The wedding of Miss Marian Elise McMaster and Mr. Thomas Reese Weigle was solemnized at eight o'clock Saturday evening, September 9, in the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church in Winnsboro. The Rev. Russell M. Kerr, pastor of the bride, performed the double ring ceremony.

Miss McMaster is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Hugh McMaster of Winnsboro. Mrs. McMaster is the former Norvelle Atkinson of Columbia. Mr. Weigle is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Elihu Weigle of Cleveland, Ohio. Mrs. Weigle is the former Helen Reese of Baltimore, Maryland.

The church was artistically decorated with palms, with white candles in brass candelabra the only lighting.

Mrs. G. M. Ketchin, organist, and Miss Nancy Phifer of Sumter, vocalist, presented a program of music. Before the ceremony Mrs. Ketchin played Andante Cantabile, Tschaikowsky, Romance, Rubenstein, Liebestraum, Liszt. Miss Phifer sang "Because" (DeKoven), "I Love Thee" (Grieg), and "O Perfect Love" was softly played during the ceremony. The traditional wedding marches were used for the processional and the recessional.

Mrs. Edward M. Cox was the matron of honor and Miss Lucy Virginia (Dinny) McMaster was maid of honor, both sisters of the bride.

Miss Mary Katherine McMaster, sister of the bride, Misses Nelle Wylie and Joan Fayssoux, both of Winnsboro, Miss Margie Ballard of Augusta, Ga., Miss Katherine Graves of Union, Miss Lucia Green of Orangeburg, were bridesmaids. Miss Barbara McMaster, sister of the bride, and Miss Norvelle Robinson, cousin of the bride, both of Winnsboro, were the junior bridesmaids.

All of the attendants wore identical dresses of hyacinth blue, with satin bodices and boleros, full taffeta skirts with draped overskirts of satin, caught in the back with a soft unpressed bow. They wore matching mitts, and carried American Beauty roses.

Dr. Keith E. Weigle, Jr., of Cleveland, Ohio, brother of the bridegroom, was the best man.

Ushers were J. Riley McMaster, J. Roy Robinson, S. R. McMaster, Dr. J. L. Bryson, T. K. McDonald, T. D. Rivers and E. M. Crawford, all of Winnsboro. French illusion was arranged in coronet fashion and extended the full length of her train. She carried a bridal bouquet of white roses centered with a purple-throated orchid.

Mrs. McMaster, mother of the bride, wore a crepe gown of royal blue with sequin trim, long white gloves and a corsage of white roses. Mrs. Weigle, mother of the bridegroom, wore a gown of dachia lace and chiffon, long white gloves and a corsage of pink rosebuds.

Following the ceremony the parents of the bride entertained at a reception at their home on the Great Falls Road. Receiving at the front door were Mr. and Mrs. J. Immediately after the reception Mr. and Mrs. Weigle left for a wedding trip after which they will be at home in Winnsboro. For her traveling costume the bride wore a suit of pantomime wool with a cape jacket and a satin blouse which matched the lining of her jacket. She wore with this pantomime accessories and a pink mauve hat made of imported fur felt, white gloves, and an orchid lifted from her bridal bouquet.

Mrs. Weigle attended the Winnsboro schools and was graduated in May of this year from Converse College, Spartanburg, receiving an A.B. degree in sociology.
