Preface

When my husband, Bob, and I first began to gather information on the Gradick family, we never dreamed that we would be able to trace back as far as we have—we really didn't expect to get very far with it at all. We started out, while on a visit to Texas, by asking his aunts and uncles about what they knew of their parents and grandparents, their aunts and uncles and cousins. Bob's great-grandfather was as far back as anyone knew. We were told that his name was William Henry Gradick, but since then we have found his name in various documents as Henry William Gradick, H. W. Gradick, H. M. Gradick and Henry Winthrop Gradick. At any rate, he was commonly known as Henry Gradick. So from these beginnings we began our search.

We are fortunate in that we live only about 125 miles from Fort Wayne, Indiana, where there is one of the best genealogy collections in the country at the Allen County Public Library. We have made frequent trips there to use their resources. Among those resources is their collection of the Federal Government census schedules. The United States has taken a census every ten years ever since 1790; and the government policy, so far, has been to make these records available to the public after seventy years. Currently all the years through 1930 are available, and the Allen County Public Library has copies of all of them. We were able to find Henry Gradick, at the age of 25, in the 1860 census of Upshur County, Texas. His place of birth was given as Alabama. Next we looked in the Alabama census of 1850, and we found him there, in Bibb County, listed at age 16 in the home of John N. Gradick. In this census, his birthplace was given as South Carolina, as was John N.'s. So we were back another generation, and to another state. We then searched the South Carolina censuses back to 1790, and we found several Gradicks in each, but no John N. (we didn't expect to find Henry, as children's names were not listed prior to 1850), so there was no way to tell which, if any, was our line.

Our next breakthrough came when we discovered, on the Internet, a site maintained by the Texas State Archives that listed the names of those who had applied for a Civil War pension in Texas. On the list were H. M. Gradick, and also Mrs. N. E. Gradick, in Smith County. They were Bob's great-grandparents. We sent away for copies of these documents. One was an application for a Civil War pension by Henry; the other was an application for a Civil War widow's pension by Elizabeth. When we received them we were thrilled to find an important bit of information. Henry's birthplace in South Carolina was Charleston. This narrowed the search, since most of the Gradicks in South

Carolina were in Richland and Fairfield Counties, and only one family, that of Christian Gradick, was enumerated in Charleston.

In the fall of 1998 we went to South Carolina to search the records there. The South Carolina Department of Archives and History had just moved into their beautiful new facility in Columbia. There we found many documents involving various Gradick family names, most of them having to do with land records.

While in Columbia, we also visited the South Caroliniana Library at the University of South Carolina, where we found a file on the "Graddick-Creadick, Gredig- Reddick" family that had been compiled in 1957 by Leonardo Andrea, a genealogist who had gathered an extensive collection of information on various South Carolina families.

From there we went to Charleston. Our first stop was the Charleston Library Society, a private membership library where visitors are allowed to do research for a small fee. It is the third oldest library in the United States. The librarian on duty could not have been more helpful. We also visited the Charleston County Library. At each of these places we found something to add to our Gradick family material.

In the spring of 2002, we made a return trip to South Carolina to see if we could fill in some of the blanks, or even turn up something new that we might have missed before. We feel that we have made a comprehensive search of the records pertaining to the Gradick family in South Carolina through about 1850. Of course, the records are not complete. It would be nice if we could find a will written by the immigrant, Julius Gredig, naming his wife and children, but he died intestate. It would be nice if we could find marriage licenses and birth certificates or death records to establish exact dates and relationships; but it was 1911 before marriage licenses were required, and 1915 before births and deaths were recorded. Also many old records were destroyed during Sherman's "March to the Sea" during the Civil War.

What we are presenting to our readers, then, is our best effort to reconstruct the history of the Graddick/Gradick family in America based on the records that we have been able to find. Between 1800 and 1860 some of the families migrated to other parts of the country, with branches being established in Mississippi, Georgia, Florida and Texas. We have followed many of these families well into the twentieth century, or at least far enough to provide sufficient background so that present day family members might be able to tie into this family tree.

We hope our readers find our book interesting. We invite you to send us your comments, or to send us further information on the family lines that we can add to our database. Let us know if you find errors. We have tried hard to get it right, but often we have found more than one version of the same event, and we are certainly not infallible; no matter how hard we try, errors are bound to creep in.

The Name

In German the name was Gredig, but in America it became Anglicized to become Graddick or Gradick. In 1737, in South Carolina, a tract of land was laid out to "Julius Credy." In 1742, the same man's name appears as "Julius Gredig" on a petition to the South Carolina Council. In other early records in the 1700's, and even later, we have found the name spelled in various ways, such as Craddoc, Craddock, Cradock, Cradick, Crady, Creadick, Creddrick, Credick, Credy, Gradack, Graddic, Graddig, Gradic, Gradict, Gradrick, Graddock, Gradock, Gratick, and Gredig, as well as, of course, in its final forms of Graddick and Gradick. It is necessary to remember that these were German-speaking people arriving in an English-speaking colony. All the officials were English, and we can imagine that when a new settler was asked for his name for an official document, and he responded in his guttural German accent, that the official did the best that he could and wrote the name as it sounded. It didn't help matters, of course, that many of the immigrants didn't read or write in any language.

Gradually, as members of the family became better educated the spelling became more standardized; but by then the various branches of the family had spread out into other parts of the young and growing United States, and some of them spelled the name Graddick, and some used Gradick. In May 2002 we found on the Internet a total of 98 phone listings for Graddick, and 54 for Gradick in the U.S.A. We have found the name listed in 26 of the 50 states, with Alabama, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, and Texas accounting for most of them. In South Carolina, all but one is spelled Graddick. In Texas, all but one is spelled Gradick. In the others states it is mixed.


The last time we checked the online international telephone directories, there were 123 listings for Gredig in Germany, and 267 in Switzerland. There was no such name as Gradick or Graddick in either Germany or Switzerland. There are some Gredigs in the United States, but they seem all to be descended from later immigrants.

One thing to be aware of is that although the name was occasionally spelled with a "C" in early documents, this was a misspelling. The name "Cradock" is that of an entirely different family. It is an English name, and is far more common than Gradick. These are two entirely different names and different families.

The Numbering System Used in This Book

The format used for printing this genealogy is called the *Modified Register system*. The immigrant ancestor, Julius Gredig, is assigned the number 1, and each of his descendants is numbered in order after him throughout the entire book. If there is a + in front of the number, it means that the person is carried forward to the next generation where that number will be repeated with further information including a listing of his or her children.

Where there are brackets after a name, with a series of names with numbers and superscripts enclosed, the number is the one assigned to the person, and the superscript is the generation. For example: 388. Wiley North Gradick (205.Henry⁵, 78.John⁴, 13.Christian³, 3.Richard², 1.Julius¹) means that #388 Wiley North Gradick's ancestry goes back through #205 Henry in the 5th generation, to #78 John in the 4th generation, to #13 Christian in the 3rd generation, to #3 Richard in the 2nd generation, to #1 Julius in the 1st generation.

First Generation

1. Julius Gredig.

Julius Gredig appears to have been the forefather of the Gradick/Graddick family in America. We believe that he was among the German-speaking immigrants from Switzerland who arrived at Charleston on February 1, 1737, led by John Tobler and Sebastian Zuberbuehler, and that he settled with his family in the upcountry of South Carolina, in present-day Lexington County.

Over 5000 Germans and Swiss came to South Carolina between 1732 and 1744. South Carolina was an English colony, that had been granted by King Charles II to eight of his loyal subjects in 1663; and they and their successors had held possession until 1729 when King George II bought the rights to the province back from them. Up until that time all the settlements had been on or near the coast, but the king realized the need to settle the "back country" as a buffer against incursions by the French, Spanish and Indians; also the colony needed more people.

Indians; also the colony needed more people, The South Carolina Gazette, August 7 to 14, 1736 especially husbandmen and tradesmen, in order to assure the prosperity of the province. Accordingly he sent a governor out from England with instructions to lay out eleven townships along the main rivers, each one to encompass 20,000 acres of land. The land was to be granted by headright to the head of the family that would settle on it, on the basis of 50 acres for each person in the household, whether man, woman or child, free or slave, black or white. It was stipulated that the grantee or his heirs must agree to cultivate it at the rate of one acre yearly for every 500 acres received, beginning three years after the grant was made; and that they must pay yearly three shillings sterling, or four shillings proclamation money (usually Spanish American silver), for every hundred acres, but not to begin until ten years after the grant was made.

Pamphlets were widely circulated throughout Switzerland to encourage people to join with groups being formed to immigrate to South Carolina. In 1731 Jean Pierre Purry of Neufchatel, Switzerland, was promised by the British government 600 pounds sterling for every 100 men he


could transport from Switzerland to South Carolina. The only conditions were that they had to be Protestant and of good character. Purry's first party, numbering 170, arrived in 1732 and settled at Purrysburg on the Savannah River. There followed many other shiploads during the next twelve years, among them the Tobler party mentioned above.

The reasons we think that Julius Gredig probably came with the Tobler party are:

- 1. He arrived in 1737, the same year as the Tobler party.
- 2. He settled in Saxe-Gotha Township where some of the Tobler party settled.

There is no list of the people who came with Tobler and Zuberbuehler, but there are some manuscripts preserved in the archives at Trogen, Canton Appenzell, Switzerland, comprised of a letter of March 18, 1737, and a portion of a diary from February 11 to March 18, 1737, both by John Tobler. These have been translated and published in The Journal of Southern History, a periodical published quarterly by The Southern Historical Association. We learn from these manuscripts that the party sailed from Falmouth, England, December 5, and landed in Carolina on February 1, that there were more than two hundred persons on board, and that four died during the voyage. In his letter he mentions the names of some of the people, among whom were members of the Giger family, Hans Jacob, Abraham and Herman. This family settled in Saxe-Gotha in the neighborhood of Julius Gredig.

The earliest record to be found of Julius is a plat and description of a tract of land laid out for him in the name of Julius Credy dated September 17, 1737. It appears as follows:



South Carolina, Pursuant to a precept to me directed by James St. John Esq. Surv. General, I have admeasured and laid out unto Julius Credy a tract of land in the limits of Saxegotha Township, on the S.W. side of Santee River in Berkley County containing three hundred acres Butting and bounding to the N.E. on Santee River, to the S. E. on land laid out to John Liver, to the S. W. on land not laid out, and to the N. W. part on land laid out to John Ulrick Shillig and part on Santee River. And also, one Town Lot in the town of Saxegotha, in the township and County aforesaid, containing half of an acre, known in the grand plats of the said town by number seventy three. And each hath such shape and form and marks as appears by the above plats. Certified the 17th day of Sept. 1737 pr me Geo. Haig, D.S.

The river referred to is on today's maps called Congaree and it flows into the Santee. This property is located in present day Lexington County. The D. S. after Mr. Haig's signature stands for deputy surveyor.

We find Julius' name again, only this time as Julius Gredig (not Credy), on the following petition transcribed from the Council Journal of the Secretary of State, dated May 28, 1742 (note mention of the year of arrival):

Read, The Petition of John Gaspar Gallier & Family, John Gaspar Giger, & family, John Shalling & Family, Abram Giger, & family, Jacob Liver & family, Julius Gredig & family Caspar Fry & family, Conrad and Caspar Cuntsler, Jo[hn] Jacob Bieman and Family, Herrman Giger & Family, Eliz. Shalling & Family, Shewing that as they are arrived & settled in his Majesty's Township of SaxGotha, ever since the year 1737 and received his majesty's Bounty, of provision and warrants for lands, in SaxGotha Township, but that they could not find in what office they are, Therefore they humbly pray his Hon. the Lieut Gov and his Majesty's Honourable Court that they would be pleased to order that Search May be made in the proper offices for the Sd (Said) Warrants, to prevent their future (attendence?) and expenses. Whereupon

It was Ordered, That the Commisary do make Search in the Several Offices, after the said warrants, & Sd (Said) ----- Plats, and that he pay the Charges of the Grants

Ten days later, on June 5, 1742 the royal grant to Julius Credy for his three hundred acres was given in the name of King George the Second, signed by the Lieutenant Governor, the Lieutenant Governor in Council, and the Surveyor General, and duly recorded. On this same date there were nineteen other grants recorded for land in the same area in Saxe-Gotha Township. Julius Credy's land was between that of John Liver to the southeast, and John Ulrick Shillig to the northwest. Each householder also received a 1/2 acre lot in the town of Saxe-Gotha. Julius' town lot, number 73 on the plat, was between those of John Liver and Jacob Remensperger.

On our last trip, in March 2002, to South Carolina, we found at the Department of Archives and History, in the Public Register, Deed Book 3-R, pages 366-370, a Release Deed from Moses Kirkland to William Moultrie dated July 31, 1770. Part of this document concerns a transfer of the land that had originally been granted to Julius Credy. It reveals that Jacob (Credy) Gradick had sold the land to Moses Kirkland on the 12th & 13th of June, 1765. The following is a transcription of the part that is of interest to us.

Moses Kirkland To William Moultrie Release

This Indenture made the thirty first day of July in the Year of our Lord one Thousand Seven hundred and Seventy and in the Tenth Year of his majesty's Reign ~ Between Moses Kirkland of Berkley County & province of South Carolina, Gentleman of the one part, And William Moultrie of Charles Town and province aforesaid of the other part. Whereas in and by a Certain Grant Bearing the 5th day of June 1742. Under the hand of William Bull Esquire Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the Province of South Carolina And the Great Seal of the said Province for that purpose appointed Did give and Grant unto Julius Credy A Tract of Land in the Limits of Saxegotha Township Containing Three hundred acres, Butting and Bounding to the North

Eastward on Santee River (otherwise Called the Congaree River) To the South Eastward on Land granted to John Liver, to the South Westward on Vacant Land and to the North Westward part on Saludy River, and Part on Land Laid out to John Ulrick Shillig. And hath such Shapes, forms & Marks as Appear by a platt thereof to the said Grant annexed as in and by the Land platt and Grant, duly Recorded in the Secretary's Office of the said province (reference?) thereunto had, may more fully Appear. And Whereas he the said Julius Credy, died Intestate and without Will, therefore the Right of Inheritance of and in All the said Plantation or Tract of Land containing three hundred acres, with the Premises & Appurtenances Devolved on Jacob Credy Eldest Son and heir at Law of the said Julius Credy, Deceased, ---- on thereunto had more fully appears And Whereas the said Jacob Credy by Indentures of Lease & Release Bearing date the 12th & 13th days of June, Anno Domini 1765 for the consideration therein mentioned did Sell, Convey and Conform All the said Plantation or Tract of three hundred acres of Land Unto Moses Kirkland reference thereunto had may more fully Appear Now this Indenture Witnesseth that the said Moses Kirkland for and in Consideration of the sum of Two hundred and fifty Pounds ~ Current money of the province aforesaid to him in hand Well and Truly paid by the said William Moultrie at and before the sealing and delivery of these present the receipt thereof he doth hereby acknowledge, and to be well Content, Satisfied and paid Have Granted, Bargained, Sold, Aliened, Premised, Released, Conveyed & Confirmed and by these present Do Grant, Bargain, Sell, Alien, Premise, Release, Convey & Confirm unto the said William Moultrie in his actual possession now being by orders of a Bargain and Sale to him thereof made for one whole Year and by force of the Statute for Transforming of uses into possession and to his heirs and assigns forever All that piece or part of Plantation or Tract of Land Containing Two hundred . . . [The rest of the document seems to deal with a different piece of property. There is a large blot across the page making part of it unreadable.]

Until 1791 the law of primogeniture was in effect that specified that if a man died intestate (without a will) his eldest son automatically inherited his real estate. From the above record, we have been able to determine that Jacob Credy (Gradick) was the eldest son of Julius. He is the only child for whom we have positive documented verification of his relationship to Julius. Also we have been able to determine that Julius' date of death was prior to June 12, 1765.

The fact that Julius received a grant of 300 acres indicates that he was head of a family of six persons, since the entitlement was 50 acres per person. We thought that if he had a wife and four children when he arrived in 1737 there might be records in Switzerland of the children's baptisms; but, although we have searched the records of Swiss churches of the period at our local Family History Center of the Mormon Church, we have found nothing so far. There are many Gredigs in the records, but none that fit our family. In the meantime, we have found Jacob Gradick and Richard Gradick in records of the 1760's and 70's. We know that Jacob was a son of Julius; and, we think it probable that Richard was also a son of Julius, and brother of Jacob. There is one other possible child of Julius, Dorothea.



Migrations of the Family in America

In 1737 the Gredig family arrived in South Carolina from their home in Switzerland, and were granted land in the recently formed township of Saxe-Gotha in what is now Lexington County. It was situated along the south side of the Saluda River, and the west side of the Santee (now Congaree).




Second Generation

2. Jacob Gradick Sr. (1.Julius¹) married Mary Metz.

We don't know when Jacob was born, or whether he was born in Switzerland or South Carolina. His father came to South Carolina in 1737, and was granted 300 acres of land based on a headright of 50 acres per person, which indicated that he had six persons in his household. It is tempting to assume that this meant that he had a wife and four children, but we don't know this for sure. Did Jacob come with him—it seems likely—or was he born later? We simply don't know for sure. By tradition he was, himself, an immigrant, so his birth date was probably prior to 1737. We do know for sure that he was a son of Julius, because when his father died without a will, Jacob, as the eldest son, inherited Julius' 300 acres in Saxe-Gotha Township.

Jacob sold the land that he inherited from his father in June 1765. On September 3, 1765, John Troup Esq., Deputy Surveyor General, issued a Precept (writ) to have a tract of land surveyed for Jacob in "Craven County on Cedar Creek" containing 100 acres. The survey was carried out and certified to Jacob Credick on February 21, 1766.² The parcel was described as being on "a branch of Broad River, bounded on all sides by land not yet laid out."

The Governor in Council, James Simpson, signed a grant for the same property, from King George the Third, on December 16, 1766.³

This property would have been in present day Richland County, north of Saxe-Gotha, and on the opposite side of the Broad River. For the next thirty-five years or so the Gradick/Graddick family along with others of the immigrant families would be found in the northwest corner of Richland County, and the southeast corner of Fairfield County, where the two counties border each other. The following is an excerpt from *A History of Richland County*, by Edwin L. Green, published in Baltimore by Regional Publishing Company, 1974, concerning this migration:

Above Columbia settlers were coming, often from the region west of the Broad, and were making their homes along the eastern bank, or on the creeks that flowed into the river. The earliest names are of German origin, or Swiss-German. Christian Kinsler located at the mouth of Crane Creek not long after 1740; Hans Rubesome took up land where Cedar Creek flowed into the Broad (1752). This latter name appeared about this time in its English form of Turnipseed. Faust, Seestrunk, Dancer (Dantzler?), Graddick, Mintz are some of the early names.

We learned the names of the children from *The Leitner Family in Florida* by Fannie Belle (Priest) Kipp. The book includes a section by Fannie Sue (Lever) Turnipseed, great-great-granddaughter of Jacob Gradick Sr., and her nephew, Buford Souter Chappell, that gives information about the children of Jacob Gradick. It also includes the information that Jacob's wife was a Metz. Mr. Robert Leitner, of Hagerstown, Maryland, kindly sent to this author a complete transcribed copy of this book. (Many thanks also to Bob's wife, Pauline. I understand that she typed all of it.) I don't think it is possible to get a copy of this book now, since it was published by the author primarily for family members, but the Ocala, Florida, Public Library has a copy as of September 2002. To quote from this book:

Great Great Grandfather Gradick came from Germany. He mar. a Metz. Issue: 1 Mary Eve Gradick mar. Jacob Leitner, Sr. 2 Katie Gradick m. Nicolas Wyrick 3 John Gradick m. Katie Leitner 4 Andrew Gradick m. Mollie Leitner 5 Christian Gradick went to Charleston, SC 6 Jacob Gradick went to Miss. 7 Daniel Gradick went to GA 8 Ben Gradick.

We are quite sure that Christian Gradick was not a son of Jacob Gradick. We have a copy of Richard Gradick's will in which he names Christian as his son. We have found no evidence other than the above that there might have been any other Christian. Fannie Sue (Lever) Turnipseed, was born in 1874, and she co-authored her part of the book prior to 1953. She would not have known these ancestors of hers personally. There is no mention of a family Bible or other such source; so it may be that the information came just from things that she remembered hearing about. Nevertheless, I don't discount her remembrance. It has been very valuable to us, and I'm sure, in the main part, it is correct. Without it we would never have been able to fit the pieces of this family together; so we are very grateful to her and the other authors of the Leitner family book, and also to Bob Leitner from whom we received a copy.

In the 1790 census Jacob was enumerated in Fairfield County, South Carolina. In the household there were 2 males 16 and over, 3 males under 16, and 3 females. Jacob Jr. was head of his own household in that census, as was his brother, John. If we analyze this, we can see that there is one more male than we would have expected. In addition to Jacob, himself, there is one male of 16 years and upwards. This might have been Benjamin, or perhaps it could have been Christian or Randolph, one of the sons of Jacob's deceased brother, Richard. Since Richard died in April 1773, his youngest child could have been 16 or 17 years old in 1790. If Jacob raised his brother's children, this would explain why Fannie Sue (Lever) Turnipseed thought that Christian was a son of Jacob.

There is one other place where we found most of Jacob's children named, and that is in the estate papers of Catherine Gradick of Claiborne County, Mississippi, daughter of Jacob Gradick Jr. and Catharine Turnipseed (see # 22, Catherine Gradick). Catherine died without a will; and having no husband or children, parents, brothers or sisters, nieces or nephews, her estate fell to her first cousins or their descendants on both sides of her family, Gradick and Turnipseed. On the Gradick side they are: "Daniel Gradick, Hamilton (county of Harrison [sic]) state of Georgia; the children and heirs at law of John Gradick, deceased; the children and heirs at law of Katy Wyrick, deceased; the children and heirs at law of Andrew Gradick, deceased; the children and heirs at law of Mary Lightner [Mary Eve Gradick], deceased." The only one of Jacob's children omitted is Benjamin.

Jacob died intestate, probably in 1803, leaving 150 acres of land on Cedar Creek and 150 on Broad River. We were not able to find any deeds or other evidence of how or when he acquired the additional 200 acres. We did examine the microfilmed records of his estate papers at the South Carolina Department of Archives and History. His son, Jacob Graddick Jr., was appointed administrator of his estate on May 21, 1803. Adam Hamiter, Jacob Turnipseed, George Lightner Jr., Jacob Gradick Jr., John Gradick, and Nicholas Wirick were the appraisers. Included in the inventory, that was valued at \$1,678.70, were 4 Negroes, Lidia, Jane, Rubin, and Simon, \$900.00; 150 acres on Broad River, \$150.00; and 150 acres on Cedar Creek, \$150.00. The sale was held on June 21, 1803. Among the buyers were Mary Gradick, widow (this gave us the given name of Jacob's wife), Jacob Gradick, John Gradick, Nicholas Wyrick, Andrew Gradick, Sophia Murph, Bat Turnipseed, and Benj. Gradick. There was a copy of an account filed in Richland District on November 24, 1806, reading, "Jacob Gradick appeared before me and made oath that this is a just and true account of his proceedings as Administrator to the Estate of Jacob Gradick Dec'd. Sworn before me, James L. Guignard, Ordinary." It was also signed Jacob X Gradick, where the X represented Jacob Jr.'s mark. There were no records in the files that we examined to account for how Jacob's estate was distributed; however, the laws supporting primogeniture had been abolished in 1791, and according to the laws in effect in 1803, the widow was entitled to one third of the estate, with the remainder being divided among the children.

Jacob's family is not in the 1800 census of Fairfield County, and Richland County census is missing. In the 1810 census Mary "Graddick" was enumerated as head of a household in Columbia Township, Richland County, having one male age 16 to 26, one female over age 45,

and two slaves. John Graddick was listed on the line immediately above his mother's, and Jacob Leitner, husband of her daughter, Mary Eve, was on the next line after Mary. "Dan'l Graddick" was on the same page, and Andrew was on a different page in the same township and county. Of her sons, only Benjamin was not a head of household. If he was the male living with his mother, it seems likely that his age is incorrect, since he was listed as 45 and up in 1820.

Children:

- + 5. i **Jacob Gradick Jr.**, born about 1761-1765.
- + 6. ii **John Gradick**, born about 1761-1765.
- + 7. iii Catherine (Katie) Gradick, born January 9, 1772.
- + 8. iv Mary Eve Gradick, born 1773.
 - 9. v **Benjamin Gradick**, born about 1775.

Benjamin was enumerated in the 1820 census of Richland County as head of a household in which there was 1 male age 45 and up, 3 males under 10, 1 female age 26-45 and 2 females under 10. Benjamin would have to be the male age 45 and up, which would make his birth year 1775 or earlier. This is the only time that his name appears in a census in South Carolina. Also it is noteworthy that in the distribution of the estate of his cousin Catherine, daughter of Jacob Jr., Benjamin is the only one of her father's siblings or their surviving heirs who is omitted. We have found no further reference to Benjamin.

