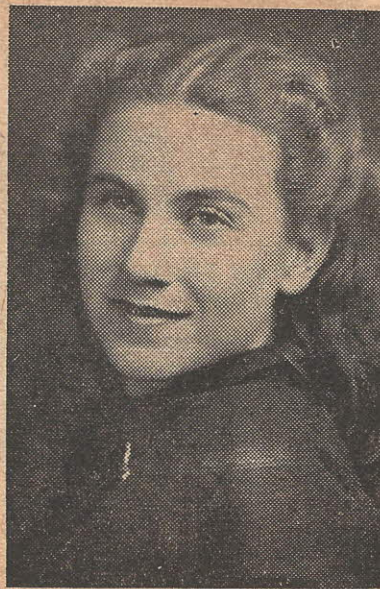
The groom is the son of Mr.
