

Atkinson-Friday

Miss Ellen Atkinson of Gresham became the bride of John Leitner Fridy of Winnsboro in a lovely double ring ceremony taking place at 4:30 p. m., February 15 at the home of her sister, Mrs. C. H. Boulware, in Olar. 1948

Rev. C. H. Boulware, brother-in-law of the bride, officiated before an improvised altar of smilax, white gladioli and fern. Full length mirrors reflected the lighted candles from the candelabra.