It may be that one of Benjamin's three boys was **Phillip Gradick**. Phillip Gradick was indentured to Benjamin Gradick's brother-in-law, Nicholas Wyrick. In his will, dated January 27, 1827, Nicholas wrote, "My boy Phillip Graddick whom I have in view to be bound to me until he is twenty-one years of age, should I die before he shall have served his time, my executors will dispose of him as they may judge best and see that my obligation is fulfilled." Nicholas died August 4, 1833. (See notes with #7, Catherine (Katie) Gradick.)

Phillip Gradick was enumerated in Fairfield County in 1840, age 20 to 30. The only other person in the home was a female, age 40 to 50.

In 1850 Phillip was in Richland District, South Carolina, at age 33, along with his wife, Elizabeth, age 32, and three children, **Mary Gradick**, **Jesse Gradick** and **William G. Gradick**, ages 11, 9 and 7. There was also a one-year-old child named William Smith in the home with them.

On July 4, 1860, Phillip and his wife, Elizabeth, were enumerated in Columbia City, Richland County, along with Mary Hall, age23. This may have been their daughter, Mary. The other children are missing from this census. Phillip's occupation was well digger. Just sixteen days later, on July 20, Phillip was killed

"by the falling of a bucket of mud on his head, in a well, which he was cleaning out."

The reason for thinking that Phillip may have been a son of Benjamin is that Benjamin's family is the only one of the Gradick's of that period not accounted for; and Philip could easily have been one of the males under 10 in the 1920 census.

- 3. **Richard Gradick** (1.Julius¹) was the probable son of Julius Gredig who came to America in 1737. As with Jacob, we do not know the date of Richard's birth, or whether he was born in Switzerland and came as a child with his family to South Carolina, or whether he was born in South Carolina. We do not know Richard's wife's maiden name, only that her given name was Elizabeth since Richard called her that in his will.

In the Journal of His Majesty's Council, at the South Carolina Department of Archives and History, dated September 6, 1763, there is quite a long list of petitioners for "warrants of Survey of Land, prolonging a warrant & Certifying Lapsed plats." The name Richard Cridick is listed as one of those petitioners, applying for 50 acres on Cedar Creek, Broad River. We found nothing to show whether or not the petition was granted. It does, however, indicate that Richard was adult by 1763, and was interested in acquiring land in the Cedar Creek area.

In the Council Journal of Tuesday, August 2, 1768, we find another list of petitioners for "Warrants of Survey and Certifying Platts" that includes Richard Gradick for 150 acres on Broad River. We don't know whether this petition was granted or not at this time or whether it was delayed. It might be one of the tracts platted to him in 1771 (see below).

The next records we have of Richard are land plats in 1771 and 1772 when he had four parcels of land platted to him. They were 150 acres on September 27, 1771 on the Broad River in Craven County; 200 acres on November 12, 1771 on the Broad River in Craven County; 150 acres on November 13, 1771 on Broad River in Craven County; and 150 acres on May 11, 1772 on Broad River and Cedar Creek in Craven County, bordering in part on land of Jacob Gradick.⁷

The next documents are the actual royal land grants of the same parcels by King George the Third, signed by the Governor in Council of South Carolina in May and December of 1772. The conditions that had to be met in order that the grants might not lapse were that the grantee or his heirs must pay three shillings sterling, or four shillings proclamation money, for every hundred acres, to the Receiver-General each year beginning two years after the grant was signed; and also that three acres each year must be cleared and cultivated for every hundred acres received.⁸

These records are followed by what is called the memorials, which in effect is a registration in the auditor's office of the grants, and the amount of money to be paid annually. We might think of this annual payment, called a quit rent, as equivalent to a property tax. The memorials were filed in 1772.

Last we have his will, dated April 9, 1773, in which he said, ".... being very Sick & Weak in Body but of perfect Mind & Memory . . . " he bequeathed his property to his wife, Elizabeth, and his three sons, Richard, Christian and Randolph. He signed with his mark. ¹⁰ In the Journals of the Court of Ordinary there is a dedimus (writ) issued on April 26, 1773, to Wm. Arthur, Esq. to prove the will of Richard Creadick, Dec'd. Richard must have died between April 9 and April 26 of 1773. The will was proved on May 18, 1773. An inventory of his personal property, valued at 3,430 pounds, 5 shillings, 8 pence, was made on June 30, 1773. Included were six slaves valued at 1880 pounds. ¹¹

He appointed as one of his executors, Herman Cintzler (Kinsler), my brother. This is the son of Conrad and Dorothea (Gredig?) Kinsler. (See notes with # 4, Dorothea Gredig, for discussion of possible relationship.)

If we total just the four grants that he received in 1771 and 1772, they total 650 acres. At 100 acres for himself, and 50 acres for each additional person in the household, this implies that there were twelve persons in the household. By counting Richard, Elizabeth, their three sons, and the six slaves that he left in his will, we know of eleven persons.

In 1790, the first census of the new United States of America was taken. There were a total of four households headed by persons with the surname of Gradick, all of them in South Carolina. The family heads were Gradick, Jacob; Gradick, Jacob Jun^r; Gradick, John; and Gradock, (Widow). There were two males under the age of sixteen and one slave living with the widow. She was probably Elizabeth; but the ages of the two males would be inaccurate since it was over seventeen years since Richard had died. It could have been the widow of Richard, Jr. (see discussion below).

Children:

12. i **Richard Gradick Jr.** witnessed the signing of a will by William Strother of Camden District on May 16, 1779. On January 9, 1783, this will was proved by Richard Gradick who swore to the signatures of Christian Kinsler and Drury Andrew, the other witnesses. ¹² If Richard Jr. was at least 21 when he was a witness to this will, he would have been born prior to May 16, 1758.



Richard died intestate, probably in 1788, as Herman Kinsler Jr. was appointed administrator of his estate on May 20, 1788. We found a microfilm copy of a receipt signed by Christian Gradick at the South Carolina archives. It was signed Ch. Gradick, and it was to Herman Kinsler for Christian's part of the "Estate of my Brother Richard's Estate". It was dated Aug 18, 1790. Randolph signed on Feb 15, 1794, a receipt for "Nine Pounds, nineteen Shillings, and Six Pence Stirling in full" payment for his share in his brother's estate. Richard was named first in his father's will. If his father named his sons in the order of their births, this would make him the eldest.



It is possible that Richard Jr. was married at the time of his death. The laws of descent and distribution in effect at that time provided that if he had a wife and no children, his personal property would be divided one part to his widow and the other part to the "next of kindred". If he had a widow and children, his personal property would be divided 1/3 to his widow and the remainder to the child or children. Therefore he must not have had children or Christian and Randolph would not have inherited.

- + 13. ii Christian Gradick, born about 1769.
 - 14. iii Randolph Gradick, probably born about 1773.

There seems to be very little to be found about Randolph. He was the third mentioned of the three sons in his father's will; and when his brother Richard died, Randolph didn't receive his final share of his brother's estate until February 15 of 1794, three and a half years after Christian received his. Does this mean that Randolph was the youngest, and perhaps was not twenty-one, of legal age to inherit, until about February of 1794? This is likely. It was the law that a guardian be appointed to look after the inheritance of a minor until he reached his majority. Randolph may have been an infant when his father died.

4. **Dorothea Gredig** (1.Julius¹) married **Conrad Kinsler** about 1738, in Broad River, Berkely County, South Carolina. He was baptized February 14, 1709, at St. Margrethen, Canton Gallen, Switzerland, ¹⁵ and died before January 19, 1770, in Craven County, South Carolina. Dorothea died after March 12, 1767.

In his will, Conrad Kunzler (Kinsler) referred to his "dearly beloved wife" as Dorothea, ¹⁶ but there is some doubt, at least in the mind of this compiler, about whether or not she was a Gredig. We have found nothing to document for sure that there ever was a Dorothea Gredig who lived in South Carolina. There are various internet web sites with researchers of families descended from Conrad and Dorothea Kinsler, such as the Turnipseeds, Kinslers and Hamiters, who give the name of Conrad's wife as Dorothea Gredig, but whenever I have e-mailed a submitter of the data to enquire of the source for this claim, I either don't get a reply at all or, more frequently, the source is one of the other web sites; and so the questionable is passed on for fact. That is not to say that I discredit this claim. As a matter of fact, I believe that it is possible, even probable, that Dorothea was indeed a Gredig. There may be a Bible record somewhere in private hands; or maybe it is just that it is part of the oral history of the Kinsler family that has been passed down through the generations. In either case, to cite such a source would lend weight to the claim, and we would be very pleased to know about it. Since this claim has been so widely accepted, I feel that I cannot simply leave Dorothea out of this current genealogy. Instead, I will present the facts as I know them, and then make a supposition or two.

First of all, we think that Conrad traveled to America with the same party as the Gredig family, that is the Tobler party, since he was one of those, along with Julius Gredig, whose name is affixed to the 1742 petition to the Secretary of State, in which the petitioners said, "... that as they are arrived & settled in his Majesty's Township of SaxGotha, ever since the year 1737..." (see notes with Julius Gredig). Also he took up land in the same vicinity as the Gredigs. The precept for the survey for his first 50 acres was issued on February 28, 1739. The property was located in Saxe-Gotha Township in Berkeley County, on the west side of the Santee River. ¹⁷ So there was proximity, an important factor in bringing about a marriage.

But to me, the most convincing evidence is found in the will of Richard Gradick, Senior. Richard names, as one of his executors, "Herman Cintzsler, my brother" [Herman Kinsler was a son of Conrad and Dorothea]. Why did he call Herman Kinsler his brother?

Now for the suppositions:

Dorothea and Richard could both be the children of Julius; that would make Herman Richard's nephew. They seem to be close to the same age; so, maybe if they grew up as close companions, Richard might use the term, brother, to describe him.

Or, maybe Julius and Dorothea were brother and sister, and Richard was Julius' son, and Herman was Dorothea's son. That would make Richard and Herman first cousins. Sometimes, in the past, the term brother was used to include a cousin; but I haven't found this to be common among these Swiss-German immigrants. Nevertheless it is possible.

Or, maybe Julius and Dorothea were brother and sister, and Julius had a daughter, Elizabeth, who married Herman, her first cousin, a fairly common occurrence at that time. This would make Herman a brother-in-law to Richard. This might be the most likely scenario. It was common to refer to a brother-in-law as brother, and Julius certainly could have had a daughter that we don't have a record of.

We may never know, but whatever the relationship was, it seems that we can be sure, indeed, that there was a close relationship between these two families.

As noted above, Conrad was issued a precept for 50 acres in 1739 in Saxe-Gotha Township. Fifty acres was the allotment for a single man, but by 1739 he was a married man as is evidenced by the fact that Conrad and Dorothea Kunster were witnesses to a land purchase by Herman Geeger in that year. ¹⁸

On December 10, 1744, a precept for 250 acres was issued to Conrad. 19

On January 23, 1747/8, Conrad Kuntzler, having obtained a warrant for land on 10 December 1744, prayed that, having now 1 child more in family, 50 acres might be added to his former warrant for 250 acres in Forks of Santee River.²⁰

On March 17, 1748, another precept was issued to him for 450 acres on the Broad River and Wilkinson Creek. This was surveyed on November 20, 1749. In the Council Journal for 1749, Conrad stated that he had a wife and seven children under the age of sixteen.²¹

Third Generation

5. **Jacob Gradick Jr.** (2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born about 1761-1765 at Cedar Creek, Craven County, South Carolina, and died about 1808. He married **Catharine Turnipseed** (# 104 in this genealogy), probably in 1787, in South Carolina. She was born December 9, 1767 (daughter of Hans Rebsamen Sr. and Catherine Kinsler—Rebsamen later became Turnipseed). She died June 20, 1849, in Claiborne County, Mississippi, and is buried in the Gradick Family Cemetery, near Port Gibson in Claiborne County. ¹

In 1788 the name "Jacob Gradick jun." was one of those affixed to a petition for incorporation of The German Protestant Church of Appii Forum at Cedar Creek. All Protestant churches in South Carolina had been allowed freedom of worship during Colonial times, but the Church of England was the established church, and the only one with a state charter. In 1788 a law was passed permitting, for the first time, Protestant churches, other than the Church of England, to apply for incorporation. Accordingly, in that year, fifteen "German Protestant congregations in the back country of the State" applied "to be incorporated by Law, and to be styled by that General Name of THE ECCLESIASTICAL UNION OF THE SEVERAL GERMAN PROTESTANT CONGREGATIONS DISBURSED ABROAD IN THE BACK PARTS OF THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA." Appii Forum was one of these churches. This was also the year that Jacob's first child was born.

In 1790 Jacob Jr. was enumerated in Fairfield County, Camden District, as head of a household having 1 male age 16 and up, 1 male under 16 and 2 females.

Mr. Crawford gives the location of the Gradick Family Cemetery as follows: Go northeast from Port Gibson on Highway 18 toward Hermanville [author's note: an earlier report gave the cemetery as about 4 miles from Port Gibson]. A side road is marked Old Hwy. 18, #2. Go 8/10 of one mile on this road. On the right side of the road is an old abandoned road known as Old Oil Well Road that is not marked. The said road and adjoining land are posted with a sign, "Keep Out." Go about 200 feet on this old road. On the right side and on a steep bank is the old Gradick Cemetery. [Author's note: We did not attempt to visit this cemetery in September 2002, as we were warned about mosquitoes and ticks and poisonous snakes at that time of year.]

We know that Jacob was still in South Carolina in late 1806, since he appeared before James L. Guignard, Ordinary, and presented an account of his administration of his father's estate on November 24 of that year (see notes with Jacob Gradick Sr.)

Soon after this, probably in 1807 or 1808, Jacob and Catharine and their seven children, ages about 19 to 2, left for Mississippi Territory. Their final destination was near Port Gibson in Claiborne County, about half way between Vicksburg and Natchez, just east of the Mississippi River. They probably traveled overland, although such a trip was an arduous, even hazardous, undertaking at that early period in the nation's history; however the only other way to go would have been by ship from Charleston, down the coast, through the Straits of Florida, into the Gulf of Mexico to New Orleans, and then either by boat up the Mississippi, or on foot to their destination. Since there were very few roads into the Mississippi Territory at that time, it is possible to reconstruct their most likely route. They presumably took the Fall Line Road that passed near Columbia, South Carolina, and led to Augusta, Georgia, and then on to the Creek Indian Agency on the west side of the Ocmulgee River near present-day Macon, Georgia. At that time the Ocmulgee River was the border between the United States and the Creek Indian Nation; and in order to pass through the Creek Nation, a U.S. citizen had to have a passport. Passports were obtainable from any governor of a U.S. state. In November 1805, the Creeks had signed a treaty with the government at Washington to allow the United States the right to a horse path through the Creek country from the Ocmulgee to the Mobile. This was the path that the Gradick family would have followed as far as Burnt Corn Springs in what is to-day Alabama. There they would have cut off on a road called Three Chopped Way that led to Natchez, Mississippi. Three Chopped Way got its name from the system of blazes that the surveyors used to direct travelers along the route.³

Most of Mississippi, including the locale of Port Gibson, had been ceded to the United States by Spain in 1795. In 1798 the Territory of Mississippi was formed. In 1802 Claiborne County was the third county to be established in the territory. Gibson's Landing, later known as Port Gibson, was chartered as the county seat in 1803. In 1804 Lorenzo Dow, the famous Methodist circuit rider, wrote in his journal that Port Gibson had thirty houses, a court house, and a jail.⁴

Very soon after arrival, the family was to be bereft of husband and father. We don't know the exact date of Jacob's death, but we took a trip to Mississippi in September 2002 and visited the courthouse and library there. One of the documents that we found at the courthouse was an appraisal of Jacob's estate, dated January 14, 1809. From this we have estimated his year of death as 1808.

The total amount of the appraisal was \$1,016.25. This included a wagon appraised at \$150, one negro boy Reuben \$500, one black horse \$70, one bay horse \$72.50, one sorrel horse \$30, two rifle guns \$35, one lot of English books \$4, one lot of Dutch (German) books\$.50, feather beds

and other furniture, two trunks, a loom, two flax wheels, iron farming tools, cooper's tools, saddle bags and curry comb.

In the 1810 Territorial census of Claiborne County, the family was enumerated with Catherine as head of the household and with 1 male over age 21, 2 males under 21, 1 female over 21 (this would be Catharine), 4 females under 21 and 1 slave.

In the 1816 Mississippi Territorial census, the family reported 1 male over 21, 2 males under 21, 3 females over 21, 2 females under 21 and 1 slave.

In the 1820 Federal census, in the Gradick household, there was one male age 16-18, two males 16-26, one male 26-45, one female 10-16, two females 16 to 26, one female 26-45, and one female 45 and over, and no slaves (we wonder what happened to Reuben). We note that there was one extra male in the family that year, but do not know who it was.

In 1830, there were three males and five females, and the family held 19 slaves.

On March 30, 1833, Catharine Sr. acquired 281 acres of land in Claiborne County, described as being the North half of Fractional Section 5 in Township 11 of Range 3 East. This land was offered for sale by auction to the highest bidder at the courthouse door at Port Gibson by Copeland McKee of Yazoo County, acting as guardian for Margaret Manning, a minor. "Richard Gradick, being the highest and best bidder therefore, he bidding as agent for his mother, Catharine Graddick sen^r the sum of Fourteen hundred and eighty Dollars became the purchaser thereof for the said Catharine."

In 1834, Richard, Obadiah and Catharine were on the Claiborne County Tax List.⁷

In 1838, Susan married Thompson White.

By 1850, Catharine Sr. had died, ⁸ preceded by all three of her sons and her daughter, Susan. That left daughters Catharine, Mary and Frances to run the, by now, sizable plantations. In the regular population census of that year Mary was living alone as head of her household. In the household next to her was Frances who had a family living with her, Thos. B. White, age 35, Eveline Collins, age 36, Wiley Collins, age 8, and Banda Collins (female), age 6. In the next house was Catharine living alone. The value of the real estate was \$4,200 for Mary, \$4,000 for Frances, \$7,000 for Catharine. In addition to the regular population census that year, a census was also taken of all the slaves. The name of the owner was recorded and only the age, sex, and

color of each slave (no name). The slave schedules showed Mary with 27 slaves, Frances with 65 slaves, and Catharine with 33.

In 1853, on the Assessment Roll of Personal Property for Claiborne County, appeared the estates of Catharine Sr., Richard, Jeremiah, and Obadiah. Catharine's estate was assessed for one pleasure carriage, valued at \$100, 1 watch \$50, 1 clock \$5, No. of Cattle over 20 head 40, and 69 slaves under age 60. Richard's estate was assessed for 1 clock valued at \$25 and 28 slaves under age 60. Jeremiah's estate was assessed for 25 slaves under age 60. Obadiah's estate was assessed for 1 clock valued at \$5, No. of Cattle over 20 head 20, and 20 slaves under age 60.

In 1855 Mary died, leaving only Catharine and Frances (Kate and Fanny as they were called in the census of 1860). Their cousin Turner Graddick's two sons, Griffing and A. E., had come from Georgia to Mississippi to act as overseers for them, and were each listed as head of a household next to the two ladies' houses. The value of real estate for Frances was \$20,000, and of personal property, \$150,000. For Catharine, her real estate was valued at \$12,000, and personal property \$80,000. The date of this enumeration was June 14, 1860. In less than seven months the first shot of the American Civil War would be fired at Fort Sumter, South Carolina. Of Jacob and Catharine Gradick's family, only their daughter Catharine would be left when the war was over, and even she survived it by only three to four months. We have found no indication that any of the children but Susan of this family ever married.

Children:

21. i **Richard Gradick** was born June 21, 1788, in Fairfield County, South Carolina, and died September 20, 1847 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. He is buried in the Gradick Family Cemetery, Claiborne County, Mississippi. ¹¹

He served as a private in Colonel Claiborne's Regiment of the Mississippi Militia during the War of 1812, from Sept. 17, 1812, to Mar 17, 1833. 12

On August 1, 1833, during the Andrew Jackson administration, Richard purchased 163.83 acres of public land in Claiborne County described as being, "lots numbered One and Two of Section One in Township Eleven, of Range Three East". 13

22. ii **Catharine Gradick** was born September 11, 1791, in Fairfield County, South Carolina, and died August 5, 1865, in Claiborne County, Mississippi. She is buried in the Gradick Family Cemetery, Claiborne County, Mississippi. 14

Catharine was the last survivor of her family; and less than two months after the death of her sister, Frances, she began to divest herself of most of her real property. These were turbulent times. The first shot of the Civil War had been fired on January 9, 1861; and on that same date, Mississippi seceded from the Union. On January 1, 1863, the Emancipation Proclamation, issued by President Abraham Lincoln, took effect. On May 1 of that same year, 24,000 Federal troops under the command of General Ulysses S. Grant met and defeated 8,000 Confederate troops at Port Gibson. Port Gibson itself was spared, as General Grant is reported to have said that it was "too beautiful to burn." We can be thankful for that, because all the old records are still available in the courthouse for our use and the use of anyone else who has an interest in them. We have no way of knowing the specific effects of the war on Catharine and Francis, but, of course, with Federal troops in their own area, and with the emancipation of the slaves having been proclaimed, their lives must have been turned upside down.

On June 20, 1863, Catharine transferred for love and affection, and for the further consideration of the sum of ten dollars, a tract of land containing 970 acres to Sarah Graddick, wife of Griffing Graddick. This tract had been previously purchased by Obadiah Gradick from Thompson White (see notes with Obadiah below). It was described as "bounded on the North by lands now owned by James Murray & Benjamin G. Humphreys, on the East by lands now owned by the said party of the first part [Catharine Gradick] known as the Marles tract, on the South

by lands now owned by Wm. T. Magruder, and on the West by lands now owned by Mrs. Irene Smith." ¹⁵

On July 15, 1863, Catharine transferred for love and affection and for the further consideration of the sum of ten dollars, a tract of land, known as the McNeil Tract, containing 731 acres to Abraham Turnipseed¹⁶ (# 224 in this genealogy). Abraham was Catharine's first cousin. His father, Jacob Turnipseed, was a brother to Catharine's mother.

On May 17, 1865, Catharine transferred for the love and affection "she . . . has for her relative" and for the further consideration of the sum of ten dollars, a tract of land containing $395^{55/100}$ acres to David B. Turnipseed¹⁷ (probably # 225 in this genealogy, and brother of Abram), being part of Catharine Gradick's plantation known as the "Pine Woods" Plantation. Part of the indenture reads, "It is also intended by the grantor herein to convey to said party of the second part [David B. Turnipseed] and to his heirs, all her right, title, claim and interest to any and all other land belonging to and included in said plantation not heretofore conveyed by deed to other parties." Part of this land adjoined that of Abram Turnipseed.

In spite of Catherine having made these large grants of land; nevertheless, she did not make a will to dispose of her remaining assets after her death. The result was that an administrator of her estate had to be appointed, and her nearest of kin sought out in order to distribute her final estate according to law. Griffing C. Graddick was appointed administrator. Her nearest of kin were the brothers and sisters of both of her parents or their heirs.

At the October Term, 1866, of the Probate Court of Claiborne County, Mississippi, concerning the estate of Catherine Gradick, deceased, the court approved the report filed at the July 1866 term by Griffing C. Graddick, administrator of the estate, "accounting for the amount of money and the gold watch & jewelry reported to have been stolen," and discharged him from further accounting. [This discharge must have referred to the inventory of personal property only, since Griffing continued to administer the estate]. It was "further ordered by the Court that said Administrator have leave & do cause to be erected suitable tombstones to the graves of Catherine & Fanny Graddick as prayed for in his petition accompanying said report, and that he charge the estate with the same." 18

On the 29th day of April 1868 at the Probate Court of Claiborne County, Mississippi, the following was entered into the minutes:¹⁹

Estate of Catharine Graddick, Deceased} Griffing C. Graddick, Administrator of the Estate of Catharine Graddick, deceased, having filed his

final account as administrator as aforesaid in this court on the 26th day of February 1868, and having made affidavit of the nonresidence of certain alledged [sic] heirs of said Estate and of their residences so far as the same can be learned.

