The church was effectively decorated with brass candelabra, interspersed with Southern Smilax, holding lighted white tapers. A mammoth arrangement of white mixed flowers and magnolia leaves graced the choir loft, along with the brass candelabra and tapers.

Beulah Methodist church was the scene of a lovely wedding on June fifth at eight-thirty, when Miss Maude Ophelia Frick became the bride of Daniel DeVinney Timms. 1944

Palms, floor baskets of white gladioli, white lighted candles in candelabra, and numerous single candles along the church rail effectively decorated the church, and the vows were spoken beneath an ivy covered arch.

Before the ceremony, John M. Harden, III, organist, rendered a program of nuptial music. The traditional wedding marches were used for the processional and recessional. During the ceremony, Mr. Harden softly played "O Perfect Love."

The bride who was given in marriage by her father was lovely in her wedding dress of bridal satin and net fashioned with fitted bodice, high neckline, with tiny covered buttons down the back and long sleeves ending in points over the wrists. Her full length veil of bridal illusion, worn over the face until after the ceremony, fell from a coronet of orange blossoms. Her only ornament was a strand of pearl, a gift of the bridegroom.
