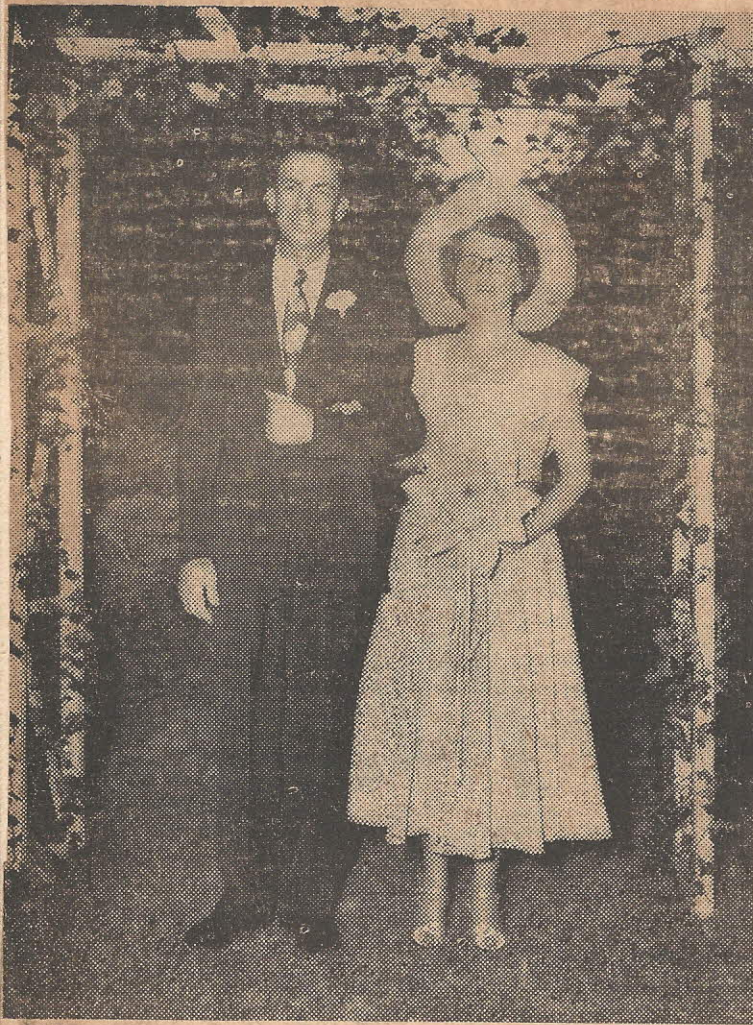


# Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Frank Lyles

## Miss Frances Coskrey and Frank Lyles Wed in Bishopville

A wedding of beautiful simplicity was performed when Miss Sarah Frances Coskrey of Bishopville and Winnsboro became the bride of Edwin Franklin Lyles of Winnsboro on Sunday, July 22, at 6:30. The ceremony took place on the lawn of the flower garden of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Player near Bishopville. The Rev. T. C. Cannon of Sumter officiated in the presence of close relatives and friends.

Miss Ernestine Player, pianist, and Miss Betty Jean Player, soloists, nieces of the bride, rendered the nuptial music. Selections on the piano were the Adagio Movement of Moonlight Sonata (Beethoven), Romance (Sibelius), and Consolation, No. 3 in D Flat (Liszt). Miss Player sang I Love Thee (Grieg) and Because (D'Harelot). The traditional marches from Lohengrin (Wagner) and from Midsummer Night's Dream (Mendessohn) were used. During the ceremony Claire de Lune (Debussy) was softly played. At the close of the ceremony Miss Player sang The Lord's Prayer (Malotte).

The bride and groom entered from the porch through a path marked with ribbons to an ivy-encircled arch against the natural greenery of the garden. Adding to the beauty of the garden were two tall baskets of white glads.

The ushers were Tom C. Lyles, brother of the groom, of Columbia, and Bobby Plowden, nephew of the bride, of Sumter.

The bride wore an afternoon dress of ice blue lace-embroidered net, fashioned over an ice blue satin sheath. The dress was designed with a fitted bodice, a drop-shoulder collar ending in capelet points in the back and a full ankle length skirt. She wore a picture hat of matching blue net and matching satin sandals. The bride's bouquet was a nosegay of tuberose and carnations outlined with white satin puffs and centered with a white purple-throated orchid. Showers of tuberose were attached by satin streamers to the bouquet. Her only ornament was a strand of pearls, the gift of the bridegroom.

After the ceremony, receiving in the garden with the bridal couple were Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Player, sister and brother-in-law of the bride, and Mrs. Roberta C. Lyles, mother of the groom, of Winnsboro. Mrs. Player wore pink lace with a purple orchid corsage. Mrs. Lyles chose a black sheer with white trim, and wore a purple orchid.

Serving punch in the garden were Mrs. Solomon Smiley of Charleston and Miss Betty Ann Cribbs of Lynchburg.

Inviting guests into the house were Mr. and Mrs. Roy Pate of Lynchburg. Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Plowden, sister and brother-in-law of the bride, of Sumter, greeted them at the porch door. Receiving in the living room was Mrs. S. L. Davis of Manning and Kingtree. Miss Allene Stuckey invited them into the dining room where refreshments were served by Miss Patsy Lyles of Winnsboro and Jimmy Plowden of Sumter. Mrs. Aiken Rush of North Charleston, Mrs. Ashton Cribbs of Lynchburg, Mrs. W. W. Plaver, Jr. of Elliott, and Mrs. C. M. Mimms, Jr., of Elliott.

An imported banquet cloth of Irish linen was used on the bride's table that was centered with an embossed triple-tiered wedding cake topped with a purple orchid with a white illusion heart as a background. The cake was flanked with white carnations and lighted tapers.