It is ordered by the Court that said Final Accounting be continued and set for hearing on the third day of the next May Term of this Court being the 28th day of May A.D. 1868, Term of this Court and it appearing that of said alledged[sic] heirs, Daniel Graddick resides in the State of Georgia, and that his Post Office is Hamilton, Harris County, Georgia, The children and heirsat-law of John Graddick, deceased, to wit - Jacob, Elias, David, John, Elizabeth & Catharine Graddick, who resides in the State of South Carolina & whose Post Office is believed to be Columbia or Cedar Creek in said State, The children and heirs-at-law of Katy Wyrick, deceased, to wit; Jesse, Ann, Rebecca, Elizabeth, Catharine & Mary Wyrick, who also reside in South Carolina & whose Post Office is believed to be Cedar Creek or Columbia in said State, David Hamiter, the only child and heir-at-law of the wife of Adam Hamiter, whose Post Office and residence is believed to be at Columbia in said State of South Carolina, the said wife of Adam Hamiter being deceased and her Christian name unknown, The children and heirs-at-law of Andrew Graddick, deceased, to wit; Henry, Timothy, Nathan, Mary Elizabeth, Sibil & Fanny Graddick whose Post Office and residence is believed to be at Columbia, South Carolina, excepting Henry Graddick, whose Post Office and residence is believed to be Micanopy, in the State of Florida, The children and heirs-at-law of the late wife of Jacob Turnipseed, deceased, whose Christian name is unknown To Wit – Abram Turnipseed residing in this county – David, Joseph & Nancy Turnipseed, residing in the State of Georgia or Alabama, The children and heirs-at-law of Bartholomew Turnipseed, deceased, whose Christian name is unknown to wit; George & Mary Turnipseed whose residence & Post Office is believed to be at Columbia, State of South Carolina; and other children of the wife of said Bartholomew Turnipseed whose names are unknown but who are supposed to reside in Pickens County, State of Alabama whose Post Offices are unknown, The children and heirs-at-law of Mary Leightner, deceased, to wit – David, Jacob, Daniel, Elizabeth, Mary, Nancy, Margaret & Susan Leightner, whose Post Office address is believed to be Columbia, State of South Carolina, The children, grand Children & heirs-at-law of John R. Turnipseed, deceased, to wit; Matthew whose residence & Post Office is believed to be in Merriwether County in the State of Georgia, the precise place being unknown, and the children and heirs-at-law of Harris Turnipseed, deceased, son of said John R. Turnipseed to wit, Berkley S., Harris W. & Clifton P. Turnipseed and Laura Briley & her husband Benjamin F. Briley, supposed to reside in Pike County in this State & whose Post Office is Holmesville.

It is ordered by the Court that Publication be made for said parties in the Port Gibson Standard, a newspaper published in this County once a week for four consecutive weeks requiring said parties and all unknown heirs of said Catharine Graddick, deceased, to be and personally appear on said 28th day of May 1868 the 3rd day of said term at the Court House of this County and enter their appearance in this cause and shew cause if any they can, why said

Final Account should not be allowed, and a decree made accordingly, And it is further ordered that the Clerk of this Court do give notices to said parties by mail according to law and as per affidavit filed –

Ordered adjudged and decreed this 29th

day of April 1868

The minutes of the May 1868 term of the Probate Court of Claiborne County, Mississippi, state that the orders of the court regarding the publication and mailing of the above citations having been carried out, and that "no person appearing and objecting thereto . . . it is decreed that said Final Account be . . . allowed shewing a balance of Five Thousand Four Hundred and Eighty-Three Dollars & fifty three cents . . . for distribution, of which \$3,525.00 is in specie fund and \$1,958.53 is in currency." It was ordered that the administrator pay over the total in nine equal shares of \$391.66 in specie and \$217.61 in currency to Daniel Graddick, to the heirs of John Graddick, to the heirs of Katy Wyrick, to the heirs of Daniel Hamiter, to the heirs of Andrew Graddick, to the heirs of Jacob Turnipseed, to the heirs of Bartholomew Turnipseed, to the heirs of Mary Leightner, and to the heirs of John R. Turnipseed.

In 1869 the same heirs were notified and notices published in the Port Gibson Standard, only this time it was in regard to 750 acres of land owned by the estate.²¹ This tract was bordered on the "west by lands of Sarah Graddick, wife of G. C. Graddick," and was described as being known as the "Thompson White" place. (See above note, dated June 20, 1863, for reference to this land as the Marles Tract.) Abram Turnipseed was administrator for this part of the estate.

On December 6, 1869, this land was sold at auction at the door of the courthouse for \$6000.00 to Maria H. Magruder, the highest bidder. ²² On December 30, 1869, the court ordered payment of \$161. 60 costs, \$600.00 in legal fees, and \$428.80 taxes to the Internal Revenue Tax Collector. ²³ The balance was presumably disbursed to the heirs; although we ran out of time and did not examine any more documents.

- 23. iii **Mary Gradick** was born April 6, 1795, in Fairfield County, South Carolina and died June 12, 1855, in Claiborne County, Mississippi. She is buried in the Gradick Family Cemetery, Claiborne County, Mississippi. ²⁴
- 24. iv **Jeremiah Gradick** was born October 19, 1797, in Fairfield County, South Carolina and died July 25, 1848, in Claiborne County, Mississippi. He is buried in the Gradick Family Cemetery, Claiborne County, Mississippi. 25
- 25. v **Obadiah Gradick** was born October 26, 1800, in Fairfield County, South Carolina and died May 6, 1847, in Claiborne County, Mississippi. He is buried in the Gradick Family Cemetery, Claiborne County, Mississippi. ²⁶

- On May 22, 1840, Obadiah purchased 970 acres of land from his brother-in-law, Thompson White.
- 26. vi **Susan Gradick** was born July 1, 1803, in Fairfield County, South Carolina and died March 21, 1847. She is buried in the White Family Cemetery, Claiborne County, Mississippi.²⁷ She married **Thompson White**, April 12, 1838, in Claiborne County, Mississippi.²⁸ He was born March 29, 1784, and died June 3, 1846. He is buried in the White Family Cemetery, Claiborne County, Mississippi.

Thompson White had been married before to Susan Herring on January 13, 1822.²⁹ In the 1830 census, his name was the eighth name listed after that of Richard Gradick (Graddock in that census). There were in the household 1 male age 40 to 50, 2 ages 15 to 20, 1 age 5 to 10, and no females. This suggests that his first wife had died prior to the enumeration date in 1830, leaving at least three sons.

In the 1840 census, the name of Thompson White was listed third after Mrs. C. "Graddick", and ninth after Richd. "Graddick", with 1 male 50 to 60, and 1 female 30 to 40.

- 27. vii Frances Gradick (sometimes written Francis) was born February 19, 1805 in Fairfield County, South Carolina and died April 24, 1863, 30 in Claiborne County, Mississippi. She is buried in the Gradick Family Cemetery, Claiborne County, Mississippi. There is also a tombstone for Frances in a second Gradick cemetery. 31
- 6. **John Gradick Sr.** (2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born 1761-1765. He married **Catherine (Katie) Leitner**. She was born 1770-1780³³ (daughter of George Lightner). Katie died December 1847 in Richland County, South Carolina. John died 1830-1840 in Richland County.

On February 8, 1789, John was a witness to the will of Christian Kinsler, a son of Conrad and Dorothea (Gredig?) Kinsler.³⁴

In the 1790 census of Richland County in Camden District, South Carolina, John was head of a household having 1 male age 16 and upward, 2 males under 16, and 3 females.

In the 1810 census John was of age 45 and upward, which means that he was born 1765 or earlier. Twenty years later we would expect him to be age 65 and upward. Actually in the 1830 census he was age of 60 and under 70; so, if the census returns are accurate as regards his age, we could estimate his birth year as between 1761 and 1765.

In 1815 he and Herman Kinsler, another son of Conrad and Dorothea Kinsler, were executors of the will of Adam Coon, Richland District, South Carolina.³⁵

John is not in the 1840 census, but Catherine is listed as head of household. John must have died between 1830 and 1840.

Catherine died in December of 1847 as shown by a petition for Citation that was filed in February 1848 by David Gradick who "sheweth that his mother Catherine Gradick died intestate in December last." The children are all named, and also named are the five children of her son John Jr., deceased. David was appointed administrator of his mother's estate. David, Elias, and Jacob Gradick all posted bond. The inventory included a cow, buffalo and yearling, valued at \$9; a Negro man, Willis \$550; a Negro man, Moses \$600; a Negro woman, Lucy \$450; a Negro boy Shedrick \$150; a Negro woman, Mary \$25. In February 1849 David filed a final accounting with the court, showing that he had distributed \$335 to each of his five siblings and \$334.39 to himself, with a balance remaining in his hands of \$335 for the minor children of his brother John. The total was \$2,524.25. [This doesn't quite add up.] The real estate was sold for \$808.52, and was divided into seven shares of \$115.52 each. Catherine and Christena purchased the land on May 1, 1848 for \$800 with interest payable January 1, 1849.

Of the children, John Jr. died in 1847 the year before his mother, leaving a wife and children. Jacob died, probably in 1851, also leaving a wife and children. There is no indication that any of the three daughters ever married. In the 1850 census, Elias was listed as head of the household, being age 38, and having in the home with him Elizabeth, age 52, Christena, 42, and Catherine, 40. They were last enumerated in the 1860 census, at which time Elizabeth was age 64, Christena 52, and Catherine also 52. There is an obvious discrepancy in their ages. Elias was still living in 1870, but he is not in the 1880 census. David died in 1878 leaving a wife and children.

33. vi **Elias Gradick** was born in 1812 in Richland County, South Carolina, based on the 1850 census.

Fannie Sue (Lever) Turnipseed and Buford Souter Chappell in their contribution to "The Leitner Family in Florida" wrote that Elias Gradick married Sallie Culler. This may be true, but she is not in any of the census returns with Elias. In the 1850 census Elias was listed as age 38, planter, living in a household of four persons, the other three being his sisters, Elizabeth, Christina, and Catherine. Value of real estate was \$750. In 1860 the four siblings were still living together, and their brother, David, and sister-in-law, Mary Ann, were living next door. Value of real estate for Elias was \$4,000 and personal property was \$10,000. In 1870 Elias is the sole occupant of his household. His real estate is valued at \$500 and his personal property at \$560. The dramatic decrease in the value of his estate is no doubt a typical example of the effects of the Civil War on the farmers at that time.

7. **Catherine** (**Katie**) **Gradick** (2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born January 9, 1772. She married **Nicholas Wyrick Jr.**, who was born January 16, 1763 (son of Nicholas Wyrick), and died August 4, 1833, in Fairfield District, South Carolina. He is buried in the Wyrick Family Cemetery in Fairfield County. Catherine died December 7, 1841, also in Fairfield District.³⁸

In Gwendolyn Pryor's book, *The Swiss Connection, Hans Caspar Kuhn (1718-1792) of South Carolina and his Descendants, with Related Families of Kinsler, Nettles, and Wyrick,* ³⁹ Nicholas' will has been transcribed in its entirety. It was written on January 27, 1827, and proved August 16, 1834. In it he named his wife, Catherine, and each of his ten children. His estate consisted of several hundred acres of land in Fairfield, as well as his personal property that included seven male slaves, Jack, Charles, Reubin, Dick, Jordan, George and Simon, and one female slave named Jinny. Also of interest is the following, which I quote: "My boy Phillip Graddick whom I have in view to be bound to me until he is twenty-one years of age, should I die before he has served his time, my executors will dispose of him as they may judge best and see that my obligation is fulfilled." (See notes with Benjamin Gradick, No. 9 in this compilation.) Another item in his will of special interest is that he says "It is my will that Jinny at the death of my wife shall go free, no longer a slave, but choose her own place to live and act accordingly." However, in the inventory of Nicholas' estate, taken by William Robertson, James McCants and David Hamiter, Jinny is listed along with the other property with a value of \$260. It is to be hoped that Nicholas' wishes with respect to Jinny were carried out.

Gwendolyn Pryor did not have knowledge of Catherine's maiden name, but Fannie Sue (Lever) Turnipseed and Buford Souter Chappell in their contribution to *The Leitner Family in Florida* wrote that Katie Gradick married Nicholas Wyrick. Also, the "children and heirs at law of Katy Wyrick, deceased," were among the heirs of Catherine Gradick, daughter of Jacob Gradick, Jr. (see notes with # 22, Catherine Gradick), giving evidence to the relationship.

Three of Nicholas and Catherine's children married their first cousins, children of Catherine's brother, Andrew Gradick. The dates of birth for the children are all from Gwendolyn Pryor's book.

Information on the descendants of Jacob Leitner Sr. and Mary Eve Gradick comes from Fannie Sue Turnipseed, née Lever, and Buford Souter Chappell in *The Leitner Family in Florida*. ⁴² The birth and death dates of Jacob and Mary Eve, and the names of their children can also be found in the *Levers of Cedar Creek and Allied Families* by Evalyn Lever Hedgepath. ⁴³ According to Fannie Sue (Lever) Turnipseed and Buford Souter Chappell, Jacob and Mary Eve "settled up on creek between Big Cedar Creek and Horse Creek. The house is still there, owned by Barnes

- 10. Andrew Gradick (2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born 1784-1790. He married (1) Magdalene Leitner. He married (2) Susannah (maiden name unknown). Andrew died about October 29, 1831.

Andrew was head of a household, age 16-26 in the 1810 census. We would expect him to be 36-46 in 1830, and actually, in that year's census he was listed as 40-50; so if the ages given were accurate he must have been age 40-46 in 1830, making his birth year between 1784 and 1790.

Andrew was married twice. Fannie Sue (Lever) Turnipseed and Buford Souter Chappell in *The Leitner Family in Florida* wrote that Mollie Leitner, daughter of George Leitner Sr. married Andrew Gradick. Also, in the will of George Lightner Sr., written October 28, 1812, he named his daughter, Magdalene Graddick, as one of his heirs (Mollie must have been a nickname). Susannah Gradick (sometimes called Susan) was Andrew's widow at his death, and the courtappointed guardian of her two minor children.

We have estimated Magdalene's year of birth from the census records. She was age 16 to 26 in 1810, which would make her year of birth between 1784 and 1794; but her first child was born

August 29, 1806, so, if she was at least 16 when she married, she would have been born about 1784.

Edith Winter, née Hoy, in a letter to Leonardo Andrea, wrote about Susannah, "Seems like she married a Lockner after Andrew's death." She may have married Middleton Locklear. He was enumerated in the 1850 census of Richland District, South Carolina, with wife, Susan, age 53. They were living in the house next to Nathan Gradick, and three doors from Philip Gradick (possible son of Benjamin Gradick).

Andrew died without a will. There was a citation published at the Methodist Church at Columbia by Rev. W. Capers on October 30 1831. A citation was a notice by the state. If there were no newspaper in the area, it was the custom for such a notice to be read or otherwise published in a public place, often a church, with a connection to the family and neighbors of the deceased. In this case the citation was issued by James J. Guinard, Esquire, Ordinary, of Richland District, and it read,

Whereas John P. Cook hath applied to me for letters of Administration on all and singular the goods and chattels, rights and credits of And Gradick late of the district aforesaid, deceased, these are therefore to cite and admonish all and singular, the kindred and creditors of the said deceased, to appear before me, at our next Ordinary's Court for the said District, to be holden at Columbia on the 5th day of Nov. next, to shew cause, if any, why the said administration should not be granted.

On November 15, 1831, John P. Cook prayed the state to permit the sale of goods since Andrew's debts exceeded the value of his estate independent of his three slaves. On November 26, 1831, an inventory of the goods and chattels was made by Felix Turnipseed, Adam F. DuBard, and John Turnipseed Jr. The sale was held on December 2, 1831. Among the buyers were Susan Gradick (the widow), John Gradick, Timothy Gradick, Sibyl Gradick, and Henry Gradick. Susan bought more than anyone else. The total from the sale was \$1635.32. This included the three slaves: 1 boy, Dennis \$400.00, 1 black woman and child \$275.00.

On October 8, 1832 Felix Turnipseed submitted a claim at court for an unpaid bill, dated September 15, 1831, for nails for 1 coffin & plank for 2 coffins & 10 days work @ 25 cents per day. 48

In February 1833, Henry, the eldest son, was appointed guardian for Mary M. Gradick, ⁴⁹ Timothy was appointed guardian for Nathan and Elizabeth, ⁵⁰ David Lightner was appointed guardian for Francis, ⁵¹ and Susannah for her two children, Susannah and Adeline. ⁵²

In March 1834 bond had to be posted for all of the guardians before any distributions were made for their wards. Henry and Nicholas Wyrick posted bond of \$300.00 to guarantee Henry's true accounting for the inheritance of Mary M. Gradick. Timothy and Henry posted bond of \$600.00 to guarantee Timothy's accounting for the inheritance of Nathan and Elizabeth. Susannah and John P. Cooke posted bond of \$900.00 to guarantee Susannah's accounting for the inheritance of Susannah Jr. and Adeline. We found no bond in the file for David Lightner. ⁵³

On May 20 1839, Mary and her husband filed a Bill of Complaint against Henry Gradick in Richland County Court of Equity⁵⁴ because Henry had neglected to pay over to Mary the balance due her from her father's estate. The complaint read in part, "about 1831 Andrew Gradick . . . departed this life intestate leaving a small real and personal estate and leaving his widow & ten children his distributees and heirs at law. To wit Susanah Gradick, Henry Gradick, Levelah Gradick, Timothy Gradick, Elizabeth Gradick, Mary M. Gradick now Mary M. Wyrick your oratrix [plaintiff], Nathan Gradick and Andrew Gradick the younger (since deceased), Susanah Gradick the younger and Adaline Gradick." The words "since deceased" were inserted above Andrew's name, between the lines. (I wonder if the second coffin in the bill submitted by Felix Turnipseed above was for Andrew Jr.) The complaint went on to say that Mary "is now of age and hath been for some time & hath intermarried with your orator [Zachariah]." Henry was served with a subpoena; and on June 1, 1839, paid to Mary the balance in her account.

Mary and her husband, in their complaint, said that Andrew died leaving ten children; but they named only nine. Actually, there were eleven. They left out Sybil and Francis.

Three of Andrew's children married their first cousins, the children of his sister, Catherine (Gradick) Wyrick.

Children by Magdalene (Mollie) Leitner:

We do not know her proper place in the birth order among her brothers and sisters, but we have placed her in the order in which she was placed on their list. In Leonardo Andrea's file, he states that she signed a receipt for her share of her father's estate on March 8, 1839; but we did not find this receipt in the file that he referenced.

Children by Susannah:

- 65. ix Andrew Gradick Jr. was born 1825-1830 in Richland County, South Carolina. In the census return of 1830, there was one male child under age 5 in the household of Andrew Gradick Sr. The other three boys were all older than this, so we think that this was Andrew. Andrew's name appears in the Bill of Complaint filed by Zachariah and Mary M. (Gradick) Wyrick in which they list ten of Andrew's children. It reads Andrew Gradick the younger, and inserted above the name are the words "since deceased". It appears that Zachariah and Mary listed the children in order of birth, making Andrew the third youngest. We are not sure that he was a child of Susannah rather than Mary, but think it likely.
- 66. x Susannah Gradick was born about 1828 in Richland County, South Carolina. In the 1850 census of Richland County, there is a Susan 'Graddick' listed as age 22, owning real estate worth \$200.00, and having a child, Lawrence B., age 1.
- 67. xi Adeline Gradick was born about 1829 in Richland County, South Carolina. In the 1850 census of the District of Charleston in St. Philip's Parish, on October 17, 1850, there was an Adeline 'Graddick' who was enumerated in a household of ten persons ages 17 to 30, all but two of whom, one of them Adeline, were born out of state. This was probably a rooming house.
- 11. **Daniel Graddick** (2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born in 1788 in South Carolina. He married **Sucky Hamiter** who was born about 1789 in South Carolina⁵⁵ (daughter of Adam Frederick Hamiter and Barbara Turnipseed). We believe she died March 3, 1830, in South Carolina.⁵⁶ Daniel and his family were the beginning of the Georgia branch of the family. In most of the records of this family, the surname is spelled "Graddick".

Daniel and his family were enumerated in Richland County, South Carolina, in 1810, 1820 and 1830. In 1810 there were no children in the household, just one male age 16 to 26, and one female age 16 to 26. He and Sucky were probably newlyweds at that time. In 1820 there were six children, three boys, and three girls all under age 10. In 1830 there were two more children, a boy age 5 to 10, and a girl under age five. Daniel is not found in any census in 1840 or 1850, but we learn from his obituary that the family moved to Georgia in the early 1830s. In 1860 and in 1870 he was enumerated in Harris County, Georgia, with two of his daughters, Charlotta and Assaline, living with him. Of his four sons, Reddick lived in Pike County, while the other three lived in Harris County.

Daniel served as a volunteer in the War of 1812 in McWillie's 2nd Regiment, South Carolina Militia. He was a private.⁵⁷

Daniel had been the youngest child of his parents, and outlived all of his brothers and sisters. He also outlived his sons, Porter and Lovick, and probably Turner. Reddick and Cynthia survived him, but we find no reference to his daughters, Charlotta and Assaline, after the 1870 census. In *Death and Obituary Notices*, 1867-1878, by Brent Holcomb, we found the following notice copied from a Southern Christian Advocate issue of 1873: "Daniel Graddock died in Harris county, Ga., March 15th, in the 85th year of his age. He was born in Richland district, S. C., and removed to Georgia about forty-three years ago . . . ".

68. i **Lovick Graddick** was born about 1810 in Richland County, South Carolina, based on the census returns. His occupation was listed as farmer. He married (1) **Elizabeth Lawson** on December 16, 1843, in Harris County, Georgia. He married (2) **Derilda Richardson** on July 18, 1848, in Harris County, Georgia. She was born 1819/1820 in Georgia. 60

Lovick was recorded in the 1860 and 1870 censuses at Hamilton Post Office, Harris County, Georgia. He was age 50 in 1860 and 59 in 1870. He does not appear on the 1880 census.

A notice of Derilda's death was found in *Death and Obituary Notices from the Southern Christian Advocate*, 1867-1878 by Brent H. Holcomb as follows: "Sister Derilda Graddick died July 4th 1871, in her 51st year. Her parents Robert E. and Gilla Richardson. The Hamilton Church of which she was a member." Submitted by W. F. Robinson.

- + 71. iv **Cvnthia Graddick** was born January 18, 1820.
 - 72. v Charlotta Gradick was born about 1820 in Richland County, South Carolina. According to the 1830 census there was only one daughter born to Daniel and Sucky after 1820. This would have been Assaline. Charlotta could have been born in 1820 after the census was taken. In the 1860 census she was reported as being 35, and in the 1870, as 50.
- + 73. vi **Porter Gradick** was born 1822.
 - 74. vii **Assaline P. Graddick** was born 1826-1829, Richland County, South Carolina. In the 1860 census Assaline was shown to be age 31, and in 1870 she was 44.
- 13. **Christian Gradick** (3.Richard², 1.Julius¹) was born about 1765-1773, undoubtedly in Craven County, ⁶¹ South Carolina, in present-day Richland or Fairfield County. His first wife was Mary.

We don't know her maiden name, but for a discussion about this see notes below with Richard H. Gradick. Mary was born about 1777.

The first mention we find of Christian was in his father's will in 1773. It was executed in Craven County on Broad River. (See notes with # 3, Richard Gradick Sr.)

On August 18, 1790, Christian signed a receipt for the amount of his part of his brother Richard's estate. He signed as Ch. Gradick. 62 (See copy of receipt with notes on #12, Richard Gradick Jr.)

On the February 1, 1796, Christian received grants from the State of South Carolina for two parcels of land consisting of 200 and 300 acres respectively in Camden District.⁶³ These were tracts that had originally been surveyed for John Cole and Jonathan Newman in 1784 and 1785. On September 10, 1796, at Charleston, Christian was witness to the will of one Casimir Patrick.⁶⁴

In January 1797, he was one of many purchasers at a sale of goods of Richard Strawther, deceased, in Newberry County. 65 Christian bought two lots of fat hogs.

The family moved to Charleston near the end of the 18th century or the beginning of the 19th, as evidenced by the census of 1800. Christian Graddick was enumerated in Charleston County, having in his household 3 males age 26 to 45, 1 female age 16 to 26, and 2 males under 10. This must have been Christian and Mary with 2 little boys and 2 other adult males.

On January 14, 1800, Christian bought a slave named Caesar from James Motes.⁶⁶

On November 17, 1800, Christian bought a slave named Solomon from Hannah Moultrie.⁶⁷

On February 21, 1801, Christian sold to John F. Delorme, a slave named Solomon.⁶⁸

On November 13, 1801, Christian bought, at Charleston, a slave named Jim for \$600 from Jeremiah Henry Gafkin.⁶⁹

On December 28 1801, Christian bought a slave named Charles, about 14 years old, from John McNeill.⁷⁰



At the Charleston Library Society,⁷¹ we were delighted to find that they had, on microfilm, Charleston City Directories dated from 1782. In the directory of 1801, Christian was listed as a butcher occupying stall 6, with home on King St. Rd.

There is a baptism on the Register of St. Philip's Parish in Charlestown, dated January 31, 1802, of a child of Pistin and Mary Gradick named Angelina Gradick.⁷² We assume that "Pistin" was in fact Christian.

