



## Fairfield Man, Louie Levy, 37 Dies in Colorado

Louie A. Levy, 37, of 1012 Edney, Fort Worth, Texas, died suddenly in Boulder, Colorado, while on a business trip on March 24.

Mr. Levy was born on May 12, 1927, in Winnsboro, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Zelick Levy.

He was associated with Montgomery Ward as regional sales lay out supervisor with headquarters in Fort Worth, where he made his home for the past 17 years. Mr. Levy served in the U. S. Navy during World War II.

Survivors include his wife, and three children, Mike, Michele and Ricky of the home; two brothers, Melton Levy of Winnsboro and Harry Levy of Columbia; one sister, Mrs. Eva Oxler of Charleston.

Funeral services were conducted on Monday morning, March 29th in the Robertson-Mueller-Harper Funeral Home, Fort Worth, Texas. Interment was in the Laurel Land Cemetery.

## Rites Held Here For T. W. Lewis, Accident Victim

Thomas Woodward Lewis, 26, was killed instantly Thursday night, June 17, in an automobile wreck on the outskirts of Florence.

Mr. Lewis, who was riding alone, lost control of the car, ran off the road and hit a tree.

He was the son of Walter W. Lewis, member of the S. C. Tax Commission, and formerly clerk of court of Fairfield County, and Florrie Jane Bethea Lewis of Winnsboro.

Mr. Lewis was born in Winnsboro, April 13, 1939. He was educated at Mt. Zion Institute and the University of South Carolina. Following his six months' tour of service at Fort Jackson, he had become a trainee with Noland Co., Inc., in Columbia and last November had opened up the branch company in Florence, where he was superintendent of warehouses. He had planned to transfer back to Columbia in September and complete his degree in business education at the University, where he had been accepted for the fall term.

He was a member of the First Methodist Church, Winnsboro, the Fairfield County Junior Chamber of Commerce, the 133rd Military Police Company, Winnsboro National Guard, and had just completed two weeks' training at Fort Gordon, Ga. His assigned duty in the National Guard was photographer in the Criminal Investigating Section.

Surviving are his parents; two sisters, Mrs. John McNair Turner and Miss Ellen Street Lewis; a niece and nephew, Miss Jane Bethea Turner and John McNair Turner, Jr., all of Winnsboro; and two uncles and three aunts, E. ## Rites Today at Hopewell Church For Dr. Kennedy

The Rev. Walter Armstrong Kennedy, D.D., 87, retired Associate Reformed Presbyterian Minister, died Tuesday in Briggs Nursing Home in Manning.

Funeral services will be at 3 p.m., Thursday in Hopewell ARP Church in Blackstock.

Dr. Kennedy was born at Sharon, York County, son of the late James Ramsey and Eliza Jane Smith Kennedy. He received his B. A. degree at Erskine College in 1904, and Master of Arts degree in 1906. He attended Erskine Theological Seminary, receiving the B. D. degree, and was ordained by the First Presbyterian Church in 1907. He had a year's post graduate work at Princeton University and in May, 1944, Erskine College conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Dr. Kennedy's first pastorate was at Pressly Memorial Church, Statesville, N. C. He then served at Prosperity, Tenn., Hopewell, Ga., and was minister at Hopewell, New Hope Charge, Blackstock, from Nov. 10, 1918 until his retirement in 1960.

Dr. Kennedy edited church literature and was Synod's appointed editor of the Sesquicentennial History of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church. He moderated the Tennessee and Alabama Presbytery, the Second Presbytery and the Catawba Presbytery. He was clerk of the Catawba Presbytery for 32 years.

On Jan. 26, 1910, he married Dollie Eleanor Hardeman of Louisville, Ga., who died in 1958. A son, Dr. Walter Armstrong Kennedy, Jr., an ARP minister of Coddle Creek Church, Mooresville, N. C., died in 1964.
