Eugene Wilson Yates, 70, died Friday morning at the Newberry County Memorial Hospital after an illness of several months. He was the son of the late E. W. and Annie Snow Yates of Charleston. *5/1962*

Mr. Yates came to Winnsboro after his graduation from The Citadel and taught at Mount Zion Institute. After being in service in World War I he returned to Winnsboro and was connected with the Winnsboro Bank for a number of years. Following a time when he was connected with his brother in Ohio in insurance business, Mr. Yates began work with the Winnsboro Post Office, and was retired on a physical disability in the late 1940s.

He had made his home in Newberry for the past 12 years, and was a member of the Central Methodist Church and a member of the Board of Stewards. He was a member of the Kiwanis Club and on the Board of Directors.

Surviving are his wife, the former Miss Alice Lillian West of Newberry; one son, E. Wilson Yates of Louisville, Ky., and one daughter, Mrs. Rives Chalmers of Atlanta, Ga., and eight grandchildren.

Frank M. Sanborn Dies; Final Rites Held Here Sunday

Frank Morrison Sanborn, 63, died Friday morning at the Columbia Hospital, where he had been a patient for a week. He had been in declining health for some time. He and Mrs. Sanborn (the former Ethel Buchanan) had made their home in Winnsboro for the past two years. *1962*

Born Aug. 2, 1898, in Cedar Falls, N. C., he spent the first thirty years of his life in West Kennebunk, Maine, where his father, Walter Kelly Sanborn was superintendent of the Lord Mill. His mother, Addie Morrison, was reared by her uncle, Senator George W. Morrison of New Hampshire, who helped to draft the Kansas-Nebraska Act in the National Congress.

Mr. Sanborn held a number of positions in the textile engineering field in Baltimore and in Gastonia, N. C., prior to coming here in June, 1933, to accept a post with the Winnsboro Mills. Leaving Winnsboro in 1942, he went to Dan River Mills, Danville, Va., as a textile advisor. He served this company for 17 years before retiring to Winnsboro in June, 1960, because of ill health. He was a graduate of Lowell Technological Institute, Lowell, Mass., a member of Psi Chi Textile fraternity and a member of Sion Presbyterian Church, Winnsboro.

Mr. Sanborn was first married to Margaret MacLaren Nesbitt of Scotland, on June 9, 1928. His second marriage was to Miss Ethel Yongue Buchanan of Winnsboro on June 16, 1939, and she survives him. Other survivors are one son by his first marriage, George MacLaren Sanborn of Harvard University; three nephews, Robert Sanborn of Gastonia, Walter Sanborn of Charlotte, and Bruce Sanborn of Cleveland, Ohio.