Christian bought a lot of land from Samuel Wragg on August 15, 1804, for \$800. It was located on the south side of Mary Street in a new subdivision called Wraggborough. In the deed of conveyance, it is described as "designated in the plan of the said Borough by the number Six and colared [sic] red."⁷³



In 1806 Christian was again listed in the Charleston City Directory, this time in stall 10, Queen St. Market; and in a supplement of that year, on page 112, as a butcher, Mary St., Wraggborough.

In 1807 he was entered in the directory on Mary St., Wraggborough.

On October 17, 1808, Mary died. At the Charleston County Library we found, in an issue of South Carolina Historical and Genealogical Magazine, the following two excerpts from Charleston newspapers regarding Mary's death: "Died, on the 17th instant, Mrs. Mary Gradick, after a long and painful illness, which she bore with Christian fortitude for upwards of 4 years. She has left an affectionate husband and five children to lament their loss", and "The Friends and Acquaintances of Mrs. Mary Gradick, are invited to attend her Funeral This Morning, at 9 o'clock, from her late residence in Market-street, four doors from Meeting-street. (Tuesday, October 18, 1808.)"

Since Mary died leaving 5 children, this means that Christian and Mary must have had 2 more children, besides Angelina, born after the 1800 census and before her death. Three of the children would be under 10 at the next census in 1810, and two would be male, over 10 and under 20.

The Charleston Library Society is a private library, established in 1748, located at 164 King Street, Charleston.

On March 19, 1809, Christian married **Susannah North**, in Charleston. At the Charleston Library Society we found in a microfilmed copy of the (Charleston) Times, dated Wednesday evening, March 22, 1809, the following announcement: "Married on Sunday evening last, by the Rev. Dr. Furman, Mr. Christian Gradick to Miss Susannah North, both of this city."

In the 1809 city directory, Christian was listed on Cannon St. This may have been his business location.

In the 1810 census of Charleston County, Christian was enumerated as Graddock, Chris. In his household were 1 male age 26 to 45, 1 female 26 to 45, 1 male 16 to 26, 1 female 16 to 26, 4 males under 10, 2 females under 10 and 1 female 10 to 16. Christian would be the male age 26 to 45, and Susannah could be either the female 26 to 45 or 16 to 26. It may be that there were two families in the household. Certainly, there were more people than just Christian and Susannah, and Christian's children.

In the 1813 city directory, Christian was listed on Butcher-row (presumably, his business location).

Christian must have died early in 1816, since we found a bill of sale for the slave named Jim, signed on the 27th of March, 1816, by John Strohecker as administrator of the estate of Christian Gradick, Jim was sold to J. E. Peterson for \$1100.⁷⁴

To estimate the year of Christian's birth, we considered that since he was age 26 to 45 in 1810, he would have had to be born between 1765 and 1784; but since he was named in his father's will in 1773, he must have been born between 1765 and 1773.

We have estimated Mary's year of birth to be about 1777 based on the 1800 census in which she was age 16 to 26 and the mother of two children.

It is possible that Susannah was the daughter of Edward North and Susannah North. We found the record of a will by Edward North dated at Charleston on December 13, 1783. In the will he left everything to his wife and children but did not name any of them. This will was not proved until September 7, 1798, which is probably when the youngest child reached maturity.

In the Charleston City Directories we found Susannah North (probable widow of Edward North and mother of our Susannah North) listed in 1786 at 37 Tradd St.; in 1796 on Tradd St. (no number); in 1801 the listing reads "widow" at 37 Tradd St.; 1802 at 38 Tradd St.; 1803 at 28 Tradd St.; 1806 and 1807 reads "North, Susannah, widow 38 Tradd Street"; 1809 reads "North, Susannah, shopkeeper, 38 Tradd St.

The following notice was reported in *The* (Charleston) *Times* of April 17, 1810: "Departed this life, the 29th ult., Mrs. Susannah North, in her 60th year...she was the oldest member of the Baptist Church." Perhaps further research would reveal more information about the North family.

The order of birth of the following children of Christian is uncertain.

Children by Mary:

75. i **Richard H. Gradick**, born by February 15, 1798.

There is a deed on file in Charleston District Deed Book U-6, page 320, dated February 15, 1798, naming Lewis Faust of Santee as grantor of "350 acres of land situated on waters of Broad River on City Creek of Harmon's Creek . . . and also a negro wench aged 30 and named Jenny" to Richard Henry Gradick "for love and affection . . . With this proviso, that if Lewis Faust shall ever marry, then this deed shall become null and void." A grant of this kind, for love and affection, usually indicates a close relationship. It seems to raise the possibility that Richard's mother, Mary, might have been a Faust.

On August 24, 1815, Richard H. Gradick, by his attorney, W. Lance, filed suit in Charleston against Jacob Frey and Richard Frey "complaining that whereas the said Jacob and Reinhard on 16 June 1814 . . . did make a certain note in writing commonly called a promisory Note with their own proper handwriting thereunto subscribed, . . . promised . . . to pay Three Hundred and ninety four dollars for skins got of his father," and "the said sum of money . . . to the said Richard have not nor hath either of them paid (tho often requested so to do) . . ."⁷⁷ Judgment was found in favor of Richard; and he received, as well, damages, costs and charges, altogether a total of four hundred and forty-seven dollars and fifty-eight cents, for which his attorney signed a receipt. Since Christian Gradick was a butcher, this mention of "skins got of his father" reinforces our assumption that Richard H. was a son of Christian.

In the Charleston City directory of 1816 Richard 'Graddock' was listed on the west side of St. Philip's St.

There was a Richard Gradick who married Sarah Sweeney on December 17, 1818, at the Second Presbyterian Church in Charleston, South Carolina.⁷⁸

In the 1819 directory there is a listing for Richard 'Graddock', blacksmith, at 391 King St.

Richard Gradick was witness to an agreement between James Johnston and John D. Kirk concerning the setting up and managing of a blacksmith shop, dated May 17, 1820, and recorded August 12 1820.⁷⁹

In 1822 the Charleston City Directory listing reads Richard Gradick, blacksmith, 18 King, r. [residence] Smith's Lane.

Also, there was a marriage settlement between Richard H. Gradick and Mary D. Hermen, dated July 27, 1821, in Charleston. 80 Marriage settlements were usually pre-marital agreements between parties, one or both of whom had been previously married. This one was somewhat unusual in that it was an indenture tripartite, meaning that it was a contract entered into by three persons, in this case not only by the two principals, Richard and Mary, but also by Richard's brother, Charles, whereby it was agreed that Mary should retain ownership of her own personal property to do with as she saw fit, and that her property should not be held liable for any debts, present or future of Richard's. There was an attached list of all the property. Mary, or perhaps a former husband, must have owned a store, for items in the store were listed first, and then items in the house. In the store were such articles as casks with different liquors, lots of bacon, beef, pork and fish, a lot of tobacco, three barrels of sugar, one hogshead of molasses, etc. In the house, there was a lot of furniture as well as a gold watch and trinkets, and two silver watches. All three of the parties signed the contract. It is noteworthy that Charles Gradick, as he was called in the body of the document, signed his name as Christian C. Gradick.

On 16 February 1822, George B. Gilbert brought suit against Richard Gradick and Mary, his wife, for thirty-eight dollars and fifty-five cents, which was for a debt that Mary had incurred in her own name prior to her marriage to Richard by signing a note June 30, 1821. The court found for the plaintiff.⁸¹

In 1823 Israel Moses sought a judgment against Mrs. Mary Gradick and her husband Richard Gradick for an unpaid debt entered into by Mary for \$121.80. The court found for the plaintiff in the amount of \$243.60, which included interest, court costs, and damages. 82

Richard's name does not appear on any census return. The last year that we found his name entered in the Charleston City Directory was 1825, when he was listed as Richard Graddick, blacksmith, King St.

- 15. **Herman Kinsler Sr.** (4.Dorothea², 1.Julius¹) was born about 1739 in Saxe-Gotha Township, South Carolina. He married Elizabeth (surname unknown).

Herman "Kontzler" was a private in Captain John Pearson's company in Colonel Richard Richardson's regiment from October 6, 1759 to January 8, 1760.

Herman (sometimes spelled Harmon) gave 100 acres to his "beloved brother," Christian, in a gift deed of lease and release, dated 24/25 July 1772. ⁸⁴ The deed concludes with a notation that Herman had become heir to the property as "the oldest son of the said Conrad Kinseler deceased." Although Conrad had a will, apparently this particular piece of property was not included, and had therefore devolved upon Herman through the then existing law of primogeniture, by which the eldest son automatically became heir.

Richard Gradick Sr. named "Herman Cintzler, my brother" as one of his executors in his will, dated April 9, 1773. (For a discussion of this, see notes with # 4, Dorothea Gredig.)

Herman had died by April 9, 1783, when his brother, Christian, was appointed administrator of his estate. 85

Elizabeth was enumerated in the first census of the United States in 1790, in Camden District, Richland County, as Kinsaloe (Widow), head of a household having 2 males of 16 years and upward, 3 females and 6 slaves. She was living next to her son Herman Jr.

She dictated her will on April 4, 1817, and it was proved March 17, 1820. Bequests were made to her son Herman, her daughters, Mary Coon, Elizabeth Smith, Sophia Rawls, and Christina Mitchell. All of the information concerning the children of Herman and Elizabeth is from Gwendolyn Pryor's book, *The Swiss Connection: Hans Caspar Kuhn (1713-1792), with Related Families of Kinsler, Nettles, and Wyrick*, and Leonardo Andrea's Genealogical Collection, the Kinsler file p.p. 19, 22, 23, 24, 43, 44, 45 on microfilm at the LDS Family History Centers, microfilm #954548. Included in this file is a copy of Elizabeth's will.

Herman Kinsler signed his own will on November 3, 1828. It was proved December 11, 1828. Daniel Gradick was an executor.

Christian signed his will on February 8, 1789. It was proved May 18, 1789 in Richland County. He left everything divided among his five children and his wife, Susanna. The final settlement of his estate was not until June 16, 1809. Susanna died before 1800. The information concerning Christiana and Susanna and their children, is from Gwendolyn Pryor (see note above with # 17, Herman Kinsler, Sr.).

89. i **Daniel Kinsler** was born before 1769, in Richland District, South Carolina, and died before January 2, 1793, in Richland County.

Daniel wrote his will on December 28, 1792, and it was proved on January 2, 1793. No wife or children were named.

90. ii **John Jacob Kinsler** was born 1772/73 in Richland District, South Carolina. He married **Mary Frost** before 1812. She was born 1794-1798 (daughter of John Frost and Judith Faust), and died September 20, 1838, in Richland District, South Carolina. John died August 25, 1857, at his home near Columbia, South Carolina.

According to Gwendolyn Pryor in her book The Swiss Connection, "John Jacob Kinsler left a large estate valued at \$45,602 (1982 dollars \$467,742). This included a 400 acre plantation known as the Graddick Plantation." When he died he left his entire estate to his two minor grandchildren, John Kinsler Davis and Julia C. Davis, the children of his deceased daughter, Ellen and her husband, Thomas Davis, a native of England.

28. **John Gradick Jr.** (6.John³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born June 23,1798, in Richland County, South Carolina. He married **Ibeline Meekler**, about 1837. (Her name has been spelled in various ways such as Ebbelino, Ibilina, Iberlina.) She was born December 5, 1816 (daughter of Christian Mickler and Mary Polly Bouknight). She died April 12, 1894. John died before November 26, 1847, in Richland County.²

In the 1840 census of Richland County, South Carolina, John was head of a household having one male age 40 to 50, one female age 20 to 30, and a boy and a girl, both under five.

On November 8, 1847, John signed his will, and it was proved less than three weeks later on November 26. In it he bequeathed all of "my household and plantation tools and stock of every kind and negroes, also my tract of land on which I now reside" to his wife. He provided that, if she should marry again, all his property should be sold, with Ibeline to retain one third of the proceeds, the balance to be equally divided among his children. He named his first four children. His fifth child, John Franklin S., was born posthumously. John appointed Ibeline and his brother, David, as executors.

Ibiline was in Lexington County as head of the household when the 1850 census was taken. Her five children ages 16 to 3 were living with her. In the 1860 census of Saluda Division of Edgefield County, John and Ibeline's three youngest children, the three boys ages 18, 15 and 13, were enumerated with their mother, who was age 48. Her occupation was farming, and Whitfield was said to be a farmer too. Her real estate value was \$2,672, and personal property \$1,774. Elias was in school. In 1870 and 1880 Ibeline was living with her son Elias' family.

Children:

- 105. i Charlotte D. E. Gradick was born March 28, 1838. She married Edward Smith. Charlotte died March 23, 1865, and is buried at Butler Methodist Church Cemetery in Saluda County, South Carolina. During the Confederate War, Charlotte spent her time looking after the welfare of her husband and brothers, and the sick and dying soldiers.³
- 106. ii **Fletcher C. Gradick** was born June 3, 1839. There is a tombstone for him at Butler Methodist Church Cemetery.⁴

Edith Winter, née Hoy, said in a letter to Leonardo Andrea "The little F. C. Graddick boy was in the War Between the States, and was killed in Battle." She also wrote that she had a copy of his will leaving everything to his mother. His father called him "Christian J. F. Graddick" in his will. He was called "Fletcher" in his grandmother's division of estate, and "F. C. Graddick" on his tombstone.

On April 15, 1861, he volunteered to serve for 12 months, as a private in Captain J. H. Brook's Company G of the 7th Regiment, South Carolina Volunteers. He died August 7, 1861, at Culpeper Confederate Hospital in Virginia, of "Febris Tyhoides" (probably typhoid fever).

- 30. **Jacob Gradick** (6.John³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born about 1803. He married **Jemima Lyles** who was born about 1829. Jacob died in 1863.

Jacob's age was given as 47 on the 1850 census that was taken on September 25, 1850; Jemima was 21, and daughter, Sarah A., was 1. Jacob was a planter. The value of his real estate was \$2,000.

On the census taken August 18, 1860, Jacob was listed as 50 and Jemima as 28 (obviously the census is not totally reliable in regard to ages). Sarah was 11, and there were three more children, William age 8, and twin boys, Edward and George, age 4. He was an owner of seven slaves: three female children ages four to nine, three adult females ages 25, 45 and 50, and one male age 21. Jacob's occupation was farmer, and his personal estate was worth either \$7,000 or \$9,000 (the microfilm is not quite clear).

In the 1870 census, George, Edward, and Fletcher age 9, born since the last census, were living with their uncle, David Graddick, and his family. William was living alone.

Edith Winter, née Hoy, was one of the people who hired Leonardo Andrea to research the Gradick family.

In 1880 Jemima was head of a household in which there were three people. In addition to herself, there was her son, William, and a little girl, Minta, age 6, described as daughter of the head of house (presumably the child of William). Jemima is described as farmer, and William as farm laborer.

There is a biography of Edward C. Gradick, one of the twin boys, in a book entitled *Biographical Souvenir of the State of Texas*, published in 1889 in Chicago, by F. A. Battey and Company. This entire book has been scanned and published online by Susan Hawkins, and can be viewed at <www.rootsweb.com/~txfannin/s.html>. In it we found the year of death for Jacob as well as the date of birth and date of marriage for Edward C. The names of the children born to Jacob and Jemima are given as: Sallie E., William D., Edward C., Fannie C. and Fletcher J. Strangely, Edward's twin, George, is not named, although we read that, "Edward C. and a twin, remarkable to say, are the only ones living of the children." Jacob is reported to have been a "faithful and devout Christian," a Methodist, and, for a number of years, a class-leader.

Children:

- 110. i **Sarah A. Gradick** was one year old in the 1850 census, so presumably she was born in 1849 in Richland County, South Carolina.
- William D. Gradick was born about 1852 in Richland County, South Carolina. William was 8 and living at home with his parents when the 1860 census was taken. His father died in 1863, and in 1870 we found him as Willie Gradick, the only person at his abode, age 20 years. (There is often some age discrepancy from one census to another.) In 1880 William was living with his mother, and there was a six year old little girl in the home named Minta Gradick.
- + 112. iii Edward C. Gradick was born June1855.
 - 113. iv **George Gradick** was born June 1855 in Richland County, South Carolina. In the 1860 census George and Edward are marked "twins". George was still living when *Biographical Souvenir of the State of Texas* was published in 1889 (see above).
 - 114. v **Fannie C. Gradick** was born after August 18, 1860, and died before 1889. Fannie C. must have been born after the 1860 census taker visited the family on August 18 of that year, since she was not listed then. She is named as a deceased sister of Edward C. Gradick in his biography in *Biographical Souvenir of the State of Texas*. The book was published in 1889 (see above).
 - 115. vi **Fletcher J. Gradick** was born June 6, 1861, in Richland County, South Carolina, and died October 10, 1882. He is buried at Cedar Creek Methodist Church Cemetery. He was enumerated in the home of his uncle David Gradick, in 1870 at the age of 9.
- 34. **David Graddick** (6.John³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born September 1, 1813.^{9,10} He married **Mary Ann Leitner** about 1860 in South Carolina.¹¹ She was born January 15, 1839 (daughter

of Daniel Leitner and Martha P. Lever). She died June 18, 1912, and is buried at Oak Grove Methodist Church Cemetery, Fairfield County, South Carolina. ¹² David died May 15, 1878, in Richland County, South Carolina. ^{13,14}

David and "Mary" first appear as a couple in the Richland County census of 1860 where they were enumerated on the 20th of August of that year. David was 47 and Mary Ann 22.

In 1870, George and 'Ed', the twin sons of David's deceased brother, Jacob, were age 16 and living with David and Mary Ann as farm hands. Their brother, Fletcher, who was only 9, was living with them too. They also had three young children of their own, James, Susan and Martha. Neither David nor Mary Ann could read or write, nor could George or Ed.

In 1880 Mary Ann was a widow, enumerated with her own six children in the home, ages fourteen to five.

- 39. **Mary Magdalene Wyrick** (7.Catherine³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born about 1802¹⁵ in Fairfield District, South Carolina. She married #57 **Henry J. Gradick** (10.Andrew³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹)¹⁶ about 1834. He was born August 29, 1806.¹⁷ Henry and Mary were first cousins. Laura May (Emerson) Gradick, wife of his grandson, William, wrote of Henry that he had red hair as a young man, and was often called "Red" by those who knew him.¹⁸

Henry was first found in a census in 1840, in Richland District, South Carolina. He was head of a household with one male age 30-40, one female age 30-40, and four children, 3 boys and a girl, all under age 10.

By 1850, when the census was taken in Richland County, Henry and Mary had five children, Diogenes, age 15, Henry P., age 14, Nicholas, age 13, Elizabeth, age 11, and Edward, age 9. All of the children were in school. Henry's occupation was planter, and his real property was valued at \$2000. Henry's age was given as 40 and Mary's as 48. We believe Henry's age was in error in this census.

According to Henry's obituary (see below), the family moved from South Carolina to Florida in 1852.

On November 24, 1853, "Henry Gradick, of the State of South Carolina" bought 335 acres of land from George and Mary Gillett, of Alachua County, Florida for \$1300.00. It was described as being in Section 25, Township 10, Range 21 of that county. Less than a year later, on September 1, 1854, he bought 637 & 68/100 acres for \$637.00 in Section 36, Township 10, Range 21 of Alachua County, bringing his holdings to over 972 acres. 19

On September 2, 1854, tragedy struck this family. The only daughter of the family, Victoria Elizabeth, who was attending finishing school in Charleston, died of yellow fever.

On November 20, 1855, Henry conveyed all 972 acres to his wife, Mary, along with the following eleven slaves: Briller about age 35, Mary about 28, Ede about 25, Daniel about 20, Sophy about 21, Shack about 25, Jeff about 18, Ann about 10, George about 3, Wilson about 1 year old, and Charles "an infant born in January last." Also included in this conveyance were four horses, two mules, one wagon, one buggy, and "all and singular" his household furniture, farming utensils, five hundred bushels of corn, ten thousand pounds of hay and fodder, all the cotton, ten head of cattle "branded H. G. and marked with a smooth crop and two splits in the right ear," fifty hogs, also the "gin head on said plantation and each & every article of value on said plantation of which I am lawfully possessed." It seems an unusual thing to do for Henry to convey everything to his wife as he did. 20

On May 1, 1855, Henry acquired from the Federal Government 52.44 acres of land described as being lot number 2, located in Section 30, Township 10 South, Range 22 East, in the District of Lands subject to sale at Newnansville. This was a cash sale. Nearly all the land sold by the Federal Government to individual settlers on and after July 1, 1820, was sold for cash at no less than \$1.25 an acre. This land was not included in the above conveyance to Mary.

In 1860 the family was enumerated at Micanopy Post Office, Alachua County, Florida. Diogenes was the only child living at home; the value of Henry's real estate was \$9,000, and

personal property was \$11,135. Henry's age was 54, and Mary's 58. In the slave schedules enumerated that same year, Henry owned thirteen slaves, one male, age 25, three adult females, ages 50, 34 and 27 and nine children, ages 15 to 1.

This family was to pay a heavy price during the Civil War. All four of the boys went off to fight, and only three came home again.

When the first census after the Civil War was taken in 1870, Henry and Mary were still living in Alachua County with a Gainesville post office address. Henry was listed as a planter, and their youngest son, Edward, was living at home. The slave woman, Briller, who was conveyed to Mary in 1855, was enumerated that same day as a head of household on the next page of the census records as Briller Graddock, the same spelling of the surname that the enumerator used for Henry and his family. She was 70 years old, living alone, and her birthplace was recorded as Africa.

Henry died in 1874 and is buried at First Baptist Church Cemetery, Hawthorne, Florida. His great-great-grandson, Homer Schwarz, visited Henry's grave as late as 1997 and reported that the tombstone has the date of death as August 25, 1871; but I think that perhaps it is worn and therefore not altogether clear since his obituary in the Southern Christian Advocate issue of October 21, 1874, ²³ gives his date of death as August 25, 1874, as follows:

Mr. Henry Graddick died in Alachua county, Fla., August 25, 1874, in the 68th year of his age. He was a native of Richmond district, S. C.; moved to Florida in 1852, and was one of those staunch planters of that period who settled among us and rendered Alachua one of the foremost counties of the State. He had been suffering for some time with an affliction of the heart, and though apparently well, died in a few moments. Mr. Graddick was an honest, truthful man, a kind husband, indulgent, warm and faithful friend. He leaves a widow and three sons to mourn their loss. A Friend

The following year, December 22, 1875, Mary deeded the 335 acre parcel of land that she owned to Edward, and the north half of the larger parcel, containing 315 acres, to Nicholas. There seems to have been some difficulty about the south half of that parcel, as Mary had to buy it back at a sheriff's sale in June of 1877. Apparently it had been seized as the result of a lawsuit against Henry P. Gradick, her son. As the highest bidder, she paid \$63.34 to reclaim it. It was conveyed to her son, Henry P. Gradick, on May 1, 1889, by Nicholas and his wife, Maggie, and Edward's widow, Lillie.²⁴

On May 21, 1879, Mary bought two lots for \$100.00 located on a plat for a town named Magnesia Spring. We don't find this town on any present-day map. She was able to sell the lots in less than three years for \$500.00. On December 27, 1883, she sold the 52.44 acre parcel of land that Henry had bought from the United States government for \$75.00.²⁵

In the 1880 census, Mary and son, Edward, and his wife Lillie W., age 19, and daughter, Minnie N., age 3, were living together; and son Nicholas and family were on the same page of the census.

On March 2, 1885, Mary and her daughter-in-law, Lillie, as widows, sold two acres of land together. This gives evidence that Mary was living at that date. We do not have a date of death for her, but we know that she died after 1885 in Windsor, Florida, and is buried at Melrose, Florida. The state of the

Children:

122. i **Diogenes W. Gradick**, was age 15 when he was enumerated at the home of his parents in Richland County, South Carolina, in the 1850 census. The family moved to Florida two years later.

Diogenes, sometimes spelled Diojenes, and nicknamed Dodge, signed up for duty in the Confederate Army at Ocala on July 5, 1861. His formal enlistment took place the following week, on July 13, at Jacksonville, Florida. He was in Company E, 2nd Florida Infantry, serving under Capt. John D. Hopkins. The company arrived in Richmond, Virginia on July 21, 1861, where it became part of the Army of Northern Virginia.

They were engaged in the Battle of Fair Oaks and Seven Pines, May 31 and June 1, 1862. From June 25 to July 1, 1862, they fought in the Battle of Frayser's Farm, part of the Seven Day's Battle. Diogenes was wounded at Frayser's Farm and admitted to Chimborazo Hospital No. 5 at Richmond on July 2. On July 4 he was furloughed for thirty days.

The next year, on June 5, 1863, he was captured at Fredericksburg, and paroled at Old Capitol Prison in Washington, D. C. on June 10. On June 12, he was admitted to General Hospital, Petersburg, Virginia, and returned to duty on June 17.

