During the evening the bride and bridegroom left for a wedding trip to Sea Island, Ga., and upon their return will reside at 21½ Legare St., Charleston.

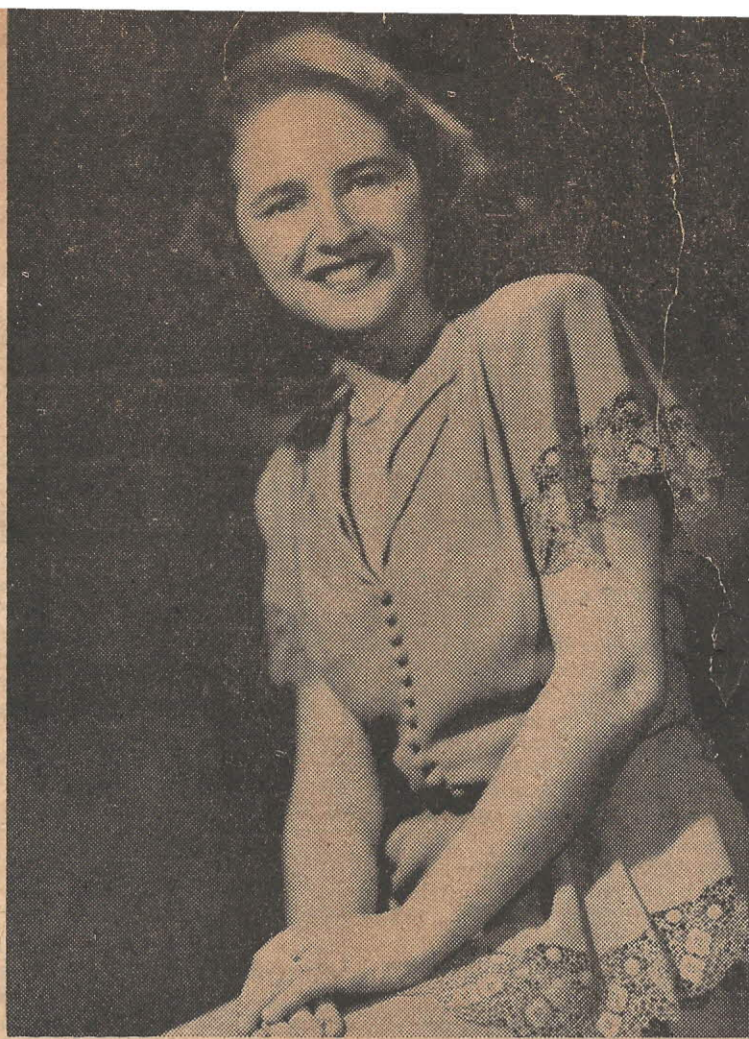
