Winnsboro High School; and one son, Robert H. Jennings, Jr., an eighth grader at Winnsboro High; one sister, Mrs. George Willis, Jr., of Gastonia, N. C., and two brothers, John Y. Turner, Jr., of Greenville, Ala., and Wallace A. Turner of Winnsboro.

Lightning Kills J. M. Jones, 34; Boy, 11, Is Hurt

James Melton Jones, 34, Korean War veteran of Winnsboro, was killed instantly last Thursday (July 12) when lightning struck a fishing cabin where he and two companions had taken refuge from an electrical storm. Jeffrey Walker, age 11, was badly burned by the same bolt and taken to the Fairfield County Memorial Hospital for treatment.

Ernest Walker, who holds a position with the local A & P Tea Company, and father of the injured boy, was momentarily knocked unconscious. He revived to find his son moaning and Jones dead. He himself was not seriously hurt.

The tragedy took place at the Walker cabin near June Creek on the Wateree backwater around 2 p.m. Mr. Walker said the lightning struck a tree near his cabin and then the freak bolt seemed to jump to the house.

Fairfield County Coroner Davis Earle Boulware said no inquest would be necessary in the death.

Jeffrey Walker returned Saturday to his home from the hospital. He is suffering from leg burns but his condition is said to be satisfactory.