On July 23, 1863, he was admitted to Receiving and Wayside Hospital (or General Hospital No. 9) in Richmond, Virginia, with chronic diarrhea and dysentery. He died there on August 28, 1863, and is buried in Hollywood Cemetery, Richmond, Virginia.²⁸

- 41. **Zachariah Wyrick** (7.Catherine³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born about 1804 in Fairfield District, South Carolina. He married # 62, Mary M. Gradick (10.Andrew³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) about 1839. Zachariah and Mary were first cousins. Zachariah died in November of 1851 in Fairfield District.³²

Mary Gradick was a minor when her father, Andrew, died; and in February 1833, her brother Henry was appointed her guardian. On May 20, 1839, Zachariah and Mary filed a Bill of Complaint against Henry Gradick in Richland County Court of Equity because Henry had neglected to pay over to Mary the balance due her from her father's estate. In the complaint they said that "your oratrix [Mary] is now of age and hath been for some time & hath intermarried with your orator [Zachariah]."33 From this we can deduce that Mary had come of age (twentyone) by 1839, so she was probably born about 1817 or 1818.

Timothy's date of birth is based on the 1840 census of Fairfield County, South Carolina, when he was age 20-30, and on the fact that in February 1833, he was appointed guardian of two of his siblings after the death of their father. He would have had to be of age twenty-one at that time.

cousins. Timothy died about 1845.³⁷ In the 1870 census, Anna was enumerated as head of household at Winnsboro Post Office, Fairfield County, South Carolina on August 10.

Jacob and Charlotte lived on land given to Jacob by his father, near the line between Richland and Fairfield counties, until 1855, when they started on their trip to Florida on December 13 of that year. One of their descendants, Fannie Belle (Priest) Kipp, compiled and self-published a book in 1971, entitled *The Leitner Family in Florida*. It is the source for most of my data on the Leitner family. (See notes with Jacob Gradick Sr. on page 6 of this document). Included is this transcription from a Marion County newspaper:

Jacob and Charlotte Souter Leitner were pioneer residents of Marion County, Florida. They left their home in Columbia, South Carolina, on December 13, 1855, for Florida with their nine children for what is now Anthony.

Mr. And Mrs. Leitner and the smaller children rode in a carriage. The older children, in buggies and wagons (covered), carried personal and household goods and the Leitner slaves. On the first day, the caravan traveled only fifteen miles; and the entire trip took over four weeks.

Sybil Gradick was one of the buyers at the sale of her father's goods and chattels on December 2, 1831. On March 8, 1834 Timothy Gradick, her brother, signed a receipt for a share of his father's estate on behalf of Sybil "Lindler." Sybil and George must have been married between these two dates. We didn't know her husband's first name until June 2003 when we found "The Jacob Lindler Family" published on the web site of the Dutch Fork chapter of the South Carolina Genealogical Society by Donald Whitaker and John Eargle. It was also there that we found that Sybil's first name was Ann, and that we discovered the names of their children.

The family was enumerated on September 25, 1850, in Richland District, South Carolina, with Ann S. Lindler as head of the household, and with the children, Thompson, Priscilla, Israel, James, and Tilman, ages 16, 14, 13, 11 and 9 respectively. In the 1850 census, the enumerators numbered each dwelling place consecutively as they visited. It is interesting to note the families in the neighborhood. The Lindler dwelling place number was 785; Ann's sister and brother-in-law, Elizabeth and James Turnipseed, were in dwelling number 783; her first cousin, Jacob Gradick, son of her Uncle John and his wife, Jemimah, were in dwelling number 787; and her

brother Henry, and wife, Mary, were in dwelling number 804. Son, Thompson, was counted twice in this census, and was enumerated as head of his own household in dwelling number 782 as well as in his mother's home.

This family moved to Georgia after the date of the above census, but probably before April of 1854 when daughter, Priscilla, was married there.

When the census was taken in 1880 in Clayton County, Georgia, Sybil was enumerated as "Ann Thompson," age 73, a widow, living with her son, Israel, and his family.

Children by George Lindler Jr.:

Thompson D. Lindler was enumerated in the 1850 census of Richland County, 147. i South Carolina, on September 25, at age 18, as a railroad clerk, and living alone. He was living in the next house to his mother's sister and brother-in-law, James and Elizabeth Turnipseed. However, we also found Thompson Linder in that same census, living with his mother and sister and brothers, occupation laborer, age 16. It is almost surely the same person, counted twice in the same census.

Ancestral File, a collection of genealogical data submitted to the Mormon Church by members and non-members, has information concerning this family submitted by Robert Gene Lamb of Jonesboro, Georgia. According to this file Israel and Elmira had ten children, born from about 1866 through 1889.⁵¹

Elizabeth's brother, Timothy, was guardian of her share of the proceeds from their father's estate until she married or reached her majority. There is a receipt among the probate papers of Andrew Gradick's estate, on file at the South Carolina Department of Archives and History, from James Turnipseed to Timothy Gradick for the balance in the account. It reads in part, "Timothy Gradick has paid Jas. Turnipseed who married Elizabeth . . . ," followed by an accounting of the funds. The receipt is not dated, but it provides us with the name of Elizabeth's husband. ⁵⁵

In the 1850 census of Richland County, James and Elizabeth Turnipseed are ages 41 and 37 respectively, and they have five children ages 11 to 2. They were all born in Richland County.

In February 1833, following the death of their father, Timothy Gradick was appointed guardian for his brother, Nathan. Nathan received the final share of his inheritance on May 10, 1839, which would indicate that he had probably reached majority, that is, age 21.⁵⁶

Nathan first shows in a census in 1850 in Richland County, South Carolina, being 30 years old, a planter, having a wife, Rachel, age 24, and a child, Caroline, age 4.

In the 1870 census Nathan's age was given as 56; Rachel's 40, Caroline was no longer at home, but there were John age 14, Emma age 11, and Fannie age 8 months. There was also a child, John Thornton, age 7, enumerated with this family, and there was a Thornton family living next door. Perhaps Caroline had married a Thornton.

Raiford). She died in 1881. Reddick died in 1878. They are both buried in Greenwood Cemetery, Barnesville, Georgia. ⁵⁸

The family was enumerated in Pike County, Georgia, in 1850, with their first four children. Reddick was a farmer.

In 1860, there were four more children. Reddick's real property was valued at \$1200, and his personal property at \$4680.

In 1870, after the Civil War, the four eldest children were no longer at home, nor was Charles; but Sidney, Esther and Olin were still at home, along with two more children, Laura and Nora, born since the last census. Reddick's real property was still valued at \$1200, but his personal property was valued at only \$300.

In the 1880 census Sidney, Laura, Nora and a grandson, "Jene" (this would be Eugene, son of Gideon Graddick), age 12, were living with Millicent, still in Pike County.

All of the children of Reddick and Millicent except Sidney, Charles and Nora are buried at Greenwood Cemetery in Barnesville. The years of birth and death for each of them are derived from transcripts of the tombstones.

In the 1880 census, Sidney was 29 years old, single, and a policeman, living in the home of his mother. In 1900 he was age 40, and living in Monroe County, Georgia, with his sister, Nora, and his brother-in-law, Dave Bennett. In 1920 he was still single, and still living with his sister and brother-in-law in Monroe County.

 - 172. vii Esther A. Graddick was born 1854 in Georgia, died 1877.
 - 173. viii **Olin A. Graddick** was born 1858 in Georgia, died 1921. In the1900 census, he was age 42, and living alone in Pike County, Georgia.

- 174. ix **Laura J. Graddick** was born December 9, 1861 in Georgia, died November 2, 1950. In 1880 Laura was single, and living at home with her mother, Millicent.
- 175. x **Nora Graddick** was born in 1864 in Georgia. In the 1870 census, her name was spelled "Norah," but the rest of the time we found "Nora." She married **David F. Bennett** who was born about 1856. 62

In 1880 Nora was 16 and living at home with her mother, Millicent. In 1900 she was married, and her brother, Sidney, was living with her and her husband. In 1920, Sydney was still with them, and Nora was running a boarding house.

70. **Turner Graddick** (11.Daniel³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was found in only one census, the one of 1860. He and his wife and eight children, two girls, M. A. and M. L., and six boys, were enumerated in Harris County, Georgia. With the exception of Turner, their initials only were used instead of first names. Turner was age 46, born in South Carolina, a farmer, real estate valued at \$800 and personal property at \$570. His wife's first initial looks like an "R," but it is not very clear. Her second initial is definitely an "F". She was age 50 when the census was taken, and born in Georgia, as were all of the children. They had two more sons who were enumerated in Claiborne County, Mississippi, that year, A. and G., ages 23 and 22 respectively. We have found no further reference to Turner or his wife; but most, if not all, of the rest of the family turned up later in Mississippi. We have used their full names if we have discovered them in later documents. All of the birth years entered below for the children are based on the ages given in the 1860 census except for Griffing, Merrit and Oran.

November 17, 1842, in Harris County, Georgia.⁶⁴ He was born November 29, 1821, in Newton County, Georgia (son of Thomas Hamby and Esther Brooks), and died July 11, 1885, in Harris County, Georgia. They are both buried in Clower's Cemetery, Harris County, Georgia.⁶⁵

- 186. i **Thomas D. Hamby** was born October 1843.⁶⁶
- 187. ii **John P. Hamby** was born about 1846.⁶⁷
- 188. iii **William J. Hamby** was born about 1849.⁶⁸
- 189. iv **Charles Hamby** was born about 1851.⁶⁹
- 190. iv **Mary F. Hamby** was born about 1854.⁷⁰
- 73. **Porter Gradick** (11.Daniel³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was 38 in the 1860 census of Harris County, Georgia. He was born in Richland County, South Carolina. He married **Mary Jane Lynch** on December 17, 1854, in Harris County, Georgia. She was 28 in the 1860 census.

Porter fought and died in the Civil War as a Confederate soldier. He enlisted as a private in Company F, 64th Regiment of the Georgia Infantry on August 4, 1863 at Columbia, Georgia. On August 17, 1864, he was admitted to the Receiving and Wayside Hospital, or General Hospital No. 9, in Richmond, Virginia, and was transferred to Jackson Hospital in Richmond the next day. His service record from the National Archives gives two different dates of death, September 6, 1864, and October 2, 1864. The diagnosis is unclear to this compiler, and it is not specified whether due to illness or injury.⁷²

- 76. **Charles Christian Gradick** (13.Christian³, 3.Richard², 1.Julius¹) was born about 1800 in Charleston, South Carolina.⁷⁴ He married **Caroline S.** (surname unknown). She was born about 1802 in South Carolina.⁷⁵ Charles died December 10, 1875, at Charleston.⁷⁶

On July 27, 1821, Charles Gradick was the third party to a pre-marital agreement between Mary D. Hermen and Richard H. Gradick. (See notes with #75, Richard H. Gradick.) In the body of

the document he was called Charles Gradick; but he signed as Christian C. Gradick. This is the only place where we have found his use of the name Christian. This is significant because it adds weight to the probability that he was, indeed, a son of Christian.

Charles, as head of household, was enumerated in every census from 1830 through 1870 when the census taker visited on June 24 of that year. Still living in Charleston, this was the last record that we found of Charles or Caroline. Two of their children, Edward and Caroline, were still at home. Also another couple was living with them, John and Marg Clark, ages 43 and 40.

In 1850 Charles' real property was valued at \$5000, and his occupation was butcher. He was age 50, and Caroline 48. The names of all of the children except Mary A. were enumerated with them in that census. Rebecca, listed as Rebecca Phillips, age 20, and John D. Phillips, age 23, attorney at law, were living in the household and had been married within the year. We have assumed that Rebecca was a daughter of the family, and that she and her husband were living with her parents.

We have added the daughter, Mary A. Gradick, as a result of finding a marriage notice in the South Carolina Magazine of Ancestral History, Volume 70, page 196, of John G. Chalk to Mary A. Gradick on March 10, 1842. (See notes with # 193, Mary A. Gradick below.)

There may also have been an older son in the Charles Christian Gradick family, as there was a male under the age of five enumerated in the C. C. Gradick home in Charleston in 1830.

In the 1860 census the two youngest children, Sarah and Elira were missing; added were Laura A. Gradick, wife of Charles Jr., and their two children, Alice A. and Walter. The middle initials for most of the children were added in that census.

At the Charleston Library Society we were able to view microfilm of old Charleston City Directories from 1782. We found the following listings:

Charles C. Gradick, in the directory of 1822, as C. C. Gradick, grocer, at 82 Church.

In the 1829 directory for Charleston Neck, C. Gradick with a grocery at the south west corner of Elizabeth & John streets.

The 1831 listing in the directory for Charleston Neck was the same as in 1829, except for the double initials of C. C. for Charles.

In 1836, in a supplement to the Charleston City Directory, C. C. Graddick was at the corner of Boundary & Middle Streets.

In 1837/38 in the Charleston City Directory, his name was entered as C. C. Gradick, grocer, at the corner of Boundary and Middle Streets.

The 1840/41 entry was the same as 1837/38.

In 1849 there was C. C. Graddick, butcher, at 28 Boundary Street.

In 1852, C. C. Gradick, butcher, residence at 28 Calhoun Street.

In 1855, C. C. Graddick, butcher, 11 Market Street, residence at 26 Calhoun Street.

In 1859 Charles C. Gradick was in the Charleston directory as a butcher, living at 26 Calhoun Street. Also, at the same address, were Charles C. Gradick Jr. an engineer, Edward W. Gradick, a bricklayer, Henry Gradick, an engineer, and Wm. D. Gradick, an engineer.

There were no directories for the years 1860 through 1865.

Children:

193. i Mary A. Gradick was born about 1824 judging by the 1850 census. She married John G. Chalk. He was born in October 1821 in England. They had one child, who may have died at an early age. Mary died before 1900. John was still living at the age of 89 in 1910.

In the South Carolina Magazine of Ancestral History, Volume 70, page 196, there is an abstract of a notice of a marriage performed by Dr. Bachman (sometimes spelled Backman) of John G. Chalk to Mary A. Gradick on March 10, 1842. In the 1850 census of Charleston, we found John G. Chalk and his wife, Mary A., living next door to Charles and Caroline Gradick; John was 27, and Mary 26. Also in that census, the box was checked indicating that John had been married within the year. This is curious since it disagrees with the marriage notice mentioned above. Obviously there is an error somewhere.

In the 1860 census, Mary's younger brother, John G. Gradick, age 15, was enumerated in their home; but the boy was also enumerated in his parents' home that year. There was also a ten months old male child with the Chalk surname. The first name is unclear. It could be Florence although we usually think of that as a female name. We did not find this family in the 1870 census, but we found John and Mary, just the two of them, in the 1880 census still living in Charleston. Their son would have been twenty-one years old by this time, but we have no knowledge of what happened to the child.

In 1900 John G. Chalk was a widower living with the John Gibbs Gradick family. He was also the enumerator for the district. He wrote beautifully, neatly, and legibly. Would that all enumerators had written as well! We also learn from this census that John Chalk came to the United States in 1824.

In the 1910 census, John Chalk, age 89, widower, and brother-in-law, was still living with the John Gibbs Gradick family. John Gradick had died, and Hilmer, his wife, as a widow, was head of the household. John Chalk is clearly designated as brother-in-law to the family head. This then gives clear evidence as to the relationship of the Chalk and Gradick families.

- 194. ii **Rebecca Gradick** was born about 1830 in Charleston, South Carolina. She married **John D. Phillips** 1849 to1850. Rebecca and John were enumerated in the home of her parents in 1850; he was 23, an attorney, and she was 20. They had been married within the year.
- + 195. iii Charles C. Gradick Jr. was born about 1832.
 - 196. iv **Henry B. Gradick** was born about 1834 in Charleston, South Carolina. ⁷⁸ In the 1852 directory for the city of Charleston, Henry was listed as a clerk for the South Carolina Railroad, with residence at 28 Calhoun Street, which was also the home of his father and brother, Charles Jr. In the 1859 directory, he and his

brothers, Charles Jr., Edward, and William were all living in the home of their father at 26 Calhoun. Henry was an engineer. There were no directories for 1860 through 1865. We did not find him in any later directory, but he was enumerated in the 1860 Federal census in the home of his parents, at age 25. We have not found him in any later census.

197. v **William B. Gradick** was enumerated in the 1850 Federal census in the household of his father at the age of thirteen, which would make his year of birth about 1837.

In 1859 he was listed as **William D. Gradick** in the Charleston City Directory, an engineer, living at the residence of his parents at 26 Calhoun Street.

In the 1860 census he was given the middle initial "B", still living with his parents, age twenty-three, occupation engineer.

On January 16, 1893, W. D. Gradick bought two lots in Alachua County, Florida, from J. B. and Margaret Blake, described as being Lots 18 & 19 in Section 36, Township 11 South, Range 21 East for one hundred dollars. On December 29, 1902, he sold these lots to J. S. Bashaw for three hundred dollars. It is interesting to note that on the latter deed, William is described as a bachelor.⁷⁹

On May 10, 1910, W. D. Graddick, age 73, single, born in South Carolina, parents born in South Carolina was enumerated at Island Grove, in Alachua County, Florida. He owned and operated a peanut farm there. It is of note that William's brother, Edward W. Gradick (see below), was living at Island Grove, Florida, in 1907.

198. vi **Edward W. Gradick** was born about 1840 in Charleston, South Carolina, and died about 1908. 80

In 1850, at age 10, Edward was enumerated for the Federal census in the household of his father in Charleston, South Carolina. In 1859 he was listed in the Charleston City Directory as a bricklayer, living at 26 Calhoun Street, the home of his parents. In the 1860 and 1870 censuses he was a bricklayer or mason, and still living in the home of his parents. In the 1880 census Edward was single and living in his brother John's household in Charleston. In the Charleston Directory of 1882 he was boarding at 4 Islington Court, and in the directories of 1888, '89, '90, '91, and '98 he was living at 9 Morris Street.

On August 27, 1883, Edward W. Gradick, of Charleston, South Carolina, bought ten acres of land in Alachua County, Florida, from Joseph B. and Margaret Blake for three hundred dollars. It was described as being in Section 36, Township 11 South, Range 21 East. 81

On August 16, 1907, Edward was living at Island Grove, Alachua County, Florida, when he applied for a Civil War pension. He stated that he was born in Charleston, South Carolina in 1838, and that he had lived in Florida for 15 years. He had joined as a private in the South Carolina 1st Infantry, Hagood's Brigade, in 1860. This brigade was formed before the Civil War had actually begun, and was active in the defense of Charleston right from the start. In 1862, it became Company E, of the 27th Regiment, South Carolina Volunteers. Edward's captain throughout his entire time of service was W. D. Walters. The brigade continued in service at Charleston until 1864, when it went north to join the fighting in Virginia with General Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia. Edward was present at many engagements around Richmond and was wounded in an attempt to recapture a portion of the Weldon Railroad on August 21, 1864, during the siege of Petersburg, Virginia. On February 21, 1865, he was taken prisoner in the battle of Town Creek, North Carolina, and held prisoner at Point Lookout, Maryland, until his release at the close of the war in April 1865.

- 199. vii **Martha E. Gradick** was born about 1842 in Charleston, South Carolina. She was enumerated with her parents and siblings in both the 1850 and 1860 censuses. She was reported to be 8 years old when the census taker called on October 9, 1850. She was 19 in 1860.
- 200. viii **Caroline S. Gradick** was born about 1844 in Charleston, South Carolina. She married **M. C. Scott** on January 13, 1876. Caroline was enumerated with her parents and siblings in both the 1850 and 1860 censuses. She was still at home, age 35, in 1870, and enumerated as Carrie.
- + 201. ix John Gibbs Gradick was born May 8, 1845.
 - 202. x **Emma T. Gradick** was born about 1847 in Charleston, South Carolina. Emma was three years old when the census was taken in 1850, and thirteen in the 1860 census. We have not found any further record of her.
 - 203. xi **Sarah E. Gradick** was born about 1848 in Charleston, South Carolina. She was found only in the 1850 census at the age of two. She was missing from the 1860 census.
 - 204. xii **Elira Gradick** was born about 1849 in Charleston, South Carolina. She was only one year old when her name was entered in the census of 1850 on October 9 of that year. We did not find her name again in any later census.
- 78. **John N. Gradick** (13.Christian³, 3.Richard², 1.Julius¹) was born about 1810 in Charleston, South Carolina. He married (1) **Eliza C. Johnson** on August 8, 1832, in Charleston. She was born in South Carolina, ⁸⁵ and died between 1846 and 1849 in Alabama. He married (2) **Jane C. Pearson** on June 5, 1849, in Alabama. She was born June 1827 in Alabama. ⁸⁶ John died 1880-1900.

When we first started to ask among the older folks in Texas about where the family came from, they all said that the Gradicks came from Alabama. We were told that Bob's great-grandfather, Henry Gradick, always talked about going back to Alabama; and, indeed, his eldest child was even nicknamed Bammie. We also found Henry's birthplace entered as Alabama in the 1860 census of Upshur County, Texas. It seemed that if we wanted to trace the family back any further, we had better look to Alabama, and sure enough, we found Henry W. Gradick, at age 16, in the 1850 census of Bibb County. He was enumerated there in the household of John N. Gradick, and his birthplace, was given as South Carolina. So now we were back another generation.

John N. Gradick was age 36, a physician, born in South Carolina. Jane C., his wife, was age 22, and born in Alabama. They had been married within the year. There were also Christian P. Gradick, age 11, born in Alabama, Laura A. Gradick, age 4, born in Alabama, and Mary G. Gradick, age 4 months, born in Alabama. The enumeration took place on September 17, 1850. This told us that John had been married twice, the first time in South Carolina, and that the family had moved to Alabama between the births of Henry and Christian, that is between 1834 and 1839. John's first wife must have died after the birth of the little girl Laura.

One day in March 1999, when we were doing research at the Toledo Lucas County Public Library in Toledo, Ohio, not far from where we live, we came across a bound copy of volumes of the South Carolina Magazine of Ancestral Research; and in Volume 8, No. 1, Winter, 1980, on page 6, in an article entitled, "Marriages Performed by Rev. Basil Manly," we found the following: "John N. Gradick & Miss Eliza C. Johnson, Aug 8, 1832, in house on Logan St. by Rev. Basil Manly." Imagine us finding this in Toledo, Ohio; this is what I call serendipity! We later learned that the Rev. Basil Manly Sr. had been pastor of the First Baptist Church in Charleston, South Carolina, until 1837, when he had accepted the position of president of the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa. When he went to Tuscaloosa, he took his marriage register with him, where it is presently preserved. A Miss Sara Walls of that city discovered it, copied it, and contributed the copy to the above named periodical for publication.

Much later we found a record of John's second marriage on the Internet. It was here that we found Jane's full name, and also the exact date of their marriage. They were married by a Justice of the Peace in Perry County.⁸⁷

J. N. Gradick was listed in the Charleston City Directory of 1835/1836, occupation carpenter, residence at the east end of Laurens Street.

In the 1837/1838 directory he was listed as John N. Gradick, carpenter, at 6 Laurens St. Since he was in South Carolina in 1838, the family must have moved in late 1838 or in 1839 in order for Christian to be born in Alabama.

On November 1, 1858, John was granted a deed by the United States Government to forty acres of land in what appears to be present-day Chilton County, Alabama. On the patent John was

said to be "of Bibb County, Alabama." Chilton County was not formed until December 30, 1868, from land taken from Autauga, Bibb, Perry, and Shelby counties, so it is probable that the land in question was in that part of Bibb County that became a part of Chilton.

Also, we have found, in a history book of Chilton County, ⁸⁸ a record of John N. Gradick as the first clerk for the newly formed Unity Baptist Association in 1855.

In the 1860 census, J. N. Graddick was at Fayetteville Post Office, in Talladega County, Alabama, age 50, born in South Carolina, physician, value of real property \$500, value of personal property \$1000. Also in the household were Jane C., age 30; Laura, age 15; Mary, age 9; and a new arrival in the family, Elizabeth, age 6. All but John were born in Alabama. The census page was dated June 18, 1860. It seems that in the 10 years between censuses John had aged 14 years while Jane was only 8 years older. I guess this teaches that we need to allow some leeway in trying to fix a birth date through the census. Also we note that Henry W. and Christian P. were missing. We found Henry in Upshur County, Texas; but so far we have not found Christian again. There was also listed 1 slave, age 45, color black, sex female, no name given. She would have been part of the personal property as valued above.