Inviting the guests into the gift room was Mrs. C. W. Wells of Manning and receiving in the room was Mrs. Sue Hall Davis of Winnsboro. Mrs. W. W. Stevenson of Winnsboro kept the register. Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Player, Jr., of Elliott bade the guests goodbye.

During the evening the bridal couple left on their wedding trip to the mountains of North Carolina. For traveling the bride wore a navy and white sheer dress with a duster, a navy velvet hat with white medallions, and navy accessories. She wore the orchid from her bouquet.

Pickens, D. O. 24.—Two prominent Southern families were united when Miss Annie Holder and Thomas Camak Lyles were married at the home of the bride's parents, Tuesday, December 22 at 8 o'clock in the evening. The Rev. T. B. Lanham of Co-

lumbia was the officiating minister, assisted by Dr. D. E. Caiak of Marion, N. C., uncle of the bridegroom. The ceremony was in the presence of a group of relatives and friends.

Prior to the ceremony a program of nuptial music was rendered by Miss Mary Jolly of Greenville and Mrs. Cara Cobb of Pelzer. The "Bridal Chorus" from Lohengrin" was used for the processional.

Preceding the ceremony, the candles were lighted by Dwight A. Holder of Columbia, brother of the bride. B. E. Lyles, Jr., of Winnsboro, the bridegroom's brother, acted as the best man.

The long basque waist had a deep yoke brocaded with seed pearls, long leg-o-mutton sleeves pointed over the hands, and tiny buttons extending to the waistline in the back. The skirt swept into a lengthy train and the veil of illusion, extending the length of the train, was attached to her hair with a Juliet cap of seed pearls. Her bouquet of bride's roses was centered with an orchid.

For her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Holder wore a gown of wine velvet and her corsage was Talisman roses.

Mrs. Lyles, mother of the bridegroom, from Winnsboro, was attired in blue crepe and her flowers were pink roses.

Immediately following the ceremony, the bride's parents entertained with an informal reception.

For traveling the bride wore a winter-white dress with brown accessories. Her coat was of natural muskrat with matching hat. Her corsage was an orchid.

Mrs. Lyles is the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Holder of Pickens. She is a graduate of Pickens high school and of Lander college. During her senior year, she was listed in "Who's Who Among American Universities and Colleges." At present she is teaching commerce in the Pelzer high school.

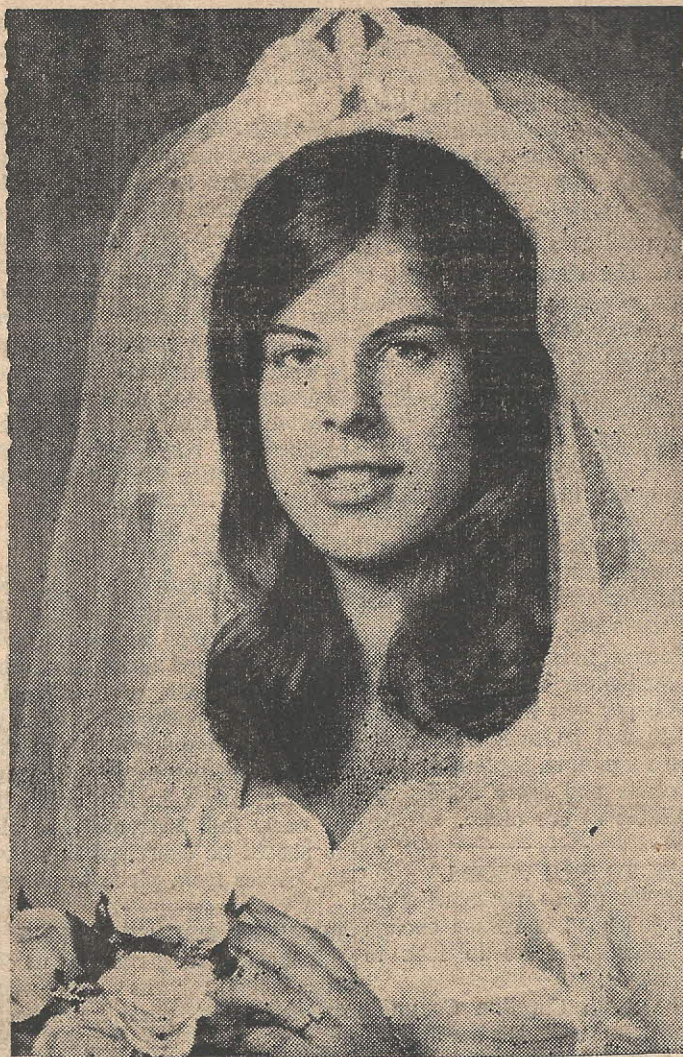
The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. B. E. Lyles of Winnsboro and is a prominent young business man of Colum-

Miss Deborah Ann Poda of Aiken and Thomas Holder Lyles of Columbia exchanged marriage vows in a communion service at 6:00 p.m., August 18, in St. Thaddeus Episcopal Church. The Reverend Rhett Y. Winters, Jr. officiated. Wedding music was presented by Mrs. Margaret Dickerson.

The bride is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. George A. Poda. The groom's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Camak Lyles of Columbia.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was gowned in her mother's wedding dress of antique ivory slipper satin. A sweetheart neckline embroidered in seed pearls, crystal piatelets, aurora beads, embroidery extending to empire lines with long fitted sleeves extending to form points over her hands offset the princess lines falling to floor length with an aisle-wide and cathedral length train. She wore a queen's crown of embroidered pearls, crystal piatelets, aurora beads and drop pearls attached to full length of French illusion outlined lace. She carried a cascade of bridal roses and stephanotis of groom's uncles, and Mr. and Mrs. William Jackson Barnett of Greensboro, N. C.
