The Rev. L. C. Turbeville, pastor of the bride, officiated, using the impressive double-ring ceremony. The chancel of the church was decorated with a background of winter greenery, in front of which were flower baskets of white gladioli and fern. Cathedral tapers in seven-branched candelabra lighted the scene. Pews for the family, and special guests were marked with white gladioli and fern tied with white satin bows.

Glenn E. Whiteside, pianist, and Miss Ruth Grant, vocal soloist, presented a program of wedding music.

J. W. Robertson of Columbia was his brother's best man. Ushers were George W. Morris of Chester, uncle of the bride, and K. E. Robertson of Winnsboro, brother of the bridegroom.

Mrs. Laura Ashley was the bride's matron of honor and her only attendant. She wore a gown of light blue taffeta designed with a scoop neckline and gathered skirt with matching mitts. She carried a bouquet of roses tied with ribbons and streamers of satin ribbon which matched her gown.

The bride entered the church on the arm of her uncle, Joe S. Dunn, by whom she was given in marriage. The bride was lovely in a gown of white satin designed and made by her aunt, Mrs. George Morris. The gown was featured with a scalloped neckline and a yoke of illusion lace embellished with a design of seed pearls. The slim fitting waistline was accented by the scalloped hipline from which a full flowing skirt extended into a cathedral train. The long

fitted sleeves of satin ended in a conventional calla lily points over the wrists and were fastened with a self-covered button. Her fingertip veil of bridal illusion flowed from a tiara of seed pearls on lace, matching those on the yoke. Her only ornament was a cameo lavalier, belonging to her mother, which was worn on a chain, given to her by her late paternal grandmother. To complete her lovely costume the bride carried a white prayer book topped with white tuberoses, from which hung white satin markers.

Mrs. Gaston, mother of the bride, was gowned in a two-piece black gabardine suit with matching accessories.

Immediately following the ceremony the bridal party received informally in the vestibule of the church.

Later in the evening the young couple left for a wedding trip South. For traveling the bride wore a two-piece gray gabardine suit with black accessories and a corsage of white tuberoses lifted from her prayer book.

Upon their return from their wedding trip the couple will reside in Winnsboro.