In browsing the Internet one day in June of 2004, Bob (co-researcher) searched for "Gradick" in Google (for the uninitiated, this is a search engine), and came across a reference to John N. Gradick. We followed up on this, and it led to a site that listed patents that had been issued by the Confederate Patent Office. John N. Gradick of Fayetteville, Alabama, was on the list, having applied for and been issued a patent for a washing machine on November 26, 1861.89 We found this particularly interesting because we hadn't even known that there ever was a Confederate Patent Office—never really thought about it. We discovered that this patent office was in existence from May 1861 until April 1865. On May 21, 1861, the Confederate government in Montgomery, Alabama, before moving to Richmond, Virginia, passed an act to establish a patent office. The appointment of the first Commissioner of Patents, Rufus Randolph Rhodes, was announced in early July 1861, and the office opened for business in the newly established capital at Richmond. The first patent was issued on August 1, 1861. There were only 266 patents issued by the end of 1864. There may have been a few issued in 1865, but there is no known record of them. John Gradick's was number 48. As the Civil War neared an end, on April 3, 1865, during the evacuation of Richmond, Confederate troops set fire to a warehouse in the central city to prevent the approaching Union troops from taking the contents. The fire spread to other buildings. including the one housing the patent office, and almost all of the records and the models were

In 1870, the three daughters of the family were still at home with their parents; but the family had moved again, and was now in Selma in Dallas County. Henry was sixty, and now a druggist, Jane (nicknamed Jennie in this census) was thirty-five, and the girls twenty, seventeen and fourteen respectively. Mary was listed as Mollie. The two younger girls were working outside the home as store clerks, while Laura was at home.

In 1880, still in Selma, John was listed as J. N. Gradick, retail druggist, age 70. Also there was Jane C., wife, age 45, and Laura A., daughter, age 30. The home was on Alabama Street. The two younger girls were no longer at home.

The women of the family seemed to keep shaving off some years as they went along; although, Jane may have added to her age when she first married John, since there was considerable difference in their ages. On the other hand, for the same reason, John may have subtracted a few years when they married.

As for John being a carpenter in South Carolina and a physician in Alabama, we did some digging into this while we were in South Carolina. What we found was that the first medical college in South Carolina, indeed the first in the southern states, The Medical College of South Carolina, graduated its first class in April 1825 in Charleston. At that time a degree could be earned in one year. We also reviewed a list of the graduates from 1825 through 1850 and found no Gradick. However, we did find a Richard North who graduated in 1830. Perhaps he was a member of John's mother's family. At any rate it was not unusual in those days for someone to practice the healing arts without a medical degree; and should not necessarily be looked upon as fraudulent. If indeed Richard North was related to John, he may have taught John some of the needed skills. Many doctors in those days learned their skills by serving an apprenticeship. As for becoming a druggist, I suppose too, that the requirements were far less rigorous than in later years.

We found Jane Gradick in the 1900 census in Selma, Alabama, listed as J. N. (her husband's initials) Gradick, head of a household, with her daughter, W. H. (husband's initials) Green, and four of her grandchildren living with her. They were still living on Alabama Street, at number 1211, and Jane owned the home free of mortgage. Both of the women were widowed. Jane's birth date was given as June 1827. She was 72 years old. This is probably accurate. We also found Jane in a 1904 edition of the Selma city directory at that same address, listed as "Gradick, Pearson C. (wid John N.)"

In the 1906-1907 directory, at 1211 Alabama Street, there were just "Mrs. Elizabeth H. Greene, widow, Miss Ella Green, Gilbert H. Greene physical director YMCA, and Northie Greene clerk Forbes Piano Co."

In the 1909 directory, there was someone new at the Alabama street address, and there were no other entries for any of the Green (Greene) family.

We can't prove it, but we think that John's middle initial probably stood for North, his mother's maiden name. Two of his grandsons were given the name of North, North Greene (#399) and Wylie North Gradick (#388), son of Henry Winthrop Gradick.

He would have been 21 when the war began, and surely he would have enlisted in the cause of the South—virtually all of the men enlisted.

In February 1999, we found a record at the Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana, in a register of soldiers who died in the north during the Civil

War, "Gradick, John P., Pvt. Co. B, Roddy's Alabama Cavalry, date of death February 23, 1865, grave number 1395, Confederate Cemetery at Camp Chase, Columbus, Ohio." In July 2000, we traveled to Columbus, in our own State of Ohio, and visited Camp Chase Confederate Cemetery and found the tombstone pictured here. It is not engraved with a date of death, and instead of the first name, "John," there is only the initial "J". Could it be Christian? We thought it possible, especially since our research had not found any other Gradick family in Alabama at the time of the Civil War. There could easily have been a mistake in the first initial on the-tombstone. Maybe it should have been C. P. Gradick.



However, upon making another trip to Columbus (October 28, 2004), we have found quite a mix up in the records of the Camp Chase interments. One record that we found on microfilm at the Ohio State Archives in Columbus, was a report by Chaplain D. W. Tolford, Made to & by Order of His Excellency Jacob D. Cox, Governor of Ohio, entitled *Book of the Confederate Dead, Buried in the Vicinity of the Principal Camps, Posts & Hospitals Lately in Existence in the State of Ohio.* It is dated 1866, and much of it is devoted to Camp Chase. It appears to be a day-to-day record of deaths in the camp, and there is a J. Gradick, died February 23, 1865, Company B, Roberts Cavalry, Mississippi (not Roddy's Alabama Cavalry), grave number 1395. Also, on the same page is **A. S. Graddick**, died February 17, 1865, H Alabama Cavalry, grave number 1309. (There is no tombstone with this name—we looked.) To add to the confusion, we viewed another record on the same microfilm roll, entitled *Record Book of Burials at Greenlawn & Camp Chase 1863-1865*, compiled in 1871. In it there is another record of Camp Chase burials

that lists J. P. Gradick, Company B, Regiment R (I think it is R), Mississippi Cavalry, February 23, 1865, grave number 1354.

There are over two thousand marble tombstones in the cemetery. We examined all of the ones numbered in the 1300s, and there was only one "Gradick"—no "Graddick." These headstones were not placed until 1906 or 1936—there seems to be some confusion about the year for that, too—and they do not, in most instances, mark the actual burial place of the named soldier

I think the identity of any Gradick or Graddick soldier buried at Camp Chase Cemetery will have to remain a mystery. There must have been many soldiers and sailors on both sides in the Civil War who were missing when the war was over, and whose families never knew what happened to them. Maybe Christian (Kit) Gradick was one of them.

207. iii **Laura A. Gradick** was born 1845/46 in Alabama. She married **John W. Glass** on December 27, 1891, in Dallas County, Alabama. ⁹³ John was born about 1837.

Laura Gradick was reported to be four years old in the 1850 census that was taken on September 17 of that year. In the 1860 census she was fifteen, in 1870 twenty, in 1880 thirty; and when she married John Glass in 1891, she was reported to be thirty-seven. We assume that the 1850 census is the most reliable.



107. **Whitfield D. D. Gradick** (28.John⁴, 6.John³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born December 12,1841, in Richland County, South Carolina. He married **Florilla Melvina Witt** about 1861. She was born July 31,1841.

On August 25, 1861, at the age of twenty, Whitfield enlisted for the duration of the Civil War, as a private in Captain D. C. Tomkins' Company K, 14th Regiment of the South Carolina Infantry. Seven and a half months later, on April 7, 1862, his wife died in Edgefield County, South Carolina. She is buried at Trinity Lutheran Church Cemetery, Saluda County, South Carolina.³ It seems probable that her death was associated with the birth of their daughter, Lilly.

Whitfield was appointed Corporal on January 29, 1863. He was wounded in the Battle of Gettysburg on July 1 of that same year, and taken prisoner. He was hospitalized at De Camp General Hospital, Davids Island, New York Harbor. He was paroled—date of parole is not recorded. He was admitted to Episcopal Church Hospital, Williamsburg, Virginia on September 8, 1863, with a complaint concerning his left leg, and was furloughed from there on September 13, 1863. He was allowed to go home on leave during January and February 1864, and was detailed to the Conscription Department in Edgefield District, South Carolina on April 18, 1864.

He married **Eliza Coleman** (date of marriage unknown). She was born October 18, 1845.⁵ They had three children by the time the 1870 census was taken on August 30 of that year. The family was enumerated in the census of Saluda Division, Edgefield County, South Carolina, with Whitfield as head of household, age at last birthday 28, Eliza 24, Lilly 8, Fletcher 5, Sophia 3, and Edwin 1. Whitfield was a farmer having real estate valued at \$1,000 and personal property \$500. The microfilm of this census was not very clear.

Whitfield died October 18, 1876, in Edgefield County.⁶

The 1880 census was much easier to read and we were better able to decipher the names. In 1880 Eliza was head of household, and there were two more children, Mary, age 9, and Regina Gradick, 6 months old, born in December 1879. Regina was possibly a child of Lilly. For marital status for Lilly, there was an erasure in the 'Single' column, and a mark in the 'Married' column, but she retained the Gradick surname.

Eliza died May 22, 1905. She must have married again as her tombstone reads Eliza Graddick Smith, erected by her father A. T. Coleman. Both Whitfield and Eliza are buried at the Butler Methodist Church Cemetery, Saluda County.⁷

They are both buried in Silverbrook Cemetery, Anderson, South Carolina.

Elias and Ellen were enumerated in the Saluda division of Edgefield County, South Carolina, on August 30, 1870. Elias was age 25, Ellen 18, and their baby girl, Charlotte, had been born in April. Elias' mother, Ibeline, was age 50 and living with them. Elias' occupation was farm laborer, and the value of his personal property was \$250.

In 1880 they were still in Edgefield County; Ibelina was still with them, and they had five more children.

In 1900, Ellen was enumerated in Newberry City, Newberry County, as head of a household with daughters, Maggie Graddick, Petula Graddick, Carrie Henderson, and Alma Johnson, and with son, John W., son-in-law, William A. Johnson, little granddaughter, Maud Henderson and nephew, James W. Ethridge. They were living in a rented house and all of the adults except Ellen were working as weavers in a cotton mill. In the meantime Elias (Grattick on this record) was enumerated on the home farm in Saluda County, living alone. Ellen was the mother of eleven children, eight living.

In 1910, the family was living in Anderson City, and Elias was a mail carrier.

Elias' name is given as Elias B. S. Gradick in the 1850 census, and it is the same in his father's will as abstracted by Leonardo Andrea; but it is Elias B. L. Graddick in a transcribed copy of his father's will received from the South Carolina Department of Archives and History. This copy is typed. It was probably copied by a WPA worker during the 1930s. Either record could be in error.

In the 1880 census, Charles was named Mickler Graddick, but in 1910 he was enumerated as Charlie M. Graddick. He and his wife, Victoria, were living in Anderson City, Anderson County, South Carolina. Charlie was 34 and Victoria 26. They had been married for eight years, and had had four children, with only three living. They were Charlie 7, Lillian 4, and Thelma N. 11 months.

In 1920 they were living on Murray Avenue in Anderson City, and only the two girls were with them.

In 1930, Victoria Graddick, a widow, was enumerated with the family of Charles D. Cox, in Florence County, South Carolina, designated as a sister to the head of the house. Since her maiden name was Boswell, it is probable that she was a sister-in-law to Charles Cox.

- 243. v Louise J. Graddick was born October 10, 1877, in Saluda, Edgefield County, South Carolina. She married (1) John A. Bennett. She married (2) J. T. Kendall. Louise died June 18, 1962, in Anderson, Anderson County, South Carolina.
- 244. vi Caroline E. Graddick was born November 17, 1879, in Edgefield County, South Carolina. She married **John Thomas Henderson**. He died Jun 1, 1938. Caroline died December 12, 1927, in Opelika, Lee County, Alabama.
- + 245. vii John Whitfield Graddick was born December 19, 1881.
 - 246. viii **Mary Alma Graddick** was born July 30, 1884, in Saluda, Edgefield County, South Carolina. She married **William A. Johnson.** He was born March 25, 1880, and died April 9, 1948. Mary died November 2, 1969, in Anderson, Anderson County, South Carolina.
 - 247. ix **Frances Petula Graddick** was born September 18, 1886, in Saluda, Edgefield County, South Carolina. She married **Jake A. Stillwell**. He died in 1946. Frances died March 6, 1966, in Phoenix, Arizona.

Frances Petula was usually called Petula in the census returns, but in the 1910 census of Fulton County, Georgia, she was listed as "Patular Graddick," boarding in the home of Raymond Aley, and working as a milliner.

- 248. x **Jesse Elias Graddick** was born April 17, 1889, in Newberry, Newberry County, South Carolina. He died August 1, 1890, in Newberry, and is buried at Rosemont Cemetery, in the same city.
- 249. xi **Ellen Lenora Graddick** was born January 9, 1892, in Newberry, Newberry County, South Carolina, and died May 29, 1895, in Newberry.
- 109. **John Franklin S. Gradick** (28.John⁴, 6.John³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹). According to Kacky Owen's information on the Internet, John was born December 24, 1847, ¹³ but in the transcripts of the tombstones of Colony Lutheran Church Cemetery by John Hawkins, also on the Internet, John's date of birth is given as 1855 (compiler has no explanation for the discrepancy in these dates). ¹⁴ He married **Mary** (surname unknown). She was born about 1840 in South

Carolina. ¹⁵ John died June 25, 1928, and is buried at Colony Lutheran Church Cemetery, Newberry County, South Carolina. He is probably the "**J. F. Graddock**" listed in the Civil War Soldiers and Sailors System ¹⁶ as having served during the Civil War in the 7th Regiment, South Carolina Infantry.

John and Mary were enumerated in the Saluda division of Edgefield County in 1870. John was age 22 and Mary 30. They had one child, Eva, who was one year old. John's occupation was farm labor. He may have been a posthumous child since he was not mentioned in his father's will (See notes with # 28, John Gradick Jr.)

In the 1900 census, sons Christian and Whitfield were both living at home in Newberry with their parents. The months and years of birth were given in this census for all four of them. Daughter, Eva, was not with them.

In 1910, son Martin was living with his father who was a widower, as was a grandson with the surname Lampson. This was probably a child of Eva.

There is a biographical sketch of Edward C. Gradick in *Biographical Souvenir of the State of Texas*, published in 1889.²¹ In it we find that Edward served a four-year apprenticeship as a carriage maker (presumably in South Carolina), and worked at that trade for ten years before moving to Aubrey, Texas. There he was a merchandiser of dry goods and groceries for four years before opening a furniture and undertaking establishment. The biography goes on to say that he married Miss Willie C. Williams on August 7, 1886, and "one bright little daughter, Tennie F., sheds sunshine in the home of this happy couple."

The 1900 census of Collin County, Texas, listed Edward and Willie with their first five children, giving the months and years of birth for each of them.

In the 1910 census of the same county, three more children had been added to the family, sons Monroe, age 10, Ray, age 4, and Fletcher, age four months.

In 1920, Willie was the head of the household. Tennie was still at home and single. There were also three sons still at home, Bailey, Ray and Fletcher. Since Willie was head of the home, we must assume that Edward had died between 1910 and 1920.

In 1930 Willie was living with her son Willoughby. Fletcher was living with them too; and Monroe and his family lived next door, still in Collin County, Texas.

The months and years of births of all members of the family were given in this census. In 1910, the family was enumerated on Cedar Creek Road in Richland County. There was one more child, Boyd B.

Graddick, age 7. James was a farmer and owned his farm free of mortgage. James and Lizzie were 64 and 56 when the 1930 census was taken. They had been married at ages 25 and 17.

118. Martha (Mattie) Graddick (34.David⁴, 6.John³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born in 1870. She married Noah Edward Frick. He was born October 15, 1868, in South Carolina. Martha died June 19, 1957. They are both buried at St. Andrew Lutheran Church Cemetery, Blythewood, South Carolina.³¹

Virgil Williams (see footnote 28) gives Mattie's date of birth as September 9, 1867, but there is a discrepancy, since this would make Susan's and Mattie's birthdates too close together; also the 1900 census gives Mattie's age as 29, and year of birth as 1870.

The dates of birth for the first five of the following children are based on the 1900 census of Richland County, South Carolina; and for the remaining five children on the 1920 census of the same place.



County, Florida. She was born March 15, 1841, in Effingham County, Georgia,³⁹ and died November 23, 1920, in Jacksonville, Duval County, Florida. Henry died December 6, 1907, in Jacksonville.⁴⁰ They are both buried in Evergreen Cemetery, Jacksonville, Florida.⁴¹

On September 25, 1850, Henry P. Gradick was enumerated in the home of his parents in Richland County, South Carolina, at the age of fourteen. Fifty-three years later, on October 7, 1903, he filed a claim for a Civil War pension in Duval County, Florida, swearing that he was born on the first day of January, but omitting the year. From this we have deduced that he was born on January 1, 1836.⁴²

Henry would have been about 16 years old when he moved with his family to Florida from Richland County, South Carolina, in 1852.

About March 1, 1862, he enlisted as a private in Capt. Row's Independent Company of Cavalry, Florida Volunteers, in Alachua County. This company with nine other independent companies was consolidated on December 4, 1862, to form the 2nd Regiment Florida Cavalry, and it became Company F of that regiment. He served with his regiment in Florida until the close of the Civil War when he was honorably discharged on May 23, 1865, at Baldwin, Florida.⁴³

According to Geraldine Radencic, née Gradick, of Malabar, Florida, in 1868 Henry and Eliza and their children moved from Alachua County, Florida, to Geneva, Florida. They traveled in a covered wagon with three horses, two mules and a horse and buggy. The trip took four days. When they reached Geneva, Henry bought an orange grove that he improved to 80 acres plus 200 acres of wild land. She says that he loved hunting and the outdoors, and that he also practiced taxidermy. She describes him as being of medium height and with blue eyes and auburn hair. Geri is a granddaughter of Henry Patrick and Eliza, and although her grandfather died before she was born, I suppose that she learned about her grandparents from her own father and her aunts and uncle.

In 1878 Henry acquired from the Federal Government 79.73 acres of land described as being located in Section 23, Twp. 30, Range 32 E, Tallahassee Meridian. This was a cash sale. ⁴⁴ This may have been the 80 acres referred to by Geri above. Nearly all the land sold by the Federal

Government to individual settlers on and after July 1, 1820, was sold for cash at no less than \$1.25 an acre.

We know that Henry was also the recipient of 316 acres of land, once his father's property, in Alachua County (see notes with Henry J. Gradick, # 57).

In the winter of 1894/1895 came the "Big Freeze", and the orange trees were lost. With determination, Henry replanted, only to be devastated by another freeze in 1898. It was then that he and Eliza moved to a small place near Jacksonville to be closer to their children. He died at the home of his son, Walter. 45

At the time of his application for a Civil War pension, Henry's Post Office address was Dewey, Florida, in Duval County. He stated that he had resided in the State of Florida since 1853.

On December 31, 1907, Eliza filed for and was granted a civil war widow's pension. In the application she said that she had moved to Florida in 1850. She filed a second updated application on August 9, 1909, when a new pension act was passed by the Florida legislature. In this application she said that she owned real estate valued at \$300 and personal property valued at \$100 in St. John's County; and that she was living at the corner of Gilmore and Margaret Streets in Jacksonville in Duval County. This second application was witnessed by her daughter, Ella G. Koonce. 46

There is a chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy in Melbourne, Florida, named for Henry Patrick Gradick. Geraldine Radencic was the chartering president of the chapter.

At the age of 78, Eliza was enumerated in the 1920 census in the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Lula and James Lytle in Jacksonville.

The birthdates of the following children are from a page of births from a Gradick Family Bible, a copy of which was provided to this compiler by Geraldine Radencic, née Gradick, granddaughter of Henry and Eliza.

- 124. **Nicholas W. Gradick** (39.Mary⁴, 7.Catherine³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) and (57.Henry⁴, 10.Andrew³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born September 1, 1837, in Richland County, South Carolina. He married **Maggie King**. She died between 1885 and 1900. Nicholas died January 2, 1916. 1

Nicholas was about fifteen years old when he moved with his parents and siblings from Richland County, South Carolina, to Alachua County, Florida, near what is now Gainesville.

As a young man, he went off to fight in the Seminole Indian Wars. This must have been during what is sometimes called the Final Seminole Indian War that took place from 1855 to 1858.

In September 1861, he enlisted at Ocala, Marion County, Florida, to fight for the South in the American Civil War. He served in Captain William Owen's Company C, 2nd Florida Cavalry Regiment, until he was honorably discharged at the close of the war in May of 1865.⁵²

On December 22, 1875, his mother conveyed to him for \$1.00 and love and affection, 315 acres of land in Alachua County, described as the North 1/2 of Section 36, Township 10, Range 21. (See notes with Mary Magdalene Wyrick, # 39.)

In June 1880, Nicholas was enumerated in Alachua County, Florida, along with his wife, Maggie and their three children, Mary age 10, Edward age 6, and Lula 9 months. Nicholas' age was given as 43, and Maggie's as 30. Nicholas was a farmer. There was also a boarder living with them, James King, age 24, probably a brother of Maggie. In subsequent documents, the boy, Edward, was called Addison. Laura May Gradick, née Emerson, in a book compiled for her family, refers to him as "Addison, called Ed." Also in her book, Laura writes that there was another child, Annie Rebecca Gradick, who is buried between Nicholas and Henry J. Gradick—she calls him Henry P. Gradick—in the Baptist Cemetery at Hawthorne, Florida.

On December 7, 1885, Nicholas and Maggie sold their land in Alachua County to one Charles M. Chapman for \$316.00.⁵⁴ It was probably around this time that the family moved to Polk County.

On January 6, 1902, Nicholas applied for a Civil War pension from the State of Florida, stating that he was a widower, born September 1, 1836, in Richland District, South Carolina; and was now residing at Haines City in Polk County, Florida. The pension was granted at the rate of \$96.00 per year. For a time he must have received a pension as a veteran of the Seminole War, since on August 21, 1907, he applied to have his Civil War pension reinstated, saying that he had stopped drawing it upon receiving a pension from the United States government as a veteran of the Seminole War. His Civil War pension was reinstated at the rate of \$100.00 per year. In 1909, the rate was increased to \$120.00, and there is in his file an application for a further increase dated September 10, 1913. There is no document to show whether or not it was granted. All of these documents were executed in Haines City, Florida. ⁵⁵

318. i **Katherine Mary Gradick**, sometimes called Mary Kate, was born February 3, 1871.⁵⁶ She married **Edward F. Canova**. Katherine died in 1956 in Duval County, Florida.⁵⁷

On June 13, 1900, when the census-taker called, Edward and Katherine were living at 1603 Florida Avenue in Jacksonville. They had been married for three years. Katherine had no children, but Edward had two, a son, Leroy, age 8, and a daughter, Agnes, age 4. Katherine's brother and sister were also living with them. In the 1910 census, Katherine still had no children. She was listed as Katherine M. Canova in both censuses, but in the Florida Death Index, she is listed as Cathrine Graddick Canova.

Homer Harold Schwarz, a great-grandson of Nicholas' brother, Henry, wrote that Mary Kate, at age 10, often used to drive her grandmother, Mary Gradick, to church on Sundays using the old horse, Pierce, that her son, Dodge, had used when he went to war. ⁵⁸

319. ii **Addison R. Gradick** was born May 1, 1873,⁵⁹ and died in 1945 in Jacksonville, Florida.⁶⁰

Addison first appears as Edward, at age 6, in the census of 1880 in Alachua County, Florida, with his parents and sisters, Mary and Lula. They lived near Grandmother Mary and Uncle Edward, Aunt Lillie, and little cousin, Minnie. We have seen that the family moved to Haines City, Florida, probably in 1885 or 1886.

In 1900, at age 27, Addison was living in Jacksonville, Florida, on Florida Avenue, along with his sister, Lula, in the home of their sister, Katherine, and her husband,

Edward Canova. He was a fireman on a boat. (The census has "S boat." Might it be a shrimp boat?)

Laura May Gradick, née Emerson, wrote that Addison sailed around Cape Horn in 1898; and that, after the Jacksonville fire in 1901, he had a fishing camp at Eastport, Florida.⁶¹

In 1910, he was still living with Katherine and Edward, and was a stevedore at a lumber wharf.

By 1920 he had moved back to Haines City. He was enumerated on January 9 of that year as A. R. Graddick living on Dixie Highway. He was farming, and owned the farm on which he lived mortgage free. His sister, Lulu, and her husband, Everett Mann, were living with him. He was divorced.

In 1930, he was back in Jacksonville, married, and a fisherman. The enumerator visited on April 12. His age at last birthday was entered as 55, which would seem to be off by a year. Although he was listed as married; nevertheless, he was living alone. There was also a space on the 1930 census to enter age at first marriage. This was filled in with age 47. That would mean that he was married in 1920 or 1921; however, as we have seen, he was divorced as of January 9 of 1920. To sum up, he must have been married at least once, and possibly more than once. Perhaps further research could clear this up, and also discover the name or names of any wife or wives and if there were any children.

In the Florida Death Index, 1877-1998, Addison R. Graddick's death is recorded in Jacksonville, Florida in 1945.⁶²

320. iii **Lula Bernice Gradick** was born September 6, 1879, in Florida. ⁶³ She married **Everett C. Mann**, born about 1871. ⁶⁴ Lula died May 5, 1958, in Los Angeles, California.

