Mrs Glenn Smith Died of Bronchial Pneumonia This Morning.

Relatives and many friends of Mrs. Hallie Brice Smith, wife of Glenn G. Smith, are mourning her death, which occurred about 1 o'clock this morning at the family residence, 405 Henderson Ave., after a long illness with bronchial pneumonia, the result of an attack of influenza last year.

Mrs. Smith was Miss Hallie Brice, daughter of the late Wm. W. Price of Winstboro, S. C. She was 40 years of age. She was married to Glenn Smith, well known in Tampa, at Micanopy, December 1903, coming to Tampa several years ago.

Mrs. Smith was for a number of years registrar of vital statistics and was also superintendent of Gordon Keller hospital until recently, when he resigned to take charge of the Fayside hospital. Mrs. Smith was a member of the International Bible Students' Assoniation. Her only immediate relative surviving, besides her husband, is her sister, Mrs. J.H. Moffat of Tampa.
