Charm and dignity characterized the wedding of Miss Lucy Brown Davis and George Franklin Coleman which was solemnized on Saturday evening, August 20, at eight o'clock, in St. John's Episcopal church. The Rev. J. N. Bynum of Summerton, former rector of St. John's, officiated, using the single ring service in the presence of the two families and intimate friends. 1944