According to the 1880 census, Lula was nine months old when the census taker called in June of that year, and her birth month was September. In 1900, on June 13, her age was entered as 18, and her month and year of birth as September 1881. In 1920, on January 9, she was entered in the census as age 36 as of her last birthday. The 1880 census is surely the most dependable.

We found no record of any children.

He married Lillian A. (surname unknown). She was born about 1861 in South Carolina.⁶⁶ Edward died in 1885 in Alachua County, Florida, 67 and is buried at First Baptist Church Cemetery in Hawthorne, Florida.⁶⁸

Edward enlisted as a private in Capt. Rou's Independent Company of Cavalry, Florida Volunteers, at Gainesville, Florida on May 17, 1862. He provided his own horse, and signed up for three years or until the end of the war. He was twenty years old. This company, with nine other independent companies, was consolidated on December 4, 1862, to form the 2nd Regiment Florida Cavalry, and it became Company F of that regiment. He served with his regiment in Florida until their surrender, under Major General Sam Jones, to the U.S. Forces at Baldwin, Florida, in May of 1865.⁶⁹

In the 1880 census, Edward was 38, Lillie 19, and daughter, Minnie N. was 3. Edward's mother, Mary, was living with them. Edward was a farmer.

Edward was only 44 when he died leaving a wife and young child. On April 28, 1890, Lillie A. Graddick was granted permission by the court of the County of Alachua, Florida, to sell, as guardian of the minor child, Minnie, the minor's one half interest in lands left by Edward W. Graddick. The description of this land is section 25, township 10 south, range 21 east, containing 320 acres. 70

Lillie remarried to Jack R. Reid. The marriage certificate was signed on March 22, 1893, and recorded in March 1895.71

166. **Gideon M. Graddick** (69.Reddick⁴, 11.Daniel³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born about 1840 in Georgia.⁸³ He married (1) **M. E. Fryer** in 1867, in Pike County, Georgia.⁸⁴ He married (2) **Mary A. Barlow** in 1872 in Pike County, Georgia.⁸⁵

Gideon enlisted as a private in Captain G. M. McDowell's Company D, 3rd Battalion, of the Georgia Volunteer Provisional Army of the Confederate States, in Cobb County, Georgia, on June 29, 1861. He was twenty-one years old, six feet three and a half inches tall, with fair complexion, blue eyes, and dark hair. He was by occupation a mechanic when he enlisted. The following is quoted from a letter signed by George M. McDowell, Company Commander, and included in Gideon's service record on file at the National Archives, "On the twelfth day of November last while the battalion was moving under orders from Virginia to Tennessee, he received severe injuries caused by the cars running off the track. The car in which he was riding was crushed and heavy boxes, and other baggage were thrown upon his body bruising almost every superficial muscle, tearing some of the pectoral muscles loose from their attachments, fracturing ribs, etc. Also producing internal injuries." It was dated April 23, 1862. Gideon was discharged as unfit for the duties of a soldier as a result of his injuries on May 26, 1862.

On August 8, 1870, Gideon was enumerated in Pike County, Georgia, as head of a household having only himself and two year old Eugene.

Gideon died in 1877, and is buried at Greenwood Cemetery, Barnesville, Georgia.⁸⁷

In the 1860 census Griffing, as G. Graddick, age 22, born in Georgia, was enumerated as an overseer on the plantation of Catherine and Fanny Graddick in Mississippi (see #'s 22 & 27). His brother, A. Graddick, age 23, was with him. All the rest of their family, father, mother and eight siblings were still back home in Georgia.

In 1863, Catherine Gradick, who was a first cousin to Griffing's father, Turner, conveyed property to "Sarah Gradick, wife of Griffing Gradick, for love and affection." 106

Griffing was the administrator of the estates of Francis Gradick and her sister, Catherine Gradick, after their deaths in 1863 and 1865.

In the 1870 and 1880 census returns, Griffing's wife was called Sallie. When she died, her name was reported as Sally in the newspaper, and on her tombstone, she is Sallie M. At first we thought that Griffing had married twice; but now we are quite sure that Sarah and Sallie are both names given to the same person. They had a daughter who was sometimes called Sarah, sometimes Sallie, and at least once, Sadie. In the 1870 census Ben W. Graddick, age 8, and Merrick Graddick, age 26, were living with Griffing and Sallie.

Griffing served on the Confederate side in the Civil War in Abbay's Battery, Company K, 1st Mississippi Light Artillery, Army of Mississippi. 107

At the Harriette Person Library at Port Gibson, Mississippi, we found in a file contributed by Paul Crawford of Brookhaven, Mississippi, a newspaper clipping of unknown date, from the Port Gibson Reveille in its column, "Looking Back," and quoting a notice from the February 11, 1883, issue, "At the Graddick homestead near Port Gibson, Mrs. Sally M., wife of Mr. Griffing C. Graddick, died January 26, age 44. [On her tombstone, Sallie's date of death is January 23, 1883.] She leaves her husband, mother and eight children." Then also, from the same newspaper, a September issue, in its "Looking Back" column, another clipping reads, "This week, 1884 Mr. Griffing C. Gradick, 47, died September 19, leaving eight orphaned children."

- 353. i **Fannie R. Gradick** was born about 1864 in Mississippi. She was six years old when she was enumerated with her parents, G. C. and Sallie Graddick in the 1870 census of Claiborne County. In the 1880 census, she was still at home, and her age was given as eighteen.
- 354. ii **Ruth Gradick**, was born about 1866, in Mississippi. Her age was unclear in the enumeration of the family in the 1870 census. In the 1880 census, her age was given as fifteen.

Beulah was nine years old and living with her family when the census was taken in Claiborne County, Mississippi, in 1880. She would have been eleven when her mother died and twelve when her father died. She was twenty-five when she married.

358. vi **John Gradick** was born November1873 in Mississippi. ¹¹⁰ He married **Lilly** (surname unknown) about 1915. She was born about 1880 in Mississippi. John was seven years old and living with his family when the census was taken in Claiborne County, Mississippi, in 1880. He would have been nine when his mother died, and ten when his father died. In 1900, he was living with his sister, Hattie, and brother-in-law, Henry G. Cochran. In 1910, he was age 36, still single and living with his sister Sarah's family.

In 1920 he was enumerated as head of household in Claiborne County, age 47, married, and with wife, Lilly, age 40. In 1930 they were still in Claiborne County, and the census gave the information that John was first married at age 42, and Lilly at 36.

At the Harriette Person Library at Port Gibson, Mississippi, we found in a file, contributed by Paul Crawford of Brookhaven, Mississippi, a newspaper clipping of unknown date, from the Port Gibson Reveille in its column, "Looking Back," and quoting a notice from the March 18, 1933 issue, the following: "Mrs. John Gradick died at her home on the Cade place south of Port Gibson March 4. She leaves her husband and other relatives."

- 359. vii **Turner Gradick** was born about 1875 in Mississippi. He was five years old and living with his family when the census was taken in Claiborne County, Mississippi, in 1880. He would have been about eight when his mother died and nine when his father died. We have not found any further reference to Turner.
- 360. viii **Irwin Lamar Gradick** was born May 30, 1878, in Mississippi, and died November 20, 1964, in Natchez, Mississippi. He was two years old and living with his family when the census was taken in Claiborne County, Mississippi, in 1880. His mother died before he was five, and his father when he was six. In 1900 he was living with his sister, Hattie, and brother-in-law, Henry G. Cochran.

In the World War 1 Civilian Draft Registrations, his full name was given as Irwin Lamar Gradick. Also given was his date of birth. 111

His obituary was published in the Port Gibson Reveille issue of November 24, 1964, as follows: "I. L. Gradick died in Natchez last Friday morning at the age of 86 years. He was a lifelong resident of the Hermanville area." 112

181. **Andrew E. Gradick** (70.Turner⁴, 11.Daniel³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹), as A. E. Graddick, was 13 years old when he was enumerated in his father's home in Georgia in 1860.

In 1870, still as A. E. Graddick, he was listed in the census of Claiborne County, Mississippi, age 24, having been married in April of that year. His wife was 33, and had been born in Texas. Living with them was his brother, O. F. Graddick, age 17. His wife was **Harriet** (**Hattie**) **Bobo** (daughter of Foster Bobo and Elizabeth Tinsley). The marriage took place on April 7, 1870, in Claiborne County, Mississippi. 113

It was only in his daughter's obituary that we discovered that his first name was Andrew, and that he had died before August 26, 1885 (see notes below with Ida).

Children:

361. i **Mansell W. Gradick** was born May 4, 1871, in Mississippi. He died August 16, 1958, and is buried in Wintergreen Cemetery, Port Gibson, Mississippi. 114

Mansell first appeared in a census in 1900 at age 29, having been born May 1871, in Mississippi. He was single and living alone. He was a farm laborer but did not live on a farm. We have not found him in any census as a child, but we are quite sure that he was a child of Andrew and Hattie because in the 1900 census it gave the information that his father was born in Georgia, and his mother in Texas. This would only fit a child of Andrew or Griffing who married sisters who had been born in Texas. Griffing's children have been well documented, so that leaves Andrew. The date of Mansell's birth fits him well into Andrew's family, and also when his sister Ida died, her obituary read that she had two brothers.

In 1930, Mansell was living with Johnnie C. Hartley, née Cochran (# 512), and her husband, Worth V. Hartley. His relationship to the Hartleys was described as cousin. He was 58 years old and single.

At the Harriette Person Memorial Library in Port Gibson, in a file contributed by Paul Crawford, and labeled Gradick/Graddick/Turnipseed, we found a copy of an obituary for Ida that had been published in 1885, and then republished in the Port Gibson Reveille, August 31, 199? in a column entitled "Looking Back." It read, "This Week, 1885, Ida Andrews, 11, only daughter of Mrs. Hattie A. and the late Andrew Gradick, died August 26. She also leaves two brothers."

In the 1870 census we find "Merrick Graddick," age 26 and born in Virginia, living with G. C. Graddick (Griffing) and his family in Claiborne County, Mississippi. This is probably the same person even though the age is wrong, and so is the place of birth.

He married (1) Mollie E. Robbins on March 27, 1873, in Claiborne County, Mississippi. 115

In the 1880 census of Claiborne County, there is M. Graddick, male, age 30, born in Georgia, wife Mollie E., age 26, born in Indiana, and one child Mary E. age 1. They are living in the same household with O. F. Graddick and his family.

He married (2) **Jane** (surname unknown) about 1888, as is evidenced by the 1900 census, in which there is M. Graddick, born December 1849 in Georgia, both parents born in Georgia, wife Jane, born December 1852 in Mississippi. They had been married for twelve years. (Mollie must have died between 1882 and 1888.) There were four children in the home, Annie born May 1882, Luther born August 1889, Ella born August 1889, and Edmond (called Edward in later records) born February 1894.

In 1920, "Jane S. Gradick" was the head of the household, and a widow. She was age 68. Her daughter, Ella, and son, Edward, ages 30 and 26, were living with her.

Security Death Index, he was born February 5, 1892. In the World War 1 Civilian Draft Registrations his date of birth was recorded as February 5, 1894. At the time of his death, his residence was Whitfield, Mississippi.

184. **O. F. Gradick** (70.Turner⁴, 11.Daniel³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was born July 1853 in Georgia. He married **Ella L. Gardner** December 20, 1877, in Claiborne County, Mississippi. She was born about 1855 in Mississippi. O. F. died March 10, 1924.

O. F. Graddick, age 5, was enumerated with his parents in Harris County, Georgia in the 1860 census. In 1870, he was living with his brother, A. E. Graddick, in Claiborne County, Mississippi; and in 1880, he was living with his wife, Ella, and son, John, age 3 months, in the same household with M. Gradick and his family.

In 1900, there were three more children, Dora, born September 1883, Frank, born August 1888, and Fred, born August 1894. In that year, the census asked for the number of years married, how many children the mother had had, and the number of children living. O. F. and Ella had been married for twenty-two years and had four children, all living when the census was taken on June 8.

In 1910, John, Frank and Fred were all still single and living at home with father, "Oscar F. Gradick," age 56, and wife, Ella, 53.

In 1920, "Oram F. Gradick," age 66, was enumerated with wife, Ella, and sons, Johnnie, Frank and Oliver, and daughter-in-law, Jammie. Jammie must have been the wife of John since his name was marked as married, and the other two sons were single.

In the 1930 census, Ella L. Gradick was head of the household, and her two sons, B. Franklin and O. Fred, and her daughter-in-law, Aileen, and baby granddaughter, Francis A. Gradick, were living with her. Ella was 77 and widowed. Francis was single, and Fred was married.

At the Harriette Person Library at Port Gibson, Mississippi, we found in a file, contributed by Paul Crawford of Brookhaven, Mississippi, a newspaper clipping from the Port Gibson Reveille in its column, Looking Back, dated March 17, 1924, "Mr. O. F. Gradick died March 10 at his home in Hermanville of tuberculosis, the disease which claimed his son, John, a few years ago. He leaves two sons, Frank and Frederick; a daughter-in-law, Mrs. John Gradick, and a grandson."

He married **Laura Rosabla Honour** on December 10, 1854, in Charleston. September 1, 1831, in Charleston (daughter of Thomas Myers Honour and Adeline Welch) and died in 1893 in Charleston. Charles died between 1883 and 1889.

In the 1855 directory for the city of Charleston, Charles was listed as Gradick, C. C. Jr., clerk, South Carolina Railroad, residence 28 Calhoun Street. This is the same address as that of his father and brother, Henry, in that directory. He and his brother were both clerks for the South Carolina Railroad.

In the 1860 census he was listed as Charles L. Graddock, occupation engineer. He was age 26, and still living at the home of his parents; but his wife, Laura, age 25 and their two children, Alice A. age 4, and Walter age 2, were living with him. From the city directory of 1859, we know the address then was 26 Calhoun.

In 1870, Charles and Laura were in their own separate home; the little girl, Alice, was missing, and there were three more children, Arthur age 10, Mary E. age 7, and Charles age 1 1/12 year as well as Walter whose age is unclear.

In the 1880 census, Charles and Laura were ages 48 and 47, and Walter, Arthur, Mary and Charles, ages 21, 18, 16 and 10 respectively were living with them. Charles' name was in the Charleston city directories of 1882 and 1883 as a machinist, living at 18 Columbus. He must have died before 1889 as his wife, Laura, is in the directory that year, listed as widow of C. C. Gradick, residence at 102 Columbus Street.

is buried at Fort White Cemetery. John died June 3, 1908, at Charleston, ¹³³ and is buried in Magnolia Cemetery, Charleston.

John was four years old and living with his parents and siblings in Charleston when the census was taken in 1850.

He was counted twice in the 1860 census, once in his own family with his parents, and also in the home of his sister and brother-in-law, Mary and John G. Chalk. Mr. Chalk was a railroad superintendent, and in addition to his wife and infant son and John Gibbs Gradick, who was a student, there were, living in the home, two other young men, ages 15 and 18, who were apprentices.

John served as a private in Capt. J. A. Blake's Company Battalion, South Carolina Volunteers, subsequently Company A, 1st (Charleston) Battalion South Carolina Infantry, Confederated States of America. He enlisted Mar. 17, 1862, at Charleston, and was discharged Mar. 17, 1863, by order of Gen. Beaurefard at the expiration of his term of service. 134

We know that John and Hilmer lived in Florida for a time, since they were enumerated in Nassau County, Florida, on June 15, 1870, with their first child, Lola. They must not have been in Florida for very long since Lola was only three months old and had been born in South Carolina.

In 1880 they were enumerated in Charleston with 3 children, Lola, Francis and Luder, ages 10, 8 and 2, all born in Charleston. John's brother, Edward, was also living with them. We know that there was another child, John, not yet five years old, who had died just a month before this census was taken. The high mortality rate for children in those days was tragic. John and Hilmer were to lose at least three more children, one each in each of the next two years, and then their son, Luder a few years later.

In 1900 John was warden of the County Jail in Charleston, and was living there with his wife and daughters, Mary E. Gradick, age 18, born February 1882, and Hilmer B. Gradick, age 10, born December 1889. It was stated that John and Hilmer had been married for 31 years, and that Hilmer was the mother of 8 children, only 3 of whom were living. We have only accounted for seven children. Also living with them as a boarder was John G. Chalk, age 78 and a widower. John Chalk was also the enumerator of that census.

In 1910 Hilmer, at age 64, was head of the household. The family was living at 9 Morris Street in Charleston. The two youngest children, May, age 20 (this must be in error), and Hilmer, age 25, were living at home. Both girls were saleswomen in a dry goods store. John G. Chalk was still living with the family, and this time his relationship to the head of household was described as brother-in-law. He was 89.

Hilmer's application for a pension was dated November 2, 1925, and stated that she had resided in Florida since November 2, 1916. She gave as her address, that of her son-in -law, Dr. W. E. Whitlock, High Springs, Alachua County, Florida. She was also enumerated in the home of Dr. Whitlock in 1920 and 1930.

Henry W. Gradick was 16 years old when he was enumerated in the home of his father and stepmother on September 17, 1850, in Bibb County, Alabama. He was the eldest child in the

family, and the only one of the children born in South Carolina. The others were born in Alabama.

By 1860 Henry had moved to Texas and was found in the 1860 census enumerated on August 3, 1860, in the household of H. Bussey, a farmer, in Upshur County. His age was 25, occupation carpenter, and his birthplace was entered as Alabama. In the 1870 census, enumerated on July 14, 1870, in Smith County, Texas, Henry's last name was spelled "Cradick", and his occupation was carpenter, age 34, birthplace South Carolina (not Alabama this time); also in the household was Elizabeth, age 23, birthplace Alabama, Wiley, age 5, born in Texas, and James, age 3, born in Texas.

We found the family in 1880 with six children. Everyone's given names were characterized by initials only: H. W., N. E., W. N., J. M., J. L., M. C., M. N. and H. B. Henry's occupation was given as farmer.

In the 1900 census, there were Henry, Nancy, Ben, Mattie and William, and the month and year of birth were given for each of them in that census. The surname was misspelled "Gradic."

In the years 1904 through 1909 Nancy, as N. E. Gradick, was on the membership

register of Lanes Chapel Methodist Church in Tyler, along with those of her daughter, J. Louisa Craig, son-in-law, George T. Craig, and daughters-in-law, Linnie Gradick, and Mary Ellen Gradick. 143

Henry and Nancy Elizabeth must have been missed in the 1910 census, as we were unable to find them anywhere.

Majorie Gradick, née Nipp, wife of Henry's and Nancy's grandson, Billy Elroy Gradick, said that she remembered hearing that Henry worked at one time as a cabinetmaker in Mount Sylvan in Smith County, Texas. Henry's grandson, Joy V. Gradick, said that Henry was small of stature.

Henry applied for a Civil War pension on March 30, 1912, in which he stated that he had enlisted early in 1862, and had served in Colonel Hill's Ordinance Department near Tyler, making and repairing guns, until he was discharged at the end of the war. 144

On October 2, 1916, Nancy applied for a widow's Civil War pension. She stated that she was 68 years of age, born in Alabama, and had lived for 67 years in Tyler, Texas. Her signature was witnessed by J. M. Gradick, her son, and by his son-in-law, G. W. Longley.

Concerning Henry's birth date, he was 16 on the 1850 census, taken September 17, 1850. In the census of 1900 his date of birth was given as October 1848 and his age as 52. On his application for a pension, dated March 30, 1912, he gave his age as 67. We have assumed that the early one is more likely to be accurate than the later ones, and accordingly have given his birth date above as October 1833.

There is a discrepancy in Nancy's birth date too. In the census of June 1880 her age was 34, which would make her birth about 1846; in 1900 her birth date was given as Oct 1846, which would agree with the 1880 information, and is probably correct; but that would have made her 70 when she applied for a pension rather than 68.

It was in Nancy's application for a widow's pension that we learned Henry's middle name. It was clearly typed "Henry Winthrop Gradick."

Henry and Nancy had eight children who grew to adulthood, four boys and four girls. Two of the boys were blacksmiths, one a butcher, and one a barber. The girls all married.

In the 1880 census of Selma, we found W. H. Green, age 36, a bookkeeper, with wife, Carry E., age 25, and two children, Lilly B. and Carrie M. Also living in the household was the father of W. H., Wm. J. Green, age 70.

In the 1900 census, taken on June 1 of that year, the family was enumerated at 1211 Alabama Street in Selma. Elizabeth's mother, Jane, was listed as Gradick, J. N. (her husband's initials), head of the household. Elizabeth was listed as W. H. Green (her husband's initials), daughter. She was 45 years old, a widow, and she owned a "Tea & Coffee store." She had had seven children, six of whom were living, four of them living at home, Ella, North, Gilbert and Marvis. This gave us the names of two more of the children, but one name is still missing.

We came across Elizabeth's name again in a 1904 city directory of Selma listed as Green, W. H. (her husband's initials). She was living with her mother, who was listed as Gradick, Pearson C., widow of John N. (Pearson was her maiden name), at 1211 Alabama. Also listed were Elizabeth's children, Ella, North, Gilbert and Marvis.

In the 1906-07 Selma directory, Elizabeth was still residing at 1211 Alabama. Ella, Gilbert and "Northie" were living there too. Jane's name was missing. In the 1909 directory, another family was living at 1211 Alabama. So far, we have not found any further information about this family.

Abram and Mary gave \$800 to their daughter Nancy and her husband in 1866 in lieu of a share in his estate, and on February 23, 1869, they conveyed three parcels of 80 acres each of the above tract to each of their other three children. 147

234. Lilly Gradick (107. Whitfield⁵, 28. John⁴, 6. John³, 2. Jacob², 1. Julius¹) must have been born about 1862 since she was eight years old in the 1870 census of Edgefield County, South Carolina. Her mother died in April of that same year. Death as a result of childbirth was not uncommon, and it would seem likely that her death was connected to the birth of the baby.

In 1880 Lilly was living at home with her widowed stepmother. There was a six month old baby girl in the home named Regina Gradick, no relationship to head of household reported. The box for single marital status for Lily showed marks of an erasure, and the married box was marked; however, she still retained the Gradick surname. We suppose that the baby was hers, since her stepmother had been widowed for nearly four years.

235. **Fletcher C. Gradick** (107.Whitfield⁵, 28.John⁴, 6.John³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was recorded as being 5 years old as of his last birthday when the census was taken in Edgefield County, South Carolina on August 30, 1870. In the 1900 census, his month and year of birth were given as July 1866 in Edgefield County, South Carolina. It seems likely that he was born July 1865 rather than 1866, particularly so if the birth date is correct for his sister Sophia (see below). He married **Etta S.** (surname unknown) about 1892. She was born April 1873 in South Carolina,² and died May 3, 1957, in Barrow County, Georgia. Fletcher died June 12, 1939, in Barrow County, Georgia.³

In the 1880 census, Fletcher was age 15, living at home in Edgefield County with his mother and the other children.

In the 1900 census, Fletcher was married and living with his wife, Etta, and five year old daughter, Grady (possibly Gracy—it is hard to read). He and Etta had been married for eight years and had had two children, with only the one still living. They were living on Hampton Street in Walterboro City, Colleton County, South Carolina.



This was near Geneva, in Orange County (now a part of Seminole County). In the 1900 census of Duval County, Florida, Ella was enumerated as head of the household. Her two children were living with her, and there were also four boarders, a couple and young child, and a single man. She is identified as being married for 21 years—this would have included both marriages—but there is no husband present. Ella had had two children and both were living.

Henry died before April 18 or 19 in 1910, as on one of those dates, when the census taker came, Hattie was a widow. Her two children were still at home; but "Jessie" was now listed as "Johnnie," age 17.

In 1920, Hattie's daughter, Johnnie, was still living with her, and so was her brother, Irwin Gradick.

Mansell Gradick, Johnnie's mother's cousin, was living with them, and they were living next door to Johnnie's aunt, Beulah Turnipseed, and her husband, Thomas.

356. **Sallie H. Gradick** (sometimes called Sadie, and sometimes Sarah) (177.Griffing⁵, 70.Turner⁴, 11.Daniel³, 2.Jacob², 1.Julius¹) was enumerated with her parents in the 1870 census of Claiborne County, Mississippi. At first glance her age appears to be 4, but I think it is really 1, and that the census taker inadvertently penciled across the one, making it look like a four. In the 1880 census Sallie Gradick was eleven.

She married James D. Walters on December 9, 1891, in Claiborne County, Mississippi. 120

In the 1900 census James was listed as being 32 years old, born November 1867 in Mississippi, and "Sadie" was listed as being 30, and born January 1863—an obvious error.

In 1910, Jas. D. Walters, age 42, was enumerated with wife, Sarah, age 41, in Claiborne County. They had been married for twenty years. Sarah had had four children, all of whom were living. Her brother, John Graddick, was living with them.

