

The Lebanon Presbyterian church was the scene of a lovely wedding at seven o'clock Saturday evening, December 3, when Miss Margie McClintock of Winnsboro was married to Maxie Holland Shealy of Columbia and Little Mountain. The Rev. W. R. Parvin, pastor of the bride, performed the double ring ceremony in the presence of a large assemblage of relatives and friends.

The church was beautifully decorated with long-leaf pines at the back of the altar, with white gladioli and fern in tall baskets, white candles in brass candelabra, and lighted candles in each of the windows.

Mrs. G. McMaster Ketchin, pianist, and W. E. Miller, vocalist, furnished the wedding music. Mr. Miller sang "Because," "One Alone," and "The Lord's Prayer." The traditional wedding marches were used for the processional and recessional.

Miss Anne McClintock, of White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, sister of the bride, was the maid of honor, and another sister, Mrs. Johnnie Roberts, of Chester, was the matron of honor. They wore dresses of lavender satin made with drop shoulders, snug bodices, full skirts, with matching mitts and halos. They carried cascade bouquets of green carnations tied with gold satin ribbon. The bridesmaids were Miss Ruth McClintock, of Montreat College, sister of the

bride, and Mrs. Edd Stevenson, Jr., of Winnsboro. Their dresses were of gold satin, and they carried lavender carnations tied with green satin ribbon, and wore matching mitts and halos; also, Mrs. Marion Frazier of Monticello and Mrs. Carson Dollar of Winnsboro, who wore dresses of green satin and carried gold carnations, tied with lavender ribbon. Their matching mitts and halos completed their costumes.

The bride had as her flower girls Judy Martin and Jeanie Dove of Winnsboro, who wore green satin dresses made like the bridesmaids, and wore matching halos in their hair. They carried baskets of white rose petals. The junior bridesmaids were Miss Mary Carolyn Kinard and Miss Sandra Kinard, of Newberry, nieces of the bridegroom. Their dresses were of gold satin, and they carried nosegays of lavender carnations tied with green ribbon. They all wore strands of pearls, gifts of the bride.

Master Johnnie Roberts, III, of Chester, nephew of the bride, was the ring bearer. He wore a white satin suit and carried the rings on a white satin pillow.

Ushergroomsmen were William Stevenson, Jr., of Winnsboro; Leonard Stevenson, Jr., James Castles, Jr., of Columbia, all cousins of the bride, and Francis Shealy, nephew of the bridegroom, and Melvin Harmon, also of Columbia.

The bridegroom had as his best man Grayson C. Metz of Columbia in a purple-tinged orchid.

Mrs. McClintock, mother of the bride, wore a dress of royal blue taffeta and a shoulder bouquet of red carnations. Mrs. Shealy, mother of the bridegroom, wore a dress of black crepe, black mitts, and a shoulder corsage of red carnations.

A reception was held at the Fairfield Inn immediately after the ceremony.

Mrs. Shealy is a graduate of Mt. Zion Institute, Winnsboro, and Montreat College. She completed a commercial course, and was employed as manager of Eagle's Stores in Conway, and also as bookkeeper in the Conway hospital. Since her return home she has worked with the REA in Winnsboro.

Mr. Shealy is a graduate of Little Mountain High school and studied accounting with La Salle Institute in Chicago, Ill. He served forty two months in the service with the 78th Inf. Division, eighteen months of which was spent overseas. He now holds a position with the South Carolina Electric and Gas Company in Columbia in the purchasing department.

Miss Isabel McCants of Winnsboro and Columbia, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. C. S. McCants of Winnsboro, became the bride of Eugene Wilson Yates, Jr., of Winnsboro and Newberry, in the Zion Presbyterian church of Winnsboro, at eight-thirty on June 30th. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Arthur Martin, the bride's pastor, and the Rev. T. C. Cannon of the Methodist church, the bridegroom's pastor.

The church was decorated with magnolia blossoms, palms, and smilax, and was lighted with white candles.

A program of wedding music was presented by Mrs. Tom Sprott at the organ, Mrs. McMaster Ketchin at the piano, and soloist, Mr. Carrere Salley. Among the selections on organ and piano were Andante Cantabile, The Swan, Adoration, Ave Maria, Liebestraum. Mrs. Sprott played Meditation from Thais and Clair de Lune on the organ. Mr. Salley, accompanied by Mrs. Sprott, sang "Ich Liebe Dich," and "O Perfect Love."

The bride was given in marriage by her father, Dr. C. S. McCants. She wore a white satin wedding dress with a sweetheart neckline, a basque waist and full skirt, and with long sleeves which ended in points at the wrist. Her tulle veil fell from a coronet of antique Belgian lace. Her only jewelry was a diamond lavalier on a platinum chain, gift of the groom. Her bouquet was of brides' roses, tuberose, centered with white orchids and showered with satin ribbon, against a background of maline.

Her attendants were her sisters, Mrs. Herbert T. Surrency of Columbia, as matron of honor, Miss Laura Glenn McCants of Columbia as maid of honor, Miss Nelle McCants as bridesmaid, Miss Christine McMaster her cousin, as bridesmaid, Miss Cele Roberts and Miss Jane Brooks Marshall of Columbia as bridesmaids, Miss Susan Doty of Winnsboro as bridesmaid, and Miss Louise Fleming of Savannah, Ga., as bridesmaid. The honor attendants and flower girls wore dresses of yellow marquisette with dropped-shoulder necklines, fitted bodices and full skirts, with matching wrist-length mitts. The bridesmaids were similarly attired in mint green. All bridal attendants carried bouquets of American beauty roses.

The bridegroom had as his best man his father, E. W. Yates, Sr., of Winnsboro. His ushergroomsmen were Joe Bryant of West Virginia, Kitt Purcell of Newberry, John Martin and Coleman Stevenson of Winnsboro, Charles Broadfoot of Fayetteville, N. C., and Dr. Rives Chalmers of Atlanta, Ga.

The bride's mother wore a dinner dress of black and aqua crepe, trimmed with sequins, and her corsage was of orchids.

The bridegroom's mother wore an evening dress of pink marquisette and lace, with an orchid corsage.

The reception which followed the ceremony was held at the home of the bride's parents.

After the reception, the bride and groom left for a wedding trip. On their return, they will make their home in Newberry. The bride's going away outfit was a brown pin-check suit in tropical worsted, a brown silk blouse, brown cobra shoes and bag, and a cocoa brown milan straw hat.
