

Tribute to John Marion Crawford

JAN. 21, 1892 — MAY 31, 1965
In the passing from this life on May 31, 1965, of John Marion Crawford, American Legion Post No. 16 has sustained the loss of a most valuable and loyal member, the membership the loss of a devoted friend and the community the loss of an untiring and faithful servant.

Born at McConnells, S. C., York County, son of the late Samuel Ashe and Mattie Williams Crawford, he was educated in the York County public schools. He served with the U. S. Navy as a pilot at Hampton Roads, Norfolk, Virginia, 1917-1919 World War I, and in World War II with the South Carolina Defense Force — 1941.

On August 6, 1924, he was married to Wilma Jeannette Turner, daughter of the late William Kennedy and Jeannette Carroll Turner. From 1923 until 1937 he was associated with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company and also the Virginia Life Insurance Company serving in Chester and York counties. In 1937 he came to the Lebanon Community of Fairfield County to make his home and to engage in farming. In 1943 he joined the U. S. Soil Conservation Service and served with this agency until the time of his retirement in 1958.

He was a faithful member of the Lebanon Presbyterian Church where he served as a deacon and elder for a number of years. He was a Director of The Fairfield County Farm Bureau and also the S. C. Farm Bureau. He, also, served as a Director of The Fairfield Electric Cooperative. He was a faithful member of The American Legion Post 16 as well as a Mason and Shriner.

He is survived by his widow, two sisters and one brother. Funeral services were held on June 2, 1965, at the Lebanon Presbyterian Church conducted by the Rev. Francis B. Mayes and Dr. Robert C. Bankhead, with interment in the church cemetery.

Though we have suffered grievous loss in his passing, we can all be grateful that he lived and served in our time and that we were privileged to have him as our comrade and friend.

By the example of his life — his deep devotion to the Faith — his love for God and Country and his fellow man, he has made his final flight to serve eternally with the Master Pilot of us all.