In the 1930 census, James D. Walters, age 61, and Sallie Walters, age 60, had married at ages 21 and 20 respectively. They had with them in their household their daughter Jayme Graddick, age 37, a widow, their daughter, Eunice Warrington, age 32, married at age 19 (must be in error—she was 22 and single in 1920), their son Malcom, age 27, single, their son Herbert, age

20, single, their son-in-law Wallace Warrington, age 38, married at age 35, their grandson John Graddick, age 8, and their grandson James W. Graddick, age 2 years and 4 months.

In the Port Gibson Reveille's feature "Looking Back," date unknown, but probably in the 1990s, citing an item from July 7, 1934, we read, "Mr. James D. Walters died July 1 at his home near Hermanville after a long illness. He leaves his wife and three children, Mrs. W. W. Warrington, Mrs. Jayme Gradick and H. C. Walters."

Sallie died after December 27, 1953. 121

We have not found this Griffing C. Graddick in any census as a child. We are quite sure that he was a child of Andrew and Hattie because it was reported in the 1900 census that his father was born in Georgia, and his mother in Texas. There were two Gradick men born in Georgia who married women born in Texas. They were Andrew (#181 in this genealogy) and his brother, Griffing (#177). The two brothers married sisters. However Griffing's children have been well documented, so we feel confident that this Griffing C. Gradick is a son of Andrew. The earliest record that we have found of him is the report of his marriage to Lizzie. Next, he was listed in the 1900 census in Port Gibson as head of a household along with his wife and two daughters, Alma L. and Clara. The month and year of birth was given for each of them, as well as the number of years married for the parents, which was six. They rented the house in which they lived; and it was not a farm property. Griff, as he was called in that census, was a day laborer. All members of the family were born in Mississippi. Both parents could read and write.

"Grif Graddick" was enumerated for the 1910 census on April 28. For some reason his wife

Sallie was a survivor in the obituary of her daughter, Jayme, who died December 27, 1953.

was listed as Annie in that year. It must have been the same wife, since she and "Grif" were recorded as having been married for 15 years. They were still living in Claiborne County. One of their children, Clara, had died. Alma was 15, and another child, a son, listed on the census as "G. C.," was age 7. There must also have been another child born and died during the tenyear period since the last census, because Annie was reported to be a mother of four children with two living.

In 1930, Griffing and Lizzie were still living in Claiborne County, at ages 57 and 56. Their ages at first marriage were 21 and 20. Griffing was a farmer.

In 1920 they were enumerated twice, once with his parents and once with hers. His occupation was given as manager of a merchandise store. John must have died not long after that census was taken, as his father's obituary, in March of 1924, reads that Oran died of tuberculosis, the disease that claimed his son, John, a few years ago. 134

Charles and Daisy lived all their lives in the same neighborhood in Charleston. Charles C. Gradick is listed in the Charleston City Directory of 1889, employed by Geo. S. Hacker & Son (a manufacturer of window sashes and blinds), and boarding at the home of his widowed mother, Laura, at 102 Columbus Street. In 1891 he was still boarding at his mother's place; but he was working for Weatherhorn & Fischer. In 1898, he was working for G. S. Hacker & Son again, but he was now married and living at 16 Line Street with his wife's family.

In the 1900 census, Charles and Daisy were living with her widowed mother, Netta Berrie, along with Daisy's sister and brother, Alice and Albert, at 16 Line Street. In this census the months and years of birth were recorded.

In the 1901 Charleston City Directory, Charles was still working for Hacker & Son, but had moved to 32 Amherst Street.

In the 1910 census, the family was still living at 32 Amherst Street and had three daughters, Mabel, Marie and Gertrude. The girls' ages were given as 16, 12 and 8 respectively. Daisy had had three children all of whom were living. Charles was a mechanic.

In the 1920 census, Charles was still working for the sash and blind factory, Daisy was a nurse, Leola was a cigar maker in a cigar factory, and Gertrude was a saleslady in a dry goods store. Daughter Mabel was listed as May Deery, age 25, and divorced.

In the 1930 census, Daisy, as a widow, was living with her daughter and son-in-law, John and Leola Mott, and their three children.

In 1900, when the census was taken in Smith County, Texas, Wiley and Linnie were living on a farm that they owned mortgage-free. Wiley's occupation was listed as blacksmith. Living with them were their daughter, Olive, and two sons, Wiley and Joe Wheeler. All of their months and years of birth were given. Wiley and Linnie had been married for ten years and had had four children, three of whom were living. The census-taker spelled the surname "Gradic."

In the years 1904 through 1909, Linnie Gradick's name was on the register of members of Lanes Chapel Methodist Church in Tyler along with those of her brother, George T. Craig, her mother-in-law, Nancy Elizabeth Gradick, and her sisters-in-law, Mary Ellen Gradick and J. Louisa Craig. 156

In 1910, the family was still in Tyler. The surname was spelled "Gratic" in this census, and Wiley was spelled "Wyley." All six of their living children were at home: M. Olive, "Wyley," W. Joe, Henry, Lois (spelled "Loyace"), and Lottie. Wiley was a blacksmith and owned his own shop. They were living on East Front Street in a house (not on a farm this time), which

Herbert Wilson, of Austin, Texas. Herb is the husband of Judith Anne Lawson, great-granddaughter of Wiley and Linnie.

Herb and Judy were also caretakers for Lottie Gradick during her final years. Herb is an amateur genealogist and has compiled information on the Gradick family, most of it from conversations with Lottie Gradick. He sent a printout of his data to this compiler by U.S. Mail on July 17, 2003.



they owned free of mortgage. Linnie had had nine children, six of whom were living. Linnie had been born in Texas, her father in Mississippi, and her mother in Alabama.

In the 1920 census, only Lois and Lottie were still at home with their parents. Their address at that time was 661 East Front Street, Tyler. Wiley must have still owned his farm, even though they were not living on the farm, for Lois Rodgers, née Moore (#640), told us that her Greatuncle Wiley had a berry farm on the south side of Duncan Street in Tyler near Horn Avenue, and she remembered picking berries there when she was young, which, I suppose would have been in the twenties or thirties.

For some reason Wiley and Linnie were enumerated twice in 1930, in both Smith County and Erath County. In Smith County, they were still on East Front Street, and daughter Lottie was still living at home. Wiley was working as a machinist in a Peanut Products Company. In Dublin, in Erath County, he and Linnie were renting, and a young man by the name of Henry L. White was boarding with them. Wiley was listed as working for wages as a laborer, and the young man was superintendent in a peanut mill. The Dublin census was taken on April 4, and the Tyler one on April 17. Wiley was probably working temporarily in Dublin.

Besides being a blacksmith and mechanic, Wiley was also an inventor. One of the things that he invented was a nutcracker that was patented Dec 29, 1925. His nephew, Joy V. Gradick, said that he sold the patent to the Woldert Canning Factory in Tyler in return for a lifetime job. In fact, he is listed in the Tyler City Directories of 1932 through 1935 as an employee of the Alex Woldert Co., Inc. In the 1934-35 directory his occupation is given as "researchman." In other years he was called a mechanic.



Wiley hand carved and sold several fine fiddles. His grandson Jack, son of Lois, told us that his grandfather carved a small fiddle for him when he was a boy. ¹⁵⁷ Also, William and Martha Gradick of Semmes, Alabama, sent us a photograph of a violin that Wiley made that is now in the possession of Michael Steven Gradick, William's brother.

Wiley died October 12, 1950, and is buried in Section G, Memorial Park Cemetery, Tyler, Texas. After Wylie's death, Linnie and her daughter Lottie lived together in Austin, Texas, until Linnie's death on October 24, 1967. Linnie is buried in Austin Memorial Park Cemetery, Austin, Texas, in the next row to her eldest daughter, Olive, and Olive's husband, Grover Curlee. More recently, Lottie, too, has been laid to rest alongside her mother. 160

Herb Wilson said that Linnie used to play the harmonica.

She taught English for a while in Tyler, and later worked for the Texas Employment Commission in the field of human resources. She lived for many years in Austin. She played the piano by ear. She was unmarried. 166

389. **James Montgomery (Jim) Gradick** (205.Henry⁵, 78.John⁴, 13.Christian³, 3.Richard², 1.Julius¹) was born September 22, 1867, in Smith County, Texas. He married **Mary Ellen Shackelford** on December 29, 1891, in Henderson County, Texas. ¹⁶⁷ She was born January 2, 1879, in Henderson County, Texas (daughter of William A. (Billy) Shackelford and Mary Pauline Craig).

Ellen was three days short of her thirteenth birthday when she ran off with Jim Gradick and got married. Their son, Joy—Uncle Joy to this compiler and her husband—told the story this way:

I recall my Mama having told this story when I was just a little chap, and we would ask her to tell it over and over, and it would irk Papa; he didn't want Mama telling all these things, but she told it over and over to us. She said that to begin with when she first met my Daddy, he came over on horseback, on a little horse called Roan Dick, to see if her

father had any cattle to sell, and he bought two yearlings. A few days later Mama was out in the yard washing clothes on a scrub board when he came again. He continued to come every once in a while, and one time he had a little doll's leg that he had found somewhere and he handed it to her and said, "Here, it's for you;" and she said that after he left she thought, "I believe he likes me."

One time he came when her father wasn't at home, and he asked her, "Aren't you tired of staying home and taking care of these children?" [Mary Ellen's mother had died when she was only seven, and there were three other children, a boy of about ten and two younger sisters.] She admitted that she was, but she didn't know what to do about it. He said, "If you'll marry me, I'll steal you away." She said, "Oh, I couldn't do that; my Daddy would have a fit." "He won't ever know, and he won't ever find us," he replied.

One day he told her, "If you'll get your clothes ready and put them right on the inside of that window, I'll ride up after dusk, and you reach in there and get your bundle of clothes and hop right up on the back of my horse and we'll be gone." And she said, "I'll think about it." After he was gone, she got her bundle of clothes ready and sat out on the porch swing, and she said, "I never really thought that he would come."

But he did come. After dusk, he rode through the gateway and eased his horse up alongside the porch (she called it a gallery); she reached inside and got her bundle, and he caught her arm and swung her up on the back of that horse. He tiptoed the horse out through the gateway, and when they got out on the sandy road, he put the spurs to it and away they went. They rode twenty-one miles that night to her Aunt Mattie's house [compiler hasn't discovered who Aunt Mattie was]. She said she forged her Daddy's signature to get the marriage license, and so they were married.

For most of his life, Jim Gradick was a cattle buyer and butcher, and made a living in the retail butcher and grocery business. In the 1900 census he was listed as a farmer, who owned his own farm. For a time he had a store on Beckham St. in Tyler; but he was also at other locations in Tyler at different times. According to Uncle Joy, his parents lived in many different houses, and experienced many ups and downs over the years. ¹⁶⁸ Uncle Joy said that sometimes they were quite prosperous, and at other times they endured hardships. He remembered when they owned half a block of property in the area about where Mother Frances Hospital is now, and said, "We had a rubber-tired surrey, with a fringe on top, carbide lights on each side—everybody went to church. We had a grocery store." And then there was a fire; and they had no insurance; and they lost every thing. Uncle Joy said, "I think Papa sort of lost heart after the fire."

He was a man who was loved by his children and grandchildren. They loved to gather on his front porch and listen to the tales he spun. The grandchildren called him Big Papa.

In the years 1904 through 1909 Mary Ellen's name, as M. E. Gradick, was on the register of members of Lanes Chapel Methodist Church in Tyler along with those of her mother-in-law, Nancy Elizabeth Gradick, and her sisters-in-law, Linnie Gradick, and J. Louisa Craig, and her brother-in-law, George T. Craig. 169

Craig and Amanda Jane Smith), and died between 1913 & 1920.

In the years 1904 through 1909 Louisa and George, as "J. L. Creig" and "G. T. Creig," along with Louisa's mother, Nancy Elizabeth Gradick, and sisters-in-law, Linnie Gradick and Mary Ellen Gradick, were on the register of members of Lanes Chapel Methodist Church in Tyler. ¹⁷⁵ In the 1910 census of Tyler, the family was enumerated on April 22. The father, head of the household, was listed as G. Tom Craig, age 40, a laborer on a fruit farm (I wonder if it was his brother-in-law Wiley's fruit farm). Louisa was listed as J. Loue, and the children, all by their first initial and middle name. Louisa had had five children, four of whom were living.

In 1920 we found Louisa as a widow, enumerated in Webster County, Louisiana, in the village of Doyline, along the south side of the US&P Railroad. This is east of Shreveport and Bossier City. There was one more child in the family, a son, Adams, age 4, born in Texas. They were enumerated in January of that year, between the 19th and 23rd of the month. Louisa was a self-employed farmer on a plantation. The family must have moved to Louisiana between 1915, after Adams was born and 1920. Tom must have died between 1913 and 1920.

In April 1930, Louise Craig, age 59, widowed, with son, Adams J. Craig, age 15, was enumerated in the census of Claiborne County, Louisiana, Police Jury Ward 3. They were living at 172 Millerton Highway. Louise's age at first marriage was reported as 26. She was a seamstress doing odd jobs.

Coughton, age 4, and Emmett L. Coughton, age 2. It would seem that these grandchildren must have been the children of Lula, and yet she was reported as single and still bearing the Walker surname.



Grover was Clerk of the Henderson County District Court in 1918; and in 1925 he was elected as a Judge in Henderson County.

He and Olive were enumerated in the 1920 census in Henderson County, Texas, with the first three of their children, Mary, Wiley and Elizabeth, ages six, four, and one and a half. On April 9, 1930, they were enumerated in the city of Waco, Texas, in McLennan County, with two additional children, Richard and Dorothy. 538. Wiley Winthrop Gradick

(388.Wiley⁶, 205.Henry⁵, 78.John⁴, 13.Christian³, 3.Richard², 1.Julius¹) was born August 13, 1894, in Tyler, Texas.⁵⁴ At the age of eighteen, on March 9, 1913, he married **Ellen Reitzell Mondere**, in Smith County, Texas.⁵⁵ Ellen was born February 15, 1896. That same year, Wiley was listed in the Tyler City Directory as a helper in his father's blacksmith shop.

In the 1910 census of Tyler, "Elen R. Mondeer," age 14, was listed living with her paternal grandmother and step-grandfather, Emily and Theodore Wald, at 408 West Bow Street in Tyler. In a message posted on Ancestry.com message boards on January 6, 2001, Anne L. Goodwin was seeking information on "Mary E. 'Emily' (Rabia), Theodore Wald, and Elen R. Mondeer, sometimes called Reitzel, in Tyler, Texas." Upon seeing this message, this compiler replied, and Anne and I subsequently exchanged information. Anne wrote that both of Ellen's parents had died in 1907. They were James and Dora (née Powell) Mondier (later Mondeer). Herb Wilson reported that Wiley and Ellen had a little girl whom they named Dora—obviously after her maternal grandmother. The child died at about age two. The marriage ended in divorce soon after. Ellen married again, to Buford H. Craig. She died April 29, 1968 and is buried at Liberty Hill Cemetery in Tyler. 56

Wiley served in France with the American Expeditionary Force in World War 1, and for his service received the Bronze Victory Medal.⁵⁷

He married **Hattie Louise Lowry** on June 10, 1920, in Smith County, Texas.⁵⁸ The couple must have moved to Alabama sometime in the 1920s or early in the 1930s, as Herb Wilson cites Lottie Gradick as saying that she stayed with Wiley and his wife, Louise, on 23rd Street in Birmingham, Alabama, while she was attending Howard College there. This would have been about 1930, but we have not found them in the census of that year. As a matter of fact, Wiley seems to have been missed altogether in both the 1920 and 1930 censuses. Lottie said that Louise had a young son by a previous marriage. She said that Wiley married "Louise Gates." Probably Gates was her maiden name. Whether this marriage ended by death or divorce we do not know.

He married **Ethel Chamberlain** (maiden name O'Neil) in 1950 in Houston, Texas. ⁵⁹ Ethel was a widow. She had been born July 1, 1896. We talked by telephone to Ethel's grandson, Clark Chamberlain, in August 2003, and he said that Wiley always talked of Alabama as his home. Clark was surprised to learn that he had actually been born and grew to adulthood in Tyler, Texas. After Wiley and Ethel married, they lived in her home at 12909 Texaco Road in Houston. Clark was only three years old at the time of their marriage, and spent a lot of time with them, especially in the summer when school was out. To-day Clark lives in the Texaco Road home. He said that Wiley was a 32nd degree mason and was very active in the Masonic Lodge; also that he rode in the sheriff's posse whenever there were parades in town. He said that he was very adept at working with tools, and made his own tools when he couldn't find just what he needed. His early training in his father's blacksmith shop must have served him well all of his life. Clark still has his toolbox.

Wiley died March 16, 1982, in Houston. Ethel died in October of 1987 in Houston, Texas.⁶⁰

The Social Security Death Index shows that Wiley was issued his social security card in Georgia. The Social Security system began issuing cards near the end of 1936, but we don't know when Wiley applied for his, or how come he was in Georgia or how long he stayed there.

- 631. i **Dora Gradick** was born in Tyler, Texas, and died in Tyler at about two years of age. The funeral was held at the home of Wiley and Linnie Gradick, the paternal grandparents.⁶¹
- 540. **Joseph Wheeler Gradick Sr.** (388.Wiley⁶, 205.Henry⁵, 78.John⁴, 13.Christian³, 3.Richard², 1.Julius¹) was born May 1899 in Henderson County, Texas.⁶² Herb Wilson wrote that Lottie told him Joseph was born in Henderson County instead of at home in Tyler because Linnie had gone there to visit friends, and because of bad weather had to stay over, and the baby was born there.

Joseph married **Vera L. Sides** on July 19, 1920, in Smith County, Texas.⁶³ She was born in 1900 (daughter of Sam Judson and Katie L. Sides), and died in 1926. She is buried in Rose Hill Cemetery, in Tyler, Texas, in Section D.⁶⁴

In the 1923-24 city directory of Tyler, Joseph W. Gradick is listed as proprietor of the Gradick Garage, 115 E. Elm, and living at 609 E. Erwin, with Vera L., wife.

Jack Council said, by telephone, August 2, 2003, that after World War ll, when he came home from service, he went to work for his Uncle Joe learning how to cut and grind glass for automobiles at the business that his uncle owned in Houston.

According to Herb Wilson, Lottie said that Joe graduated from Tyler Commercial College. Another item from Lottie is that Joe was an excellent musician. He could play many different instruments, and he had a band that traveled and played in many different parts of the United States. Joe Jr. verified this, saying (September 2003, by telephone) that his father played piano, drums, trombone and other instruments professionally, and traveled and played all over the country.

Joe Jr. also told us that his father married a second time, this time in Muskogee, Oklahoma. Joe and his sister, Jaqueline, went there to live and to go school after their Grandmother Sides died. This was when young Joe was about thirteen years old.

Joe Jr's daughter, Sharon, in a telephone call, September 30, 2003, said that her grandfather Gradick died when she was about two years old. That would have been about 1955. She said that he died in Dallas, Texas, and is buried in Tyler, but she has not been able to find out what cemetery. The East Texas Genealogical Society has transcribed the tombstones of all the

cemeteries in and around Tyler, and published the listings both in book form and on the Internet, and we have not found a listing for Joseph Wheeling Gradick Sr. It may be that no tombstone was ever erected. Herb Wilson reports that Lottie said that her brother, Joe, was buried at Rose Hill Cemetery in Tyler.

- 541. **Henry Herman Gradick** was born May 12, 1902, probably in Tyler, Texas, where the family lived. 65 In the 1910 census, taken in Tyler on April 18, he was listed with his parents and siblings at age eight, as of his last birthday; however, he wouldn't have been eight until the next month if his birth date is correct in his social security record. He had not attended school at any time since September 1 of 1909. The three older children were all in school, so it is to be hoped that maybe the census-taker made a mistake; or at least that he was sent to school the next September.

In 1920, at the age of 18, he was married, and enumerated with his wife, Grace, in the home of his father-in-law, Will T. Haley, in Tyler. His occupation was entered as laborer in a garage. His surname was misspelled "Gradie" in the census index, but looks like "Gradic" to this compiler in the actual census. Whether this marriage ended in death or divorce we do not know.

Herb Wilson cites Lottie Gradick as saying that Henry was married to Lillian Gates, a sister to Louise Gates, the wife of Henry's brother, Wiley Winthrop Gradick; and that they had a child named Henry. We have confirmed this through Henry Herman's grandson, William Henry Gradick, Jr. (#723), who says that his grandmother was **Lillian Mae Gates**.

According to Joy V. Gradick (#553 in this genealogy), Henry was employed at the Dodge automobile agency in the 1930's. Jack Council has confirmed this by telephone, August 2, 2003. He says that his uncle was a mechanic at the Dodge Agency in Houston.

He died June 6, 1968, at Houston, Texas. 66 Lillian married again after Henry's death, a man by the name of Barnie Jefferson. Lillian died in Alabama in 1996 at the age of 89. 67

married (2) **Joseph Herman Council**. Lois died January 7, 2004, at the home of her son, Jack.⁷¹

In 1910, on April 19, Lois was entered on the census at home with her parents on East Front Street in Tyler. The enumerator spelled her name "Loyace," and the surname was spelled "Gratic." Her age was given as six as of her last birthday, which seems to be as correct as the spelling of her name.

In 1920, the family was enumerated on June 13 at 661 East Front Street, Tyler. The names were all spelled correctly, and Lois was 14.



On April 9, 1930, Henry H. Thompson with wife, Lois, and son, Jack, was entered in the census living at 6623 Sherman Avenue in Houston, Texas. Henry was 34, and had been 24 at the time of his first marriage. This indicates that there had been a prior marriage. He had been born in Mississippi, as had both of his parents. He was a salesman-collector. He was a veteran of the United States military—presumably in World War 1. Lois was 24, and Jack was 3 years and 8 months.

Jack does not remember his father, nor does he know whether the marriage ended in death or divorce. The father that he knew was Joe Council, whose name he bears, and who adopted him in 1936.

Lois lived most of her adult life in the Pasadena and Houston area of Texas, and worked for the Sherlock Oil Company until her retirement.

Later he joined the Army Air Corps, which became a part of the United States Air Force, and served until his retirement in 1963.

One of Jack's childhood memories is of his grandfather, Wiley, playing the violin—he even made a little violin for Jack.

546. **Viola** (**Bammie**) **Gradick** (389.James⁶, 205.Henry⁵, 78.John⁴, 13.Christian³, 3.Richard², 1.Julius¹) was born August 8, 1893,⁷⁵ in Pine Springs, Texas. She married **George William Longley Sr.** on September 4, 1908.⁷⁶ He was born December 7, 1888.

George was working as a blacksmith when the 1910 census was taken in April; and he and Viola and two month old George Jr. were living in the house next to Bammie's Uncle Ben, at 104 East Front Street in Tyler.

In the 1920 census, there was another child in the family, Elizabeth, three years and four months old. George Sr. was still a blacksmith, working on his own account in an Iron Shop.

Viola was only 29 when she died, on March 30, 1923, in Dallas, Texas. George lived to be eighty-five, and died July 22, 1974, in Whitehouse, in Smith County, Texas. ⁷⁷

Bob (coresearcher) remembers that he and Jerry Crook, Lorena's grandson, used to ride the jitney from Tyler to Jacksonville to visit them from time to time. Aunt Rena, as Bob called her, was a very good cook, and during her later days worked as a cook at the local hospital. She seems to have been much loved by all the family members that we talked to. She died January 1, 1954, in Jacksonville, and Floyd died December 10, 1978. They are both buried in Tyler Memorial Park Cemetery.⁷⁹

549. **Grace Elizabeth Gradick** (389.James⁶, 205.Henry⁵, 78.John⁴, 13.Christian³, 3.Richard², 1.Julius¹) was born May 22, 1902. ⁸³ She married (1) **Joseph Curtis Erwin Frizzell** on June 16, 1918, in Smith County, Texas. ⁸⁴ He was born April 21, 1899 (son of Joe and Jennie Frizzell). ⁸⁵

Curtis, as he was known, was a plumber and in the 1920 census, he owned his own plumbing shop. He died December 22, 1939, and is buried in Rose Hill Cemetery, Tyler, Texas.

Later, Grace married **Jesse Thomas Shelton**. He was born September 5, 1891, and died April 9, 1968. He is buried in Pine Springs Cemetery, Tyler.⁸⁶

Aunt Grace lived at 1011 Dawson Street in Tyler until her death. She died November 21, 1990, in Tyler, and is buried in Tyler Memorial Park Cemetery.⁸⁷

I have often wondered if her family buried her in that dress.

She told us how her Daddy taught her and her brothers and sisters to remember the names of his brothers and sisters. She said that he used to say that the boys were "Wiley North and Jimmie South and Bennie East and Willie West", and the girls were "Louisa Up and Cassie Down and Mittie Over and Mattie Brown." She said that he would make up stories and get them all so excited that "Mama would say that we wouldn't sleep a wink; but we didn't care whether we slept or not."
