This was borne by a famous 4th-cent. saint, Martin of Tours, and consequently became extremely popular throughout Europe in the Middle Ages. The Eng. surname Martin is first attested in the 12th cent. and is now among the 50 commonest surnames in all areas of the Englishspeaking world. Within England the name is concentrated most densely in Cornwall and Sussex.

Harriet Martineau (1802-76), the English writer, was the daughter of a Norwich manufacturer. She was directly descended from a family of French Huguenots who owned land around Poitou and Touraine in the 15th cent. They included a number of surgeons in the 17th cent. In the 19th cent. a branch of the family was firmly established in Birmingham.

Martindale English: habitation name from a place in Cumb., first recorded in 1220 in its present form. There is a chapel of St Martin here, and the valley (see DALE) may

be named from this. The English poet Andrew Marvell (1621-78) was born near Hull in the village of Winestead, where his father was rector. His ancestry can be traced back to 1279 in the area of Meldreth, Cambs.

Marwick Scots: habitation name from a place in the Orkneys, so called from ON marr sea, lake, marsh (see MARR) + vik bay. The surname is also borne in the U.S. by Jews, as an Anglicized form of one or more Ashkenazic sur-

Marwood English: 1. habitation name from a place so called, probably the one in Co. Durham, which Ekwall derives from OE mara greater, larger (cf. mod. Eng. more) + wudu Wood.

2. Norman nickname for a person believed to have the power of casting the 'evil eye', from ONF malreward, a cpd of mal evil, bad + reward (OF regard) look.

Mas 1. Low German and Dutch: aphetic form of THOMAS. 2. Provençal and Catalan: topographic name for someone who lived in an isolated dwelling in the country, rather than in a village, from OProv., Cat. mas farm(stead)

(O) Murnaghan Ó Muirneacháin (muirneach, lovable). An Ulster name which is quite distinct from the Munster Murnane.

(O) Murnane O Murnain. This Thomond name, now in Cork, is also anglicized Marrinane and Marnane. The mediaeval form Iwarry. nane shows how it became Warren in some places. MIF

Murney An occasional synonym of Murnane. See Gilmore.

(Mac) Murphy Mac Murchadha. MacMurphy was formerly numerous in Armagh and Tyrone but the prefix Mac has been almost entirely dropped. This is probably the origin of the majority of the Murphys in Ulster. See next entry.

(O) Murphy O Murchadha (for derivation see Morchoe). Murphy is the most numerous name in Ireland and is that of three different septs as indicated in Map. The resumption of the prefixes O and Mac, which is a modern tendency with most Gaelic-Irish names, Map Cork, has not taken place in the case of Murphy. Bibl. IF Roscommon and Wexford.
