Mrs. William Seward Mason, Sr., died Sunday, June 6, at University Hospital, Baltimore, Maryland, after a brief illness.

She was the former Lou Tiffany, eldest daughter of Silas Tiffany and Elizabeth Bennett Tiffany, and was born in New Milford, Pennsylvania. She graduated from New Milford High School, and attended East Stroudsburg State Teachers College. Mrs. Mason taught in elementary schools. She was married to William S. Mason in 1913. A member of the Presbyterian Church, she was active in church and civic organizations, holding memberships in garden and literary clubs in various cities.

The Masons made their home in Winnsboro for a number of years, where Mr. Mason served as Executive Secretary of the Fairfield Chamber of Commerce until his death in 1947. While in Winnsboro they were members of Sion Presbyterian Church. For the past several years Mrs. Mason made her home with her sister, Mrs. J. H. Singleton, in Baltimore.
