Matthew Martin's *Belfast Directory* contains alphabetical list of gentry, merchants, and traders; a list of persons classified by professions and trades; residents of each house on the principal streets; and a list of noblemen and gentry residing in the county.

1841

A further edition of the above *Belfast Directory* covers Antrim, Ballymena, Belfast, Carrickfergus, Crumlin, and Lisburn. SLC film 258724.

1842

Third edition of the *Belfast Directory* covers Antrim, Ballymena, Belfast, Carrickfergus, Crumlin, Larne, and Lisburn. SLC film 258725.

1850

James Alexander Henderson's *Belfast Directory* contains an alphabetical list of nobility and gentry in and about Belfast; a list of the principal houses on the principal streets; an alphabetical list of gentry, merchants, and traders; a list of persons classified by trades; and covers Belfast and the suburbs of Ballymacarrett, Holywood, Whiteabbey, and Whitehouse.

1852

Henderson's *Belfast and Province of Ulster Directory* has lists of inhabitants, traders, etc., in and around the towns of Antrim, Ballycastle, Ballymoney, Carrickfergus, Larne, Lisburn, and Randalstown.

1854

Further edition of above covering Antrim, Ballyclare, Ballycastle, Ballymena, Ballymoney, Bushmills, Carrickfergus, Crumlin, Dromara, Glenarm, Larne,

Lisburn, and Randalstown. Further editions in 1856, 1858, 1861, 1863, 1868, and 1870.

1856

Consistorial Wills. County Antrim is mainly in the diocese of Connor, with one parish in each of the dioceses of Derry, Down, and Dromore. The guide to Catholic parish records in this chapter shows the diocese to which each civil parish belonged. 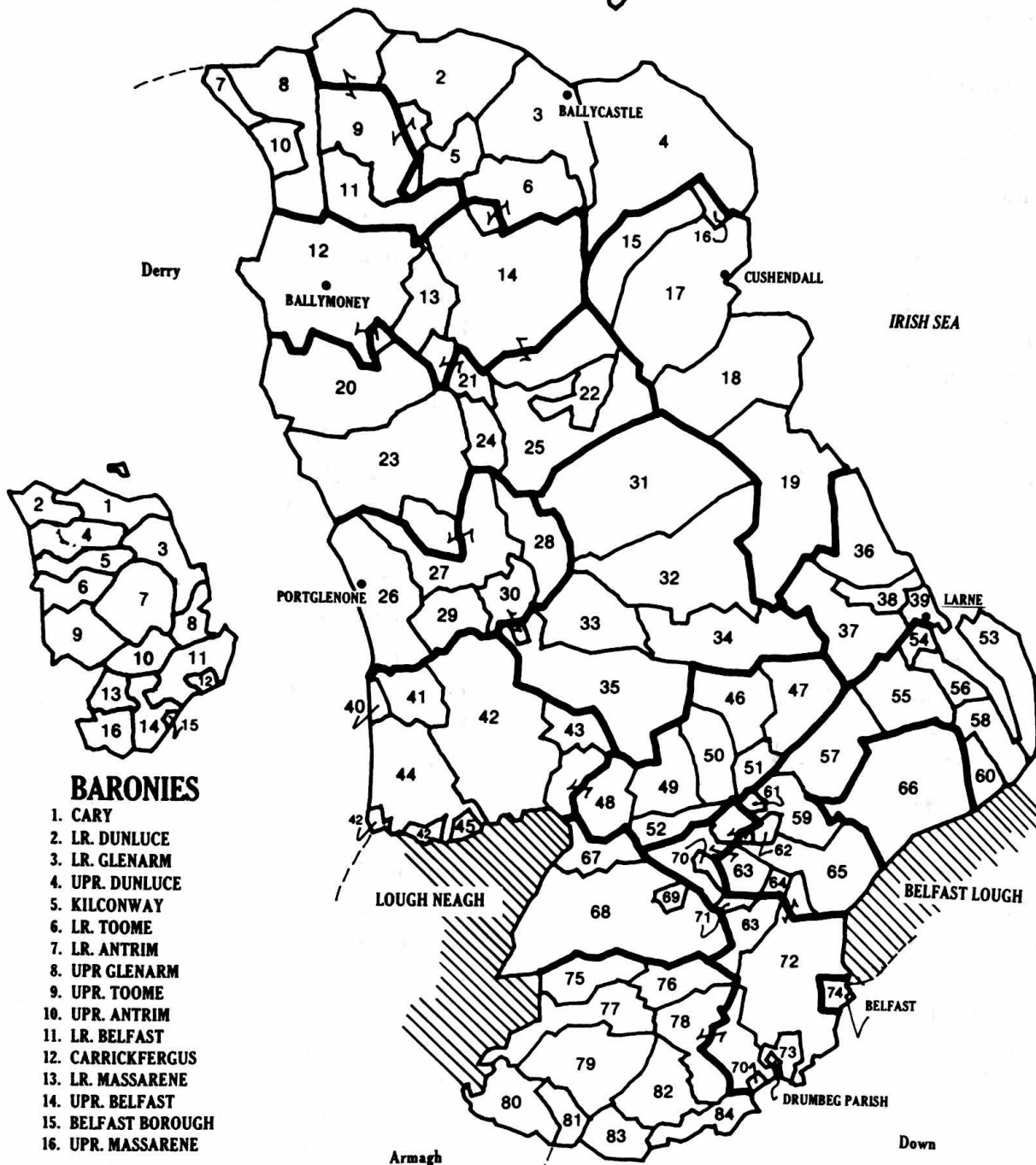
